Showers In Week Yield 3.70 Inches

Thundershowers which have roamed the Cross Plains area almost daily during the past week have given a tremendous boost to the agricultural outlook in this section.

One Cross Plains gauge has caught a total of 3.70 inches since Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning of last week. Another local gauge showed 3.95 inches.

The moisture was badly needed by small grain crops, although some say some of the crops were too far advanced to derive full benefit, while others say the moisture could make yields increase considerably.

Another concern has been at least partially remedied. That is lack of water in earthen stock tanks. In at least some sections most tanks have caught water which will last for some time, while in others runoff has not been that great.

Reports in the Atwell area range from 3.70 inches to over 4.00 inches. In the Rowden section gauges varied between three and four inches. O. B. Byrd of Cross Cut reported 4.60 inches on Monday. Truett Dawkins at Sabanno said he had over four inches during the week. At the J. T. Beggs place 4.50 inches had fallen by Monday.

Cross Plains got 1.25 and .80, according to one gauge, last week with another .40 of an inch falling Monday and .25 of an inch on Tuesday.

Absentee Vote Light On School's Bonds

Only three persons had voted absentee at noon Tuesday in the \$650,000 school bond election scheduled for Saturday, May 24.

Absentee voting will continue through Tuesday, May 20, at the School Tax Office in northwest corner room of the high school. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Balloting in the election, in which permission is asked of the school district residents to issue up to \$650,000 to build a new high school, will be held in the Cross Plains City Hall.

School trustees, who are calling the election, say the new building seems to be the best way to improve facilities at the school. Taxes are projected to increase about 38.46 per cent, but that means only \$2 on each assessed \$1,000 valuation the school board says. It was also listed in projected tax tables that any property exempt from taxation last year will also be exempt this year providing requirements for such exemptions have been met.

"Prophecy"

Jerusalem: Zechariah prophesied that in the last days all nations would be against Jerusalem and the city would be a burdensome stone to them. This past month in a U.N.-sponsored resolution, every U.N. member (except Israel, of course) voted to refuse Israel's claim to the old city of Jerusalem. President Carter explained that the U. S. voted for the resolution as the result of a terrible mistake; but nevertheless, the prophecy had to be fulfilled (Zech. 12:3 14:1-3). The U.N. action was a prelude to the ultimate prophetic fulfillment.

Hebrew Shekel Restored: In 1980 the Jewish Passover fell on April 1, but even more meaningful is the fact that both the Passover and Easter fall on the same day in 1981, April 19. This past month, Israel dropped the pound as its basic monetary unit and returned to the biblical shekel. All pounds are being exchanged for shekels. This action is doubtless a sign that Israel may soon return to the biblical and traditional system for all weights and measures, something that must happen before the sacrificial worship is restored.

Banks To Close? & New Money System: The Chicago Tribune-New York News Syndicate published a report quoting a recognized financial authority concerning the economic future. This story appeared in local newspapers on March 2, and stated banks could again be closed for 90 days, and further stated, "... in the period in which the monetary system would be restructured ... the probability is that only small withdrawals would be permitted, perhaps on a daily basis ... " We would advise that this is the opinion of only one source, but it highlights the thinking of today in economic circles — that we are headed toward a new money system in the near future.

According to Dr. J. A. Seiss, Jupiter and Saturn were in conjunction in the sign of Pisces before the birth of Moses. This was a sign that a deliverer would be born of the Jews. In Matthew 24 The disciples came unto him privately, saying, Tell us, when shall these things be? and what shall be the sign of thy coming, and of the end of the world? Jesus gave to them the sign of the times and then shall the end come.

O ye hypocrites, ye can discern the face of the sky; but can ye not discern the signs of the times? Matt. 16:3.

The prophet Daniel said that the end, or end-time events, would come like a flood. This certainly seems evident in view of the fact that all the above news items that have important prophetic meaning have occurred within the past 30 days. Seeing all these signs before us, what does God expect us to do (II Peter 3:11)? Also the Bible says to forsake not the assembling of yourself together.

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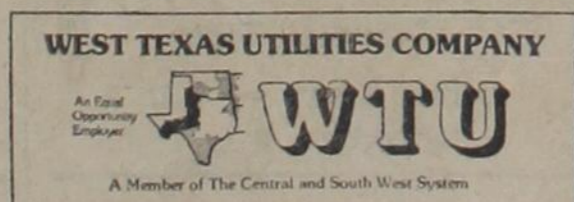

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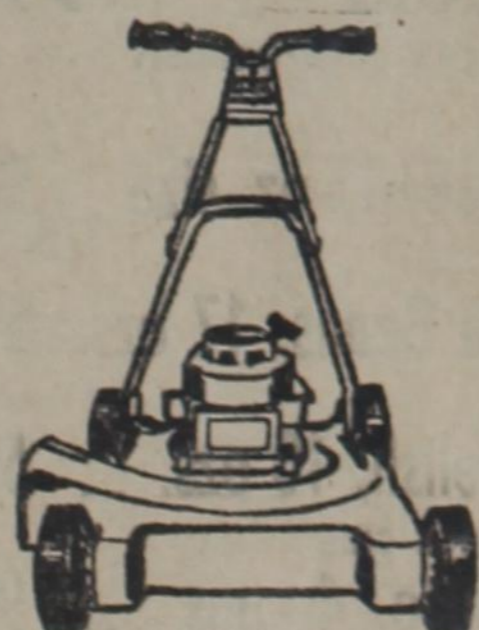
