Quarterback Richard Clark scored the first touchdown on a one-yard keeper with only 17 seconds left in the first half. Halfback Eddie Jackson got the two-point conversion, first successful bonus point play of the season for the Bisons, around right end. Jackson moved the pigskin seven yards to the one the play before. Key play of the drive, however, was a 40-yard pass from Clark to Wide Receiver Tan Flippin for a first on the Bearcat eight. That play came on a fourth down.

Jackson was the Bison leading rusher with 117 yards. Michael Clark added 82. Robby Bailey 34 and Richard Clark 26. Flippin caught all the passes the Bufs completed for 74 yards.

Buffaloes will go to Early Friday to tangle with the stout Longhorns in a 7:30 p.m. District 10-A contest. Early is seeking to regroup after falling to San Saba 28-14 last week. Because of the possible impact that those problems could have on the community, the school board desires that the general public be made aware of the problems and subsequent consequences if the problems are not corrected within a reasonable period of time.

marriage booth, pie throw, spook house, bingo, apple bobbing, divorce booth, bucking barrel and cake walk.

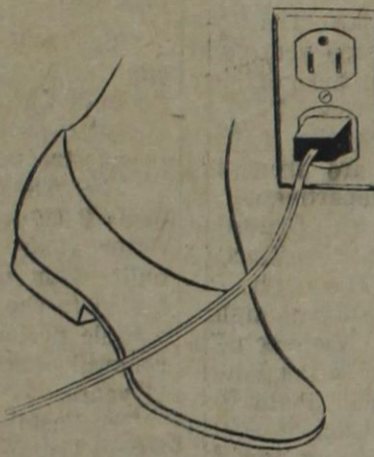

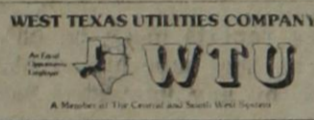


- ★ When disconnecting an appliance, don't pull cord; pull plug.
- ★ Be sure each appliance has the type of cord suited to the job it does — heavy duty extension cords for power tools; moisture resistant cords and plugs for outdoor equipment.

- ★ Have frayed cords replaced promptly.
- ★ Water conducts electricity; never handle electric appliances or switches with wet hands or when standing on a wet surface.
- ★ If an appliance has a separate cord, attach cord to appliance before plugging it into an outlet; disconnect cord from outlet before disconnecting it from appliance. Store cords away from cutlery, heat and dampness.



- ★ Don't place cords where they'll be tripped over or be subject to wear (under a well-travelled rug, through doorways).
- ★ Teach children not to play with or around electric sockets or equipment.
- ★ Don't use an electric lawn mower or hedge clippers when barefoot, or on wet grass or hedges.
