## School Plant Deficiencies Earning Warning From TEA

Editor's Note: Following is a continuation of a series of reports received from various state agencies concerning the local school facilities, primarily the high school building.

A fire safety inspection of the high school building was conducted by Alton L. Smith, inspector for the State Fire Marshal, and recommendations made in his report dated October 5, 1979. The major concerns and recommendations mentioned in his report are as follows:

1. Discontinue storage in the room on the second floor across from the superintendent's office and remove all existing combustible stored items.
  2. Separate both bookrooms from all other parts of the building with an enclosure of not less than one hour fire resistance rating (this would be a type of fire resistant wall covering and fire resistant floor covering.)
  3. Repair or cause to be repaired the fire escape, to comply with the fire escape law, inclusive of proper identification lights, and signs.
  4. Replace certain electrical circuits specified in the details of this report.
  5. Repair the exit doors at the southwest side of the building. These doors should be functional at all times when the building is occupied.
  6. Install an alternate exit leading to the outside from the library.
  7. Replace all protective covers damaged or missing from wall heaters.
  8. Install an approved manual operating fire alarm system, in order to have pull stations located at every exit.
  9. Have all gas wall heaters inspected before use.
  10. A written report should be received by this office from a structural engineer attesting to the structural soundness of the building for occupancy.
  11. A written report should be received by this office from a licensed electrician attesting to the fact that all electrical work complies with a nationally recognized standard, inclusive of checking all circuits for proper protection.
- All recommendations are expected to be completed within 60 days from the receipt of this report.
- A cover letter from Robert A. Montgomery, assistant deputy commissioner for planning/Accreditation program and personnel development, accompanying a monitoring team report included the following:

reports indicate that sufficient grounds exist to recommend that the accreditation status be modified from its present state to that of accredited, advised.

"The seriousness of the violations stated warrant that the district initiate immediate plans for correcting the deficiencies. The Agency should be advised periodically concerning the progress that is taking place in the district concerning this matter. The recommendations to change the district's status will be made to the State Commission on School Accreditation at its next meeting."

The Texas Education Agency monitoring team report prepared by Edward Manigold and Joe Hucklestein offered the following comments:

"It was apparent from the monitoring visit conducted on September 12, 1979, that little, if any, has been done to improve the undesirable and unsafe conditions in the high school building over the past five years. The district does not seem to sense the urgency for correcting the unsuitable learning conditions in this old high school building. Numerous reports over the past five years have called to the attention of the district discrepancies relating to health and safety. While some of the deficiencies noted in the reports have been corrected, the reports concerning the physical facilities in the high school have consistently pointed out the futility of attempts to make cosmetic changes in the high school building.

The Division of School Accreditation has been more than patient with the school district regarding the correction of the unsuitable learning conditions in the high school building. The district has included in its accreditation Five-Year Priorities Plan a time frame for improving the high school facilities. However, if the school district were to begin immediately to institute a building program, it would be at least two years before a new structure could be completed. Because of the long-standing problem and because of the slowness at which the district has responded to the pressing need for improved facilities, it is recommended that the district's accreditation status be changed to Advised until appropriate action has been completed concerning the improvement of conditions in the high school facility."

Additional comments from a structural engineer's report concerning the high school facility will be printed next week.

Singing, speeches and open house noted the opening of the Special Education Building at Cross Plains Schools here last Saturday afternoon.

Keynote speaker was U. S. Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford. Other prominent persons on the program included Jim Binnion, state school board member, of Abilene and Dr. Jane Duckett of Austin, Texas Education Agency Director of Special Education Funding. Other parts on the program were by Lee Nell Gann of Region 14 Service Center in Abilene; Vernal King, director of local special ed cooperative; Randy Foster, local school board president, and Dr. Scot H. Edgington, local superintendent.

The program began with several songs presented by members of the first and second grade under direction of Mattie Fay Dixon, first grade teacher.

An estimated 250 persons attended the program and toured the facility which cost just under \$65,000.

Although it belongs to Cross Plains Schools, the facility is leased by the federally funded Comanche Special Service Cooperative headed by King.

## Bangs Clips Buffs 28-13; Grid Finale Here Friday

Host Bangs used the bomb and two late scores to defeat Cross Plains Buffaloes 28-13 in District 10-A football last Saturday.

The Dragons, who delighted homecomers with the triumph, came from behind to defeat the Bisons.

Buff Tailback Eddie Jackson put the Herd ahead in the first quarter on a 30-yard scoring romp. Quarterback Duane Hutchins kicked the point for a 7-0 lead.

With just 1:30 left in the first half Dragon Fullback Tom Koen tied the score on a one-yard run. A key in the drive was a pass interference call against the Buffs deep in Herd country. Bangs gained a 14-7 lead on first play from scrimmage in second half. End Brent Cox took a pass from Quarterback Berry McCorkle covering 71 yards.

Buffaloes countered with about a 60-yard drive as Hutchins tallied from four yards out. The missed bonus point left Bangs leading 14-13. Two other local drives were aborted. One was halted on a fumble and another at the Bangs 15 by a holding penalty.

Dragons scored twice in last two minutes. McCorkle capped an 87-yard drive and Steve Zink scored from three yards out.

Buff had 408 yards total offense, 273 rushing and 135 passing. Leading carriers were Jackson with 160 yards and Mike Clark with 95 yards. Tan Flip-pin caught three passes for 65 yards, Eugene Ford two for 45 yards and Gary Robinson one for 25 yards.

Bangs had a total offense of 282 yards, even rushing and passing according to local figures, and most of them came in the second half.

Buff will end the 1979 season in Buffalo Stadium Friday by hosting 10-A foe Goldthwaite. The Herd will be seeking a fourth victory, third in league competition, and the Eagles will be after second win of the season.

Bisons Athletic Director stated that Goldthwaite doesn't look like a 1-8 team, and admits that the Herd will have to be ready to earn a season-ending victory. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.

## Employees Urged To Check S. S. Records

Beginning with 1978 employees began reporting the wages of their employees once a year. These reports are being made directly to the Social Security Administration. The purpose for this change was to help the employers by saving them time and money in their bookkeeping operations.

Every employee should carefully check his copy of the W-2 form to determine if the social security number and the wages for the year have been reported correctly. Another way to check your social security record is to get a post card form (SSA-7004) from the Social Security Office and send it in to Baltimore, Md. The central office of Social Security will provide you with a record of your account from 1937 and 1951 to the present with each of the last three years shown separately. If the record is incorrect, get in touch with the Social Security Office immediately so the record can be corrected. The amount of social security benefits payable at retirement, death, or disability is based on the record.

To be sure you get what you paid for, check your record every three years. Don't put it off so long that it will be difficult to correct.

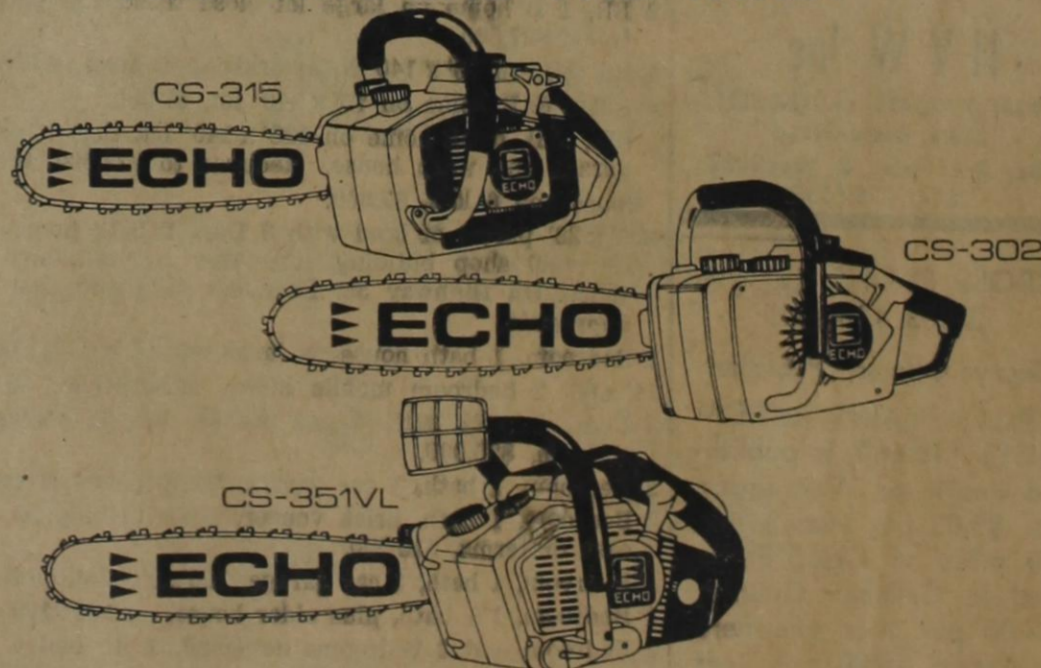

## Notice Is Hereby Given By Callahan County Of Its Rent Assistance Program

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need. Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled or displaced of lower income.

## Please Don't Shoot Our Phone Cables

Orange safety vests have saved hundreds of lives during hunting season. But unadorned telephone wires and cables still fall victim to hunters' bullets each year.

"It's hard to believe," said Alan Armstrong, Customer Services Manager for Continental Telephone at Baird, "but some hunters" sharpen their skills by using telephone wires, glass insulators and cables for target practice."

"Shotgun pellets and rifle bullets can easily penetrate the protective sheathing around a telephone cable, sever individual phone wires and shatter glass insulators," Armstrong said. "A careless shot can put an entire community out of service." The telephone, Armstrong said, is the only way some people, including hunters, can summon help in an emergency.

Sometimes phone lines damaged during hunting season will not affect service until the winter months when melting ice seeps into damaged cable. This compounds the problem as weather conditions prevent prompt repairs.

Armstrong stressed these problems have a very simple solution: "Please don't shoot at or near telephone lines."

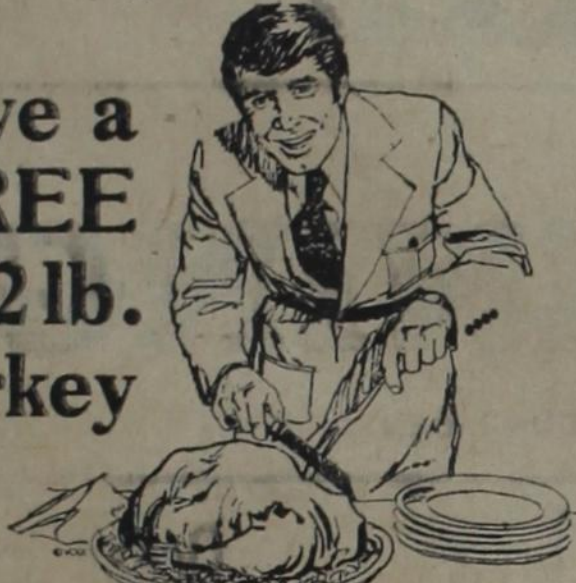

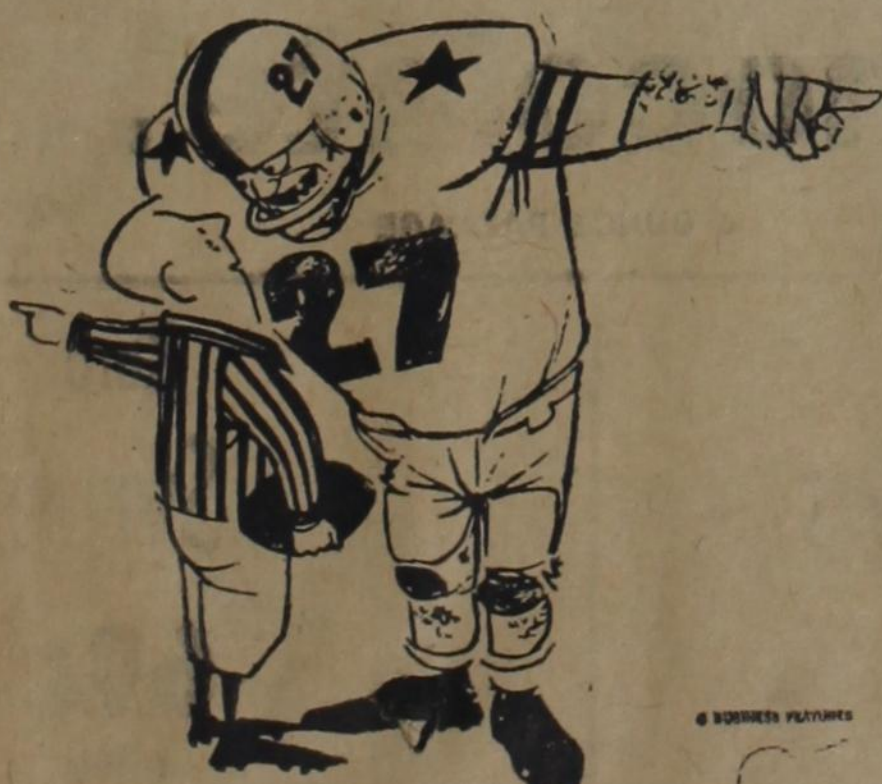
