Decision On County Hospital Due Friday

The decision to lease the hospital at Baird, formerly Callahan County Hospital, stands, but who will get the five-year lease will be decided Friday.

A public hearing, held by Callahan County Commissioners at the courthouse in Baird last Friday, resulted in solidifying the decision of the county administrators to lease the facility instead of operating the hospital through the county.

The hearing was to give any opposition the right to be heard and to contest the leasing of the medical facility by presenting a petition. No contesting petition was presented.

Friday, June 20, another meeting will be held at Baird at which time commissioners will decide to which group to grant the lease. The session will begin at 9 a.m. in Commissioners courtroom.

Three groups or organizations have expressed interest in leasing the hospital at Baird. They are United Hospitals of Memphis, Tenn., American Medical Management Association of Dallas and Dr. Lawrence Gavao of Baird who has operated the facility for the past five years, under the name of Callahan General Hospital. County Judge Mack Kniffen said Tues-

day that although the three groups had expressed interest in operating the hospital no solid proposals had been offered by any of the group to commis-

ioners. If a decision is made Friday to whom to grant the lease, it will be for a five-year period, it was explained.

County Will Mail 5,000 Tax Re-Appraisal Notes

Callahan County Clerk Darlene Walker will put into the mail this week about 5,000 re-evaluation notices to taxable property owners.

Albert Lovell, Callahan County Tax Assessor-Collector, explained that this is being done to comply with the law that the state passed last year directing that all taxable property must be appraised at 100 per cent of market value by 1981.

He continued that the re-evaluation and probable tax rate increase also was forced upon the county because of another Austin-passed piece of legislation, mandating that all properties be appraised from a central office within each county.

Lovell also noted that it was not our (county officials) desire to do this, but was necessary to

pay for the county's part of the expenses which will be incurred by setting up the office and paying appraisers and personnel.

Callahan County was in 1979 on 15 per cent of market value at the rate of \$1.20 per \$100 valuation. Lovell indicated that the projection indicated a tax rate of 40 cents per \$100 of fair market valuation.

Two meetings for property owners to discuss appraised values with the Board of Equalization have been carded at the courthouse at Baird. On July 7 the board will meet with oil property owners. The following day, Tuesday, July 8, the Board of Equalization will meet with other property owners wishing to discuss new values from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 to 5 p.m.

Charges Increase On Out-of-State Calls

AT&T received approval from the Federal Communications Commission for a uniform 5.12 per cent increase in rates for all out-of-state long distance calls. It is the corporation's first general rate increase in more than four years.

According to a Continental Telephone representative, all phone companies concur in AT&T's charges for long distance services so that rates throughout the nation are the same. Therefore the increase approved for AT&T affects all out-of-state phone calls regardless of which company provides the service.

To illustrate the new rates, the full weekday direct dialed charge for a one minute call from most Texas points to New York City is now 55 cents, up from 52 cents. That same call dialed at night after 11 o'clock is now 23 cents instead of the previous 22 cents. AT&T estimates that the average household phone will bill rise 15 cents a month.

The increase was effective at 12:01 a.m., Friday, June 6.

Time To Treat For Cattle Grubs - Expert

Cattle in Central and West Texas should be treated for cattle grubs between May 15 and July 15, and oftentimes treatments are more effective if applied prior to July 1, according to Dr. Tom Fuchs, Area Entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Cattle grubs can be effectively controlled with a systemic insecticide which is applied to the animal, absorbed into the blood system and distributed throughout the body to kill grubs migrating through the animal's tissues. Systemic insecticides can be applied as dips, sprays, pour-ons or spot-ons. Effective insecticides are also available in mineral formulations and feed mixes.

Producers should pay particular attention to all directions, restrictions and precautions and use the product according to the label to avoid animal injury or illegal residues in meat or milk, Dr. Fuchs advises.

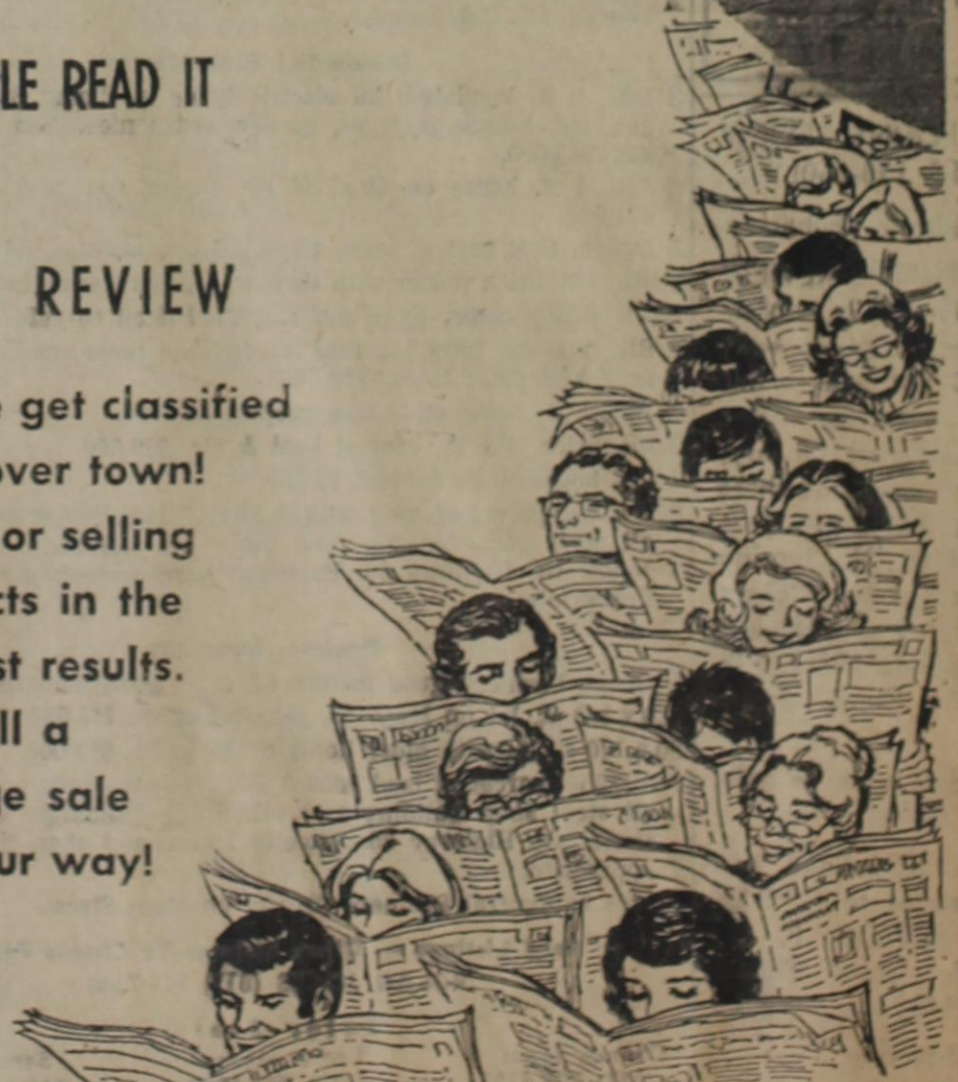

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

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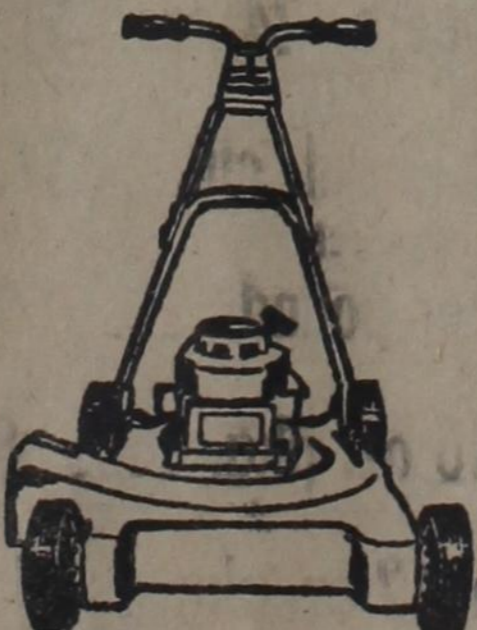

W.T.U. Is Part Of Major New Electrical Interconnect

Three major electric utility systems in the southwest have reached agreement on terms which will connect the intrastate Eastern Interconnected Grid. The agreement was announced jointly by officials of Central and South West Corporation, Houston Lighting & Power Company, and Texas Utilities Company.

Under terms of the settlement the single-state ERCOT system will be linked with the multi-state Southwest Power Pool (SWPP) through high voltage direct current (DC) interconnections in southeast and north central Texas.

Utility companies of the Dallas-based Central and South West Corporation include Central Power and Light Company, Corpus Christi, and West Texas Utilities Company, Abilene. Both members of the intrastate ERCOT; and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa, and Southwestern Electric Power Company, Shreveport, both members of the interstate SWPP.

Durwood Chalker, chairman and chief executive officer of Central and South West Corporation, said, "The settlement will be beneficial to all parties involved with substantial dollar savings to our customers."

This savings will result from economies in providing electricity to over 1.3 million customers in the four-state service area of the Central and South West.
