Engineer's Report Final School Building Article

Editor's Note: Following is a report from H. Lee Tucker, Architectural Engineer of Brownwood, concerning his inspection of the high school building at Cross Plains Schools. He made a survey in an effort to determine if the building is structurally sound. The survey was ordered by local school trustees at the directive of state agencies. It is the final in the series of reports concerning the building in question.

"At the request of the Board of Trustees of the Cross Plains Independent School District I made two visits there to inspect the structural stability of the High School Building.

"(1) A preliminary inspection of the building Oct. 17, 1979.

"(2) A detailed observation of the building Oct. 24, 1979 as noted below:

"No plans of the building, as planned or as built, were available so no comparisons of that nature were possible.

"Two small cracks were observed in the concrete foundation beam near the SW corner of the building which I do not consider at all serious.

"There is some spalling of 1st story concrete tie beams at corners which appear to be of many years age and of no structural importance.

"There is some deterioration of mortar joints in brickwork but of no structural importance;

no wall failure was indicated on the interior face of wall in these areas.

"All walls of both one and two story areas appear to be plumb and in good condition.

"Interior walls of one story areas appear to be of plastered masonry and are in excellent condition.

"Partitions in old auditorium area are wooden frame and gypsum board and therefore not sufficiently fire resistant.

"Roofs and ceilings are of frame construction which is in good condition so far as I could determine.

"Ceiling finish is ornamental sheet metal, and, in my opinion, should be replaced with fire resistant material.

"The wooden stairs are structurally sound.

"In summation, it is my considered opinion that this building is structurally sound and safe."

Bisons Win Grid Finale By 36-22 Or 1-0 Score

Although it will go down in the official record books as a forfeit, last Friday's season finale football game was an exciting affair.

Wide open offense at times, and stout defense at others, plus upcoming antics by an adult Goldthwaite coach.

The Goldthwaite Eagles were taken from the field at Buffalo Stadium trailing 36-22 with 5 minutes, 22 seconds showing on the clock.

The two longtime conference opponents battled to a 22-22 draw in the first half, and only in the second half did the Bisons manage to post an advantage. The Herd played catch-up football most of the first 24 minutes of action.

The win upped the Buffalo season record to 4-6, the best in the past few years, and the District 10-A mark to 3-4 good for fifth place in the eight-team league.

Cross Plains collected 287 yards rushing and 43 passing for a total offense of 320 yards. Pat Flippin caught the lone aerial for a touchdown. He also did a superlative job handling the punting chores, as he did most of the season. Leading rusher was Eddie Jackson with 316 yards, Mike Clark ran for 76 steps, Duane Hutchins had 50 and Robby Bailey 25.

After a threat by both teams,

Goldthwaite's Kenny Saathoff covered a blocked punt in the end zone for a touchdown with 1:31 left in the first quarter.

Cross Plains countered with a determined drive as Jackson bulled the last 11 yards with 9:59 left in the second canto. The stout Buff back also scored the two-point conversion, tying the score, 8-8 taking a direct snap from center in a "shot-gun" type formation.

Just over two minutes later the Eagles counted again with Tony Corona circling left end for the final 14.

Again Cross Plains knotted the score, although it took the Herd just over three minutes to do it this time. Quarterback Duane Hutchins covered the final three yards, and Jackson converted the bonus point from the shotgun set-up for a 16-16 tally.

Again Goldthwaite went ahead on a scoring pass with 1:40 left in the first half.

Once again the Herd was up to the task quickly countering with the score coming on a 43-yard pass and run from Hutchins to Flippin. This time the Eagles were also up to the task stopping Jackson on the two-point conversion attempt.

Buffaloes broke the 22-22 deadlock in the third quarter on third play after Buffalo Robby Bailey had returned an Eagle punt about 55 yards to the Goldthwaite 5. Two lunges by Jackson moved the ball to the one, and Michael Clark knifed through for the touchdown with 6:30 left in the third period. Again Jackson was stopped on the two-point conversion.

With 6:19 left in the game, Jackson blasted over the right side from two yards out, and he also got the two bonus points for what turned out to be the final 36-22 score.

Less than a minute of playing time later the Goldthwaite coach took his team from the field.

Athletic Director Mickie Huffman said he and his coaches feel good about the season, and think the first steps in building a solid, winning attitude have been taken. He added of his Buffaloes, "I've never been associated with a finer group of young people."

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WTU Asks Higher Rates For Electricity Sold 14 Co-Ops

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in wholesale rates for electric energy it supplies to 14 rural electric co-operatives and one municipality.

The increase would average 10.6 per cent, and for most of the co-ops would be the first increase in base rates in 15 years. Most of them have been buying power from WTU under contract initiated in 1965.

WTU, in its filing with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, estimated that the increase would amount to \$2,261,349 in additional revenue for the Company during the 1980 calendar year.

The increase would be effective January 1, 1980. All of the existing co-op contracts expire on December 31, 1979. The contract with Sonora, which is the municipality involved, expires December 31, 1983, but contains provisions for rate changes.

W. P. (Bill) Sayles, WTU's vice president for customer services, said rising costs of providing service made the increase necessary. "Fifteen years without an increase is a long time," he said, "especially in a period of inflation."

He said the proposed rate structure is designed not only to bring charges to wholesale customers more in line

with WTU's increased cost of service, but to encourage the co-ops to level their loads.

This incentive is provided in a demand charge, based on a ratchet clause which allows WTU to bill these wholesalers for up to 80 per cent of their peak demands over a 12-month period and helps level costs over the year. It also gives them the opportunity to actually decrease the unit cost of electric energy and minimize costs to their customers by shifting load to off-peak periods.

"We chose the demand charge because we feel it will be beneficial to the co-ops and their customers, and to the overall efforts to conserve energy."

"Without such a provision there is no incentive or benefit for the wholesale customers to implement load management programs."

Sayles said the proposed new contract had been discussed with all of the co-op managers and their engineering consultants before the filing was made with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.
