

## Bisons Grab Third In 10-A Track Meet

Cross Plains Buffalo track team scored 78 points and captured third place in the District 10-A University Interscholastic League track and field meet held Thursday at Cen-Tex Stadium at Brownwood.

Early won the competition with 116 points, and De Leon was a close second with 110 points. Cross Plains nipped Bangs for third by beating the Dragons in the final event, the 1,600 meter relay. Buffs finished fifth and Bangs was sixth. The Dragons scored 70 points. Also runs included Sab Saba scoring 44 points, Goldthwaite 32, Dublin 26 and Ranger 12.

Two Cross Plains athletes qualified to compete in the regional meet. They are Eddie Jackson and Tan Flippin. Both are in field events. Jackson will test district winners and runners-up in the shot put and discus, in which two events he claimed second in the 10-A meet. Flippin will vie in the high jump. He shared first place in District 10-A.

Both the Bisons will compete at the regional meet at Tarleton State University at Stephenville Friday. Field events will begin at 3 p.m.

Athletic Director Mickie Huffman said this week that he thought the Cross Plains athletes did a real good job at the District meet. "You couldn't ask for a better effort from them all season," the head coach continued. Huffman added, "I am real pleased with them, and Cross Plains should be real proud of them."

The following results were reported for Bisons at the District 10-A meet, and it was noted that only first and second place winners in league competition can compete in regional meets. Third place is the alternate, but

can only go if one of the first two is not able to compete. Cross Plains has six third place finishes.

Flippin tied for first in the high jump at 6-feet, 4-inches, and he was third in the long jump with a leap of 20-feet, 2½ inches.

Jackson was second in the shot with a heave of 49-feet, 1½-inches. He was also second in the discus with a throw of 127-feet, 9-inches.

Danny Lewis turned in two third place finishes. His pole vault of 11 feet was second runner-up to the winner, and his 6-foot, 2-inch leap in the high jump was third.

Bill Davis was third in the shot put with a heave of 47-feet, 1½-inches.

Duane Hutchins also claimed a pair of third place finishes. He ran the 200 meter dash in 22.9 seconds, and he was timed in the 400 meter dash in 52.9.

Robby Bailey ran fourth in the 100 meter dash and was clocked at 11.8 seconds.

The Bisons' 400 meter relay was also fourth in 45.6 seconds, best time of the year for the local quartet composed of Mike Clark, Flippin, Hutchins and Bailey.

The 1,600 meter relay also posted its best time of the season, 3:45.0, and took fifth place, nipping Bangs to take third place in the meet. That four some was composed of Lewis, Randy Huffman, Eric Robertson and Flippin.

Jackson and Flippin competed against some of the area regional qualifiers in Classes A and B at Rising Star last Friday. Jackson won the shot with a heave of 52-feet, 11½-inches. Flippin was fourth in the high jump, clearing 6 feet.

## Western Highway 36 Is Due Seal Coating

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has approved a \$58.7 million program to improve almost 2,000 miles of state-maintained highways in Texas.

The 1981 State Highways Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement program will include a wide variety of work in all sections of Texas.

Types of work include widening, new surfaces, improved signs and signals and other means of improving the safety characteristics, traffic capacity, riding quality, and ease of maintenance of the highways involved.

Included in the program in Callahan County, according to Roger C. Welsch, district engineer in Abilene, is State Highway 36 from Taylor County line to U. S. 283. The project will receive a seal coat (one course of asphalt and aggregate overlay) for a total distance of 16.4 miles.

The program proposes improvement of 1,997.7 miles; sixty-four per cent of the work on U. S. and State-numbered Highways, and the remainder on Farm-to-Market roads. The program contains a total of 334 separate projects located in 140 counties.

## Some Area Farmers, Ranchers Due Queries

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry—agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing plans.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs, says Wilbert H. Walther of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.


