Monday Last Signup Day For Tax Relief

Persons applying for homestead, elderly or disabled and agriculture use tax relief are advised that Monday, March 31, is the deadline to make application.

Cross Plains Independent School District grants ad valorem tax discounts of \$5,000 on homesteads, \$10,000 to elderly, 65 and over, or disabled, and agriculture use exemption. Application may be made at the School Tax Office at the high school.

City of Cross Plains grants a homestead exemption of \$5,000 to persons 65 or over or to the disabled regardless of age. Requests for city reductions should be made at City Hall.

It was emphasized that application for any of the reductions on taxes must be made each year.

Spring Begins Here As Rain Is Needed

Spring began last Thursday, and Cross Plains and area began the renewal of life time on a note of needing life-sustaining moisture.

Apparently there is seasoning below the surface, for most small grain fields look good at present but need moisture now. Grasses are greening in pastures, but need a push from rain.

Many fruit trees have or are in the process of blooming, and there has been no cold weather to freeze them, but again moisture is needed to continue progress of the fruit development. Weather observers caution, however, that danger is not past as last February thunder was heard twice meaning there will be frost in April. Other trees will be blooming soon.

Local gardeners are busy readying for vegetable planting with most of them having already planted hardier plants such as onions and potatoes.

More than a month has passed since this area was blessed with measurable rains. Several sandstorms kicked up by numerous windy days in March have helped to deplete ground moisture. Stock water in earthen tanks is also dangerously low in some areas.

Since dry conditions have persisted so long, the danger of fire is greatly enhanced. All persons are urged to be extremely cautious when lighting

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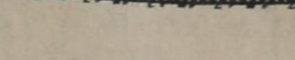
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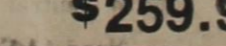

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

stitute in Galveston treated approximately 400 severely burned children (with only one fatality).

The Shriners Burns Institute gives its treatment and care to all burned children of all races and creeds with absolutely no cost to patient or parent. The Burns Institute in Galveston is one of America's 21 Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children. Eighteen of these hospitals are orthopedic units.

Once the individual "Have a Treat! Help a Child!" Day contributions from each of the participating Dairy Queen restaurants have been assembled, Doris Richeson of Graham, 1980-81 president of the Texas Dairy Queen Trade Association, will present this gift from TDQTA to Charles J. Claypool of Dayton, Ohio, the Shrine's current Imperial Potentate; C. Victor Thornton of Fort Worth, the chairman of the Shrine's Board of Trustees; and Gene Bracewell of Atlanta, Ga., the imperial oriental guide on the national Imperial Divan.
