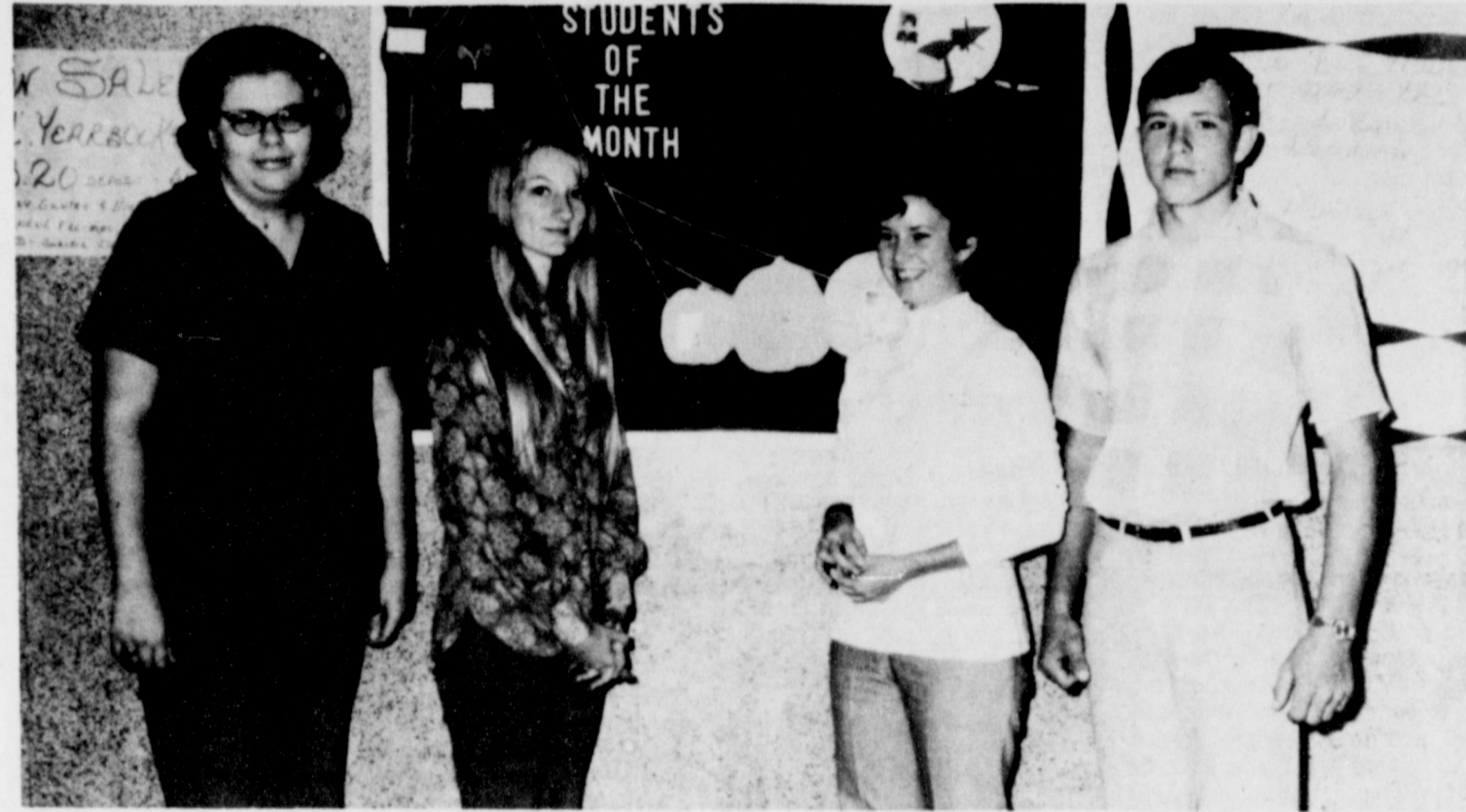

The Castro County hospital district was authorized by an election in 1960 at which time a bond issue of \$225,000 was also approved. Construction was started in 1963 and this was the first year that taxes were levied. On a particular piece of farm land which had an appraised value of \$6980.00 at a rate of 30¢ the taxes were \$20.94. This figure remained constant until 1967. In 1968 another bond issue of \$135,000 was approved. Then -----

68	6980	45¢	31.41
69	6980	50¢	34.90
70	7850	60¢	47.10

Notice that there was a five cent increase in the rate each year but in 1970 this wasn't enough so the valuation was raised also. The article in your paper stated that the Castro district showed a profit last year. The above figures show

that any "profit" came out of the tax payers pocket.

With a total bond issue of only \$360,000 look what happened to taxes. 225% increase in 8 years! Will the taxes increase 225% in the next 8 years? If so the taxes on this property in 1979 will be \$103.97. If a county or city cannot meet its bond payments a Judge will come in and tell the county how to make the payments. It happened in Littlefield in the early thirties. Do you want this for Muleshoe and Bailey county? Think carefully before you answer.

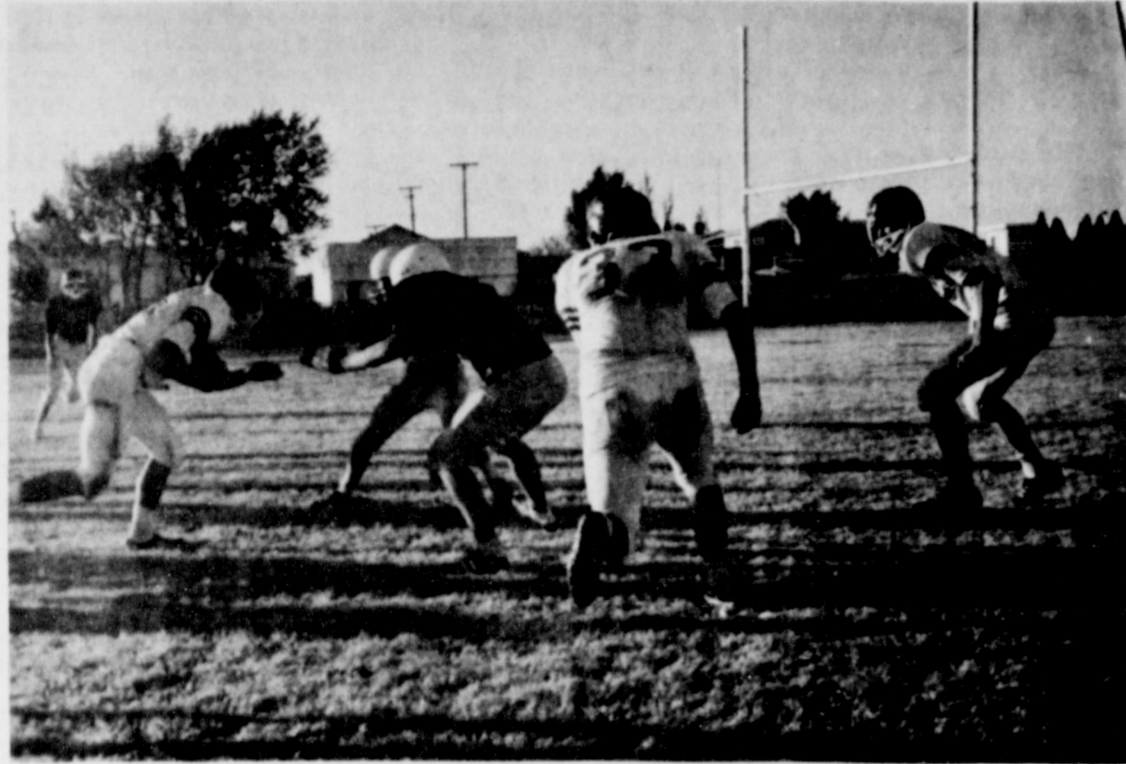

Farm Machine Operators Told To Take Care

COLLEGE STATION -- Did you ever see a man without hands drive a nail or eat an ear of corn? Some men who have lost their hands in a farm machine can learn to do many things. But, they could do these things much easier when they had two hands.

Every fall, says B.G. Reeves, Extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, many farmers lose a hand or an arm in a harvesting machine. Such complex machines as combines, corn pickers and cotton strippers afford many opportunities for the careless operator to suffer serious accidents. These machines have many moving parts -- drives, belts, conveyors, sickles, etc. These moving parts are conducive to damaged fingers, hands or arms -- sometimes lives, reminds the engineer.

A few simple rules, carefully used, can help to prevent these costly accidents. Here are a few.

Keep protective shields in place. When they must be removed to work on drives, belts, pulleys, and chains, be sure to replace them before starting the machine. Many, very serious accidents have been caused by clothing being wrapped around a drive shaft.

Be very sure a machine is not in operation when it is being worked on. Every year

an alarming number of hands and arms are hurt in cotton strippers. Being sure the machine was out of gear could have prevented every one of these accidents, reminds Reeves.

When climbing onto a machine, be careful of your footing. A recent study reveals that many operators are injured in climbing to the seat of a cotton stripper. A small spot of grease on the machine or the sole of the shoe often results in serious injury. Your hands and arms are important to you right where

they are -- a part of you. Once you lose them, there is no adequate substitute. Be very careful during this harvest season, advises Reeves, because you are needed in agriculture.

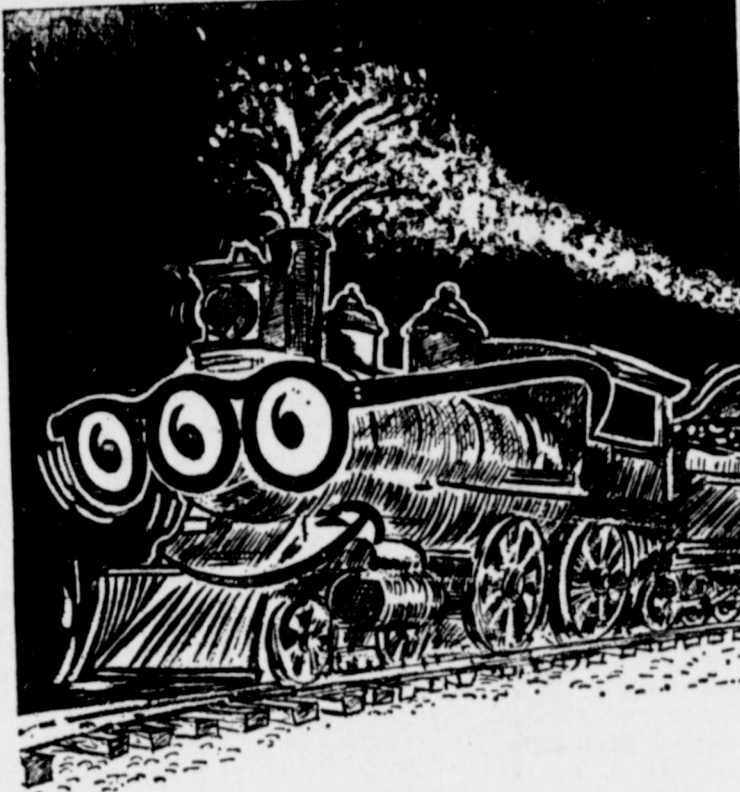

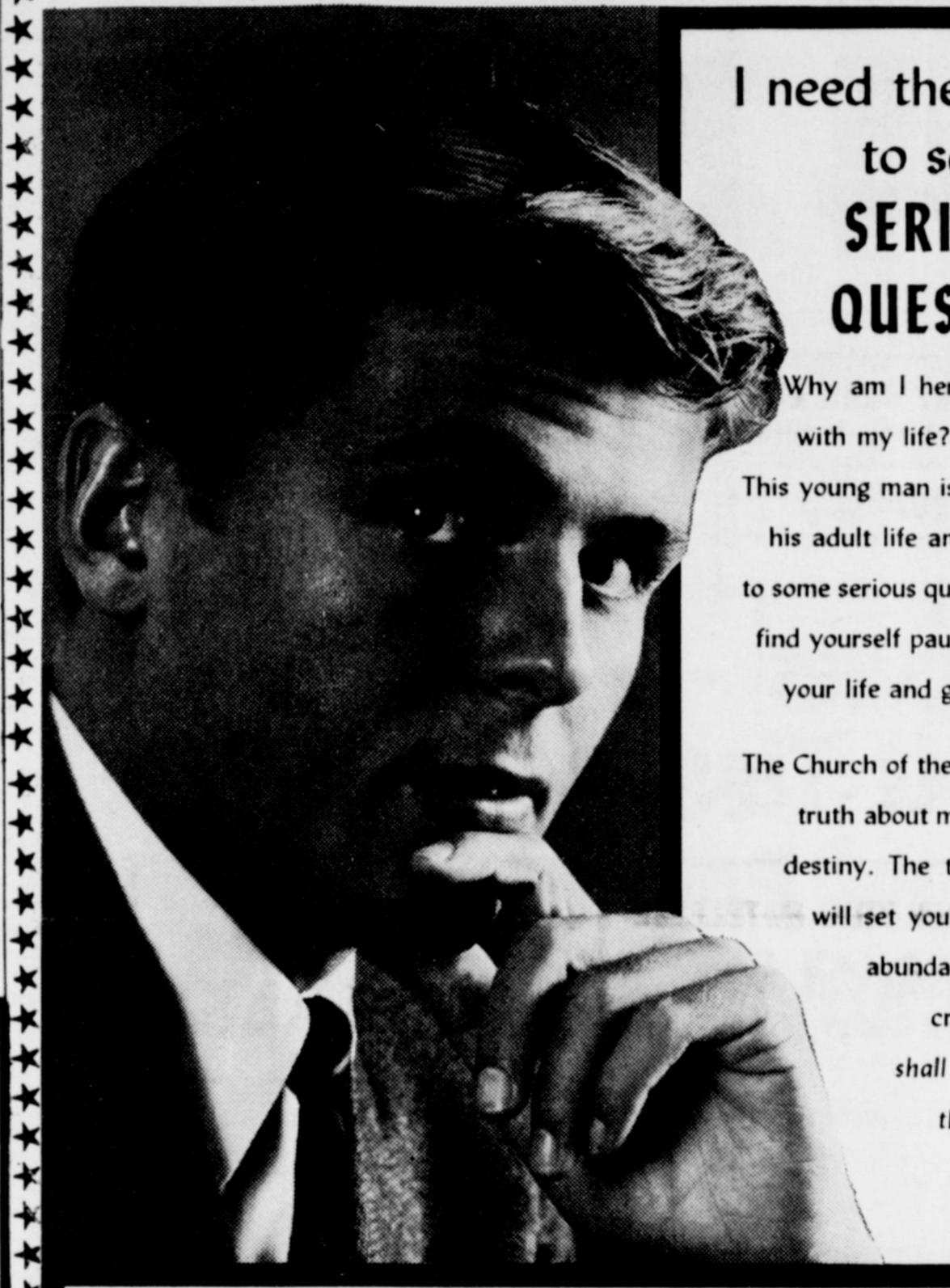
