## City, County Show Population Gains

First official figures of the 1980 census showed even more growth in Callahan County and Cross Plains than did the preliminary tabulations last summer.

In the census count released Monday the population of Cross Plains was listed as 1,241, an increase of 4.1 per cent from the 1,192 figure in the 1979 count. Preliminary figure of the U. S. Census Bureau showed the city with a population of 1,230.

Callahan County also benefited from the re-checked figures from the preliminary to first official findings of the Census Bureau. The county's population was listed at 11,039 in Monday's report, whereas it was first thought to be 10,866. The latest total is 2,834 more than was living here in 1970, an increase of 34.5 per cent.

## ANTLERLESS PERMITS DUE IN COUNTY ON NOV. 3

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits for Callahan County on Nov. 3 from 8 to 12 noon and 1 to 5 p.m. in the sheriff's office.

A map with antlerless deer permit issuance rates and issuance compartments will be posted in the Callahan County Courthouse prior to the issuance date. To qualify for at least one permit, a landowner must own or control acreage at least equal to one half of the permit issuance rate of the compartment where the tract is located.

A heavy turnout is expected for the general election to be held across the nation Tuesday, Nov. 4, to fill offices ranging from the President of the United States to precinct level or lower. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. across Texas and at eight places in Callahan County. In Cross Plains voting will be done at the City Hall.

Considerable interest has been whetted in the presidential campaign through media advertising and reports. There is also one local race which has developed in the past several weeks. Hubert M. Belew of this city is asking the post of Constable of Justice Precinct 6 on a write-in campaign. He faces Howard Hicks who won the Democratic nomination for the post without opposition last summer.

The heavy voter turnout is being anticipated in part, by reports for absentee ballots, Darlene Walker of Baird, Callahan County Clerk, noted that as of early Tuesday afternoon 63 absentee votes had been cast in her courthouse office and more than 100 others had been mailed out. She qualified the mail-out number, however, by noting that only 29 of those had been returned at that time. Absentee voting in that office ends at 5 p.m. Friday, with mail-in votes being counted through Tuesday.

Mrs. Walker said that one veteran county official stated the absentee requests this year were the heaviest he could remember.

Mrs. Bill Kilgore, election judge, Wanda Montgomery, alternate, are asking that all Cross Plains precinct voters please have registration in hand when coming to vote November 4. "I

will make the procedure much faster and more pleasant for everyone," Mrs. Kilgore stated.

Written by Juanita Daniel Zachry, the book is the story of David Rumph, who came through the Cross Plains area in 1877 looking for a place to settle. The family homesteaded in Taylor County on Jim Ned Creek.

This family produced 20 doctors, two of whom practiced medicine in Cross Plains.

Dr. John Grady Rumph practiced here from 1913-1934. The latter year he retired because of ill health. He died in Brownwood April 16, 1949, at age 60. His daughter, Ruth Lee, graduated from CPHS in 1934, married

George T. Doss here Aug. 1, 1939, and now lives in Brownwood.

Sterling Price Rumph began his practice in Carbon in 1911 and came here in 1911 and until 1919 when he re-located in private business. In 1913 he practiced in Baird until 1937.

Dr. Rumph has given two books, "Man, Woman, and Child," by Arch Segall. Others who gave books were Mrs. R. C. Ames and Virginia Callaway.

A memorial was given for Mrs. C. M. Dibrrell of Coleman by Mr. and Mrs. Henry B. Burkett.
