**RESOLUTION**

A Resolution of the Board of the City of Cross Plains, Texas approving Residential Property Rehabilitation Standards and Conditions Under Which Rehabilitation Grant Payments Will Be Made in Community Development Block Grant Program.

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Cross Plains, Texas deems it necessary to establish uniform RESIDENTIAL REHABILITATION STANDARDS and methods under which rehabilitation grant payments will be made; and

WHEREAS, the City of Cross Plains, Texas has by virtue of its charter the authority to provide financial assistance for the rehabilitation of residential property in the form of grant payments; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Cross Plains has determined that it is in order to set forth certain policies and procedures for guidance in adhering to the good practice in the rehabilitation of residential property;

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Cross Plains, Texas that the attached Residential Property Rehabilitation Standards and Statement of Procedures and Methods for Making Rehabilitation Grant Payments Shall Be Adhered To by the City of Cross Plains, Texas.

**Grant Policy Homeowner Eligibility—**

- Structure Requirements
1. Homeowner must be in the target area.
  2. There will be no discrimination or requirement with regard to age, sex, race, creed, or religion except that the grantor has determined that preference will be given in considering all applications to all elderly persons living alone, with additional consideration to any elderly person handicapped physically due to disease or the infirmities of age.
  3. The applicant must be the sole owner of owner-occupied dwelling. There must be no claims on the property other than taxes and mortgage payments.
  4. Taxes must be paid through current year.
  5. The dwelling cannot be used as a business, nor a business cannot be run on the premises.
  6. The applicant shall promise to occupy the dwelling, health permitting, for a period of 36 months after completion of the work.
  7. The applicant shall not have an income in excess of that income determined by the Department of Housing and Urban Development to identify "low-moderate income citizens."
  8. The applicant promises to cooperate fully in complying with local, state, and federal regulations pertinent to this application.
  9. The dwelling must be suitable for rehabilitation. The final authority with regard to structural stability will be the city.
  10. On completion the rehabilitation will meet the minimum requirements of HUD Section 8 housing.
  11. The grant funds per dwelling shall not exceed \$5,000.00, except where hidden defects, unknown at the time of

the inspection and contract, causes increases in cost. Such increases in costs must be approved by the grantor and contract change orders approved before work proceeds.

**ATTACHMENT B Statement of Procedures and Methods of Making Rehabilitation Grant Payments.**

The following Statement of Procedures and Methods of making Rehabilitation Grant Payments was established to provide for uniform and equitable treatment of persons receiving financial assistance for the rehabilitation of owner-occupied residential dwellings under the Community Development Block Grant Program.

The City of Cross Plains has by virtue of an agreement with the Department of Housing and Urban Development has the authority to execute the Community Development Block Grant Program.

The City of Cross Plains is committed to the task of removing blight, upgrading and restoring sub-standard housing and the installation of public improvements.

Rehabilitation Grant Payments not to exceed \$5,000.00 (Five Thousand Dollars) will be made available to certain owner-occupants of sub-standard residential dwellings subject to the following conditions:

1. Generally the procedures for submitting, processing, and approving rehabilitation grants will follow those outlined in the HUD Rehabilitation Financing Handbook 7375.1 Rev. Chapt. 9 and all other Chapters outlined in Chapter 9 as being applicable to rehabilitation grants, with the exceptions as adopted.
2. Exceptions to the above mentioned Chapter 9 will be permitted as approved by the City of Cross Plains and in accordance with the regulations governing the execution of the Community Development Block Grant Act of 1974, as amended.

Final determination of any situation not covered by the above noted Handbook, the regulations of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the adopted procedures, will rest with the City Council and Mayor of the City of Cross Plains, Texas.
