

HUGE RATTLESNAKE SLAIN | Cross Plains Review - 2 AT RITTA KNIGHT PLACE

It took several people and some time, but a huge rattlesnake was killed west of Cross Plains Sunday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. August Richardson of near Rising Star were leaving the home of Mrs. Ritta Knight when he saw a large snake crossing the road.

While Mrs. Richardson was getting a shotgun at the Knight home the snake crawled into thick weeds and was lost to Mr. Richardson's sight, but was rediscovered several minutes later. Mrs. Knight shot it with a pistol, but her usual straight shooting missed the mark, hitting the snake's tail. Mr. Richardson used a hoe to stop the rattler.

It measured 4 feet, 7 inches long, and was 11 inches around. Mrs. Knight said she killed 11 rattlers near her home last fall, but only a couple this sum-

The God-ordered necessity and connection between happy obdience to Him and knowing the Truth are thus a major difference between many of the typical believers today and us. For multitudes have been erroneously taught 'to know' but not the blessedness (and requirement-and we speak of saints washed and made righteous in the blood of Christ) of doing His revealed will. (My brief article: "So, The British Saints Pray" clearly applies here). And thus, the difference in maturity is manifested.



I like the brief visits I have with the ladies of the community when I call them, or they call me and report their social activities of the week. Most of all, like the privilege of writing; this time about some experiences I have had, where we ived for six years. Many times have recalled a line in our school song (class song composed by the late Lexie Dean Robertson) "To the world we will give our aid." 

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
