

## Drouth Is Broken As Soaking Rains Fall

Drouth-breaking rains cover the Cross Plains area most of last week. The moisture was of the gentle, soaking variety primarily, causing little runoff.

Totals over the Cross Plains area ranged from more than eight inches in the Sabanno sector to a little over four inches in the Cottonwood community.

The moisture was beneficial to the agricultural industry, aiding late feed, pastures and greatly enhancing small grain outlook. Producers differed on the benefit it afforded peanuts and the small area cotton crop. Some peanut farmers say it will help the crop, others say it will possibly cause problems with grades. A late frost would be helpful it is believed.

The ground in most areas was so dry that little runoff water was caught in livestock tanks. One observer said that the rain fell so that most of it was soaked up by the ground. Not much tank water was caught in the area to the north and west of this city, but tanks with good catches there caught ample water.

Cross Plains received 6.91 inches according to one gauge, and another showed slightly less. That total was for the eight-day period from Monday, Sept. 22, through Monday, Sept. 29. The moisture started slowly with just .15 inches falling on Monday, Sept. 22, and another .40 on Tuesday, Sept. 23. Wednesday passed without appreciable moisture until early Thursday morning when .70 of an inch was recorded. Almost without let-up from Thursday night

to about noon Monday 5.51 inches fell in Cross Plains. Another .15 of an inch was gauged after reading at noon Monday.

Top area rainfall was reported as 8.30 inches at the Jack Rector place in the Sabanno community. That total was since September 23.

J. T. Beggs in the Pioneer locality reported 6 inches at 4 p.m. Monday and it was still raining there then. Another gauge in the western part of the community had over 7 inches.

Les Byrd at Cross Cut reported 5.50 inches since last Thursday, and he also said that he had gauged 9 inches in September.

R. T. Watson, who lives between here and Burkett, reported 6.40 inches during the past week, and he said he had measured 8.80 inches for the month. Back in the hot, dry weather he had predicted rain in September.

Lowest total was reported by J. P. Clark at Cottonwood. He called in Monday morning and reported 4.19 inches. Explaining he emptied his gauge about 1 p.m. each day he compiled the following totals: Tuesday .19, Wednesday .18, Thursday .00, Friday .90, Saturday 1.00, Sunday 1.95 and Monday .17.

Mrs. N. V. Gibbs reported rain totals in the Rowden sector varied from 4.50 inches to about 6 inches.

Alton Tatom at Atwell said he measured just over 5 inches at his place, but about a mile west at the Freddy Tatom place about 6 inches were gauged.

## WTU Files General Rate Increase Request Here

West Texas Utilities Company has filed application for a general rate increase, Gene Rhodes, local manager announced.

The official filing was made Tuesday, September 30, with incorporated towns for retail customers within their jurisdiction and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for an increase to customers outside incorporated towns.

City of Cross Plains officials confirmed the filing Tuesday morning.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total revenue of \$12,729,619. This amounts to 8.27 per cent based on revenues of \$153,914,156 for the test period ending this past June 30.

The company requested that the new rates become effective November 4.

One of the basic reasons for the increase was cited as inflation.

"The cost of providing electric service continues to increase more rapidly than revenue," Rhodes said.

This rate adjustment would be only the second general retail rate increase in the company's entire history, which goes back more than 50 years. The other increase was in 1973 and amounted to about six per cent across the board.

"We've managed to make that six per cent go a long way," the WTU manager said, noting that every other utility company in the state, and probably in the nation, has had at least one increase since then and most of them have had several.

Several reasons were given as to how WTU has been able to manage without a rate increase during the past several years of double-digit inflation. Chief among these was the timing of WTU's power plant construction.

Its newest and largest station was completed in the mid-1970s and provided generation reserves sufficient not only to last for several years but to allow profitable energy sales to other companies.

The company also cited its reputation as a conservative company with firm control of its expenditures.

However, the WTU manager said, the company can no longer absorb the effects of inflation without risking a danger of decline in its financial condition. Of necessity, the company is entering into a multi-year construction program which will include a new coal-fired power plant and several high voltage transmission line projects.

The proposed rates were based on detailed analyses of each customer rate class, including studies of their energy usage patterns, the investment required to serve them, and the cost of operation applicable to those customers.

The company's rate structure, which now has over 125 rates for many types and classes, would be reduced to less than 30 rates. The effect of the increase on the different customer classes would vary according to present relative rates of return from each class.

For example, the typical residential electric bill would increase by about 10 per cent.

Although customer bills have risen substantially in the past few years, the increases have been the result of more usage and higher fuel costs. The average residential customer's electric usage in the WTU system increased from 6,363 kilowatt-hours in 1972 to 8,270 kilowatt-

## Bisons Clip Robert Lee 6-0; Host Roscoe Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes will be seeking a third consecutive victory when they host Roscoe Plowboys in the last non-conference contest of the year Friday. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

Last week the Thundering Herd evened their 1980 record at 2-2 with 6-0 victory over host Robert Lee in the rain. Friday's contest was believed to be the first gridiron encounter between the two schools in history.

The only touchdown of the game came with just six seconds left in the first half. Cross Plains scored when Eddie Jackson threw a halfback option pass to Split End Eugene Ford for 45 yards. Jackson was stopped short on the two-point conversion attempt.

Cross Plains took the opening kickoff and despite 40 yards in penalties, moved the ball to the Robert Lee 30 before the drive finished. The first then lapsed into a defensive battle with a wet ball causing some problems until the Buffaloes scored. The scoring blitz started when Quarterback Randy Huffman threw 35 yards to Ford to the Steer 45. Jackson then lofted the option pass to Ford with play covering the final 45 yards and getting the touchdown. Ford made a remarkable catch between two defenders and he ran into the end zone.

Rain continued to come down during the entire game. The second half was a continuation of the defensive battle with Cross Plains holding the Steers to virtually nothing offensively. Huffman's punt kept Robert Lee in bad field position most of the game. On eight punts, six of them were kicked to inside the Steer 25 yard line, with one stopping on the Robert Lee one yard line.

It wasn't a great night offensively for the Buffaloes on the ground either. With a wet field and wet ball, both teams played cautiously. The Bisons lost one fumble, but picked up three loose Steer bobbles.

The statistics sheet showed Robert Lee generated just 41 yards total offense, 23 passing and 18 running. Cross Plains collected 205 yards offensively with 158 of that coming through the air and 47 on the ground. The Steers completed only 2 of 9 aerials, and the Herd caught 4 of 7 tosses, two in the touchdown drive.

Penalties again hampered the Bisons with 6 infractions costing them 95 yards. Robert Lee was flagged 7 times for 55 yards. Herd punted 8 times for 35 yard average, and Steers kicked it 7 times for a 27 yard average.

Head Coach Mickey Huffman said, "Our young people are starting to jell real well, and the coaching staff is real proud of a great bunch of young men."

After two weeks on the road, the Thundering Herd returns to Buffalo Stadium Friday against the invading Roscoe Plowboys, second consecutive District 3-A foe.

Although Roscoe has won just once this season against three losses, the Plowboys possess a more potent offense than the Buffs, having scored 33 points against 18 for Cross Plains. Defensively the Roscoes eleven have allowed just 60 points while Bisons have surrendered 91.

In addition Roscoe was tagged in pre-season polls to claim the 3-A District championship, finishing ahead of runner-up Sterling City and third place Robert Lee. The Plowboys return 10 starters from the squad which went 6-2-2 last year losing only

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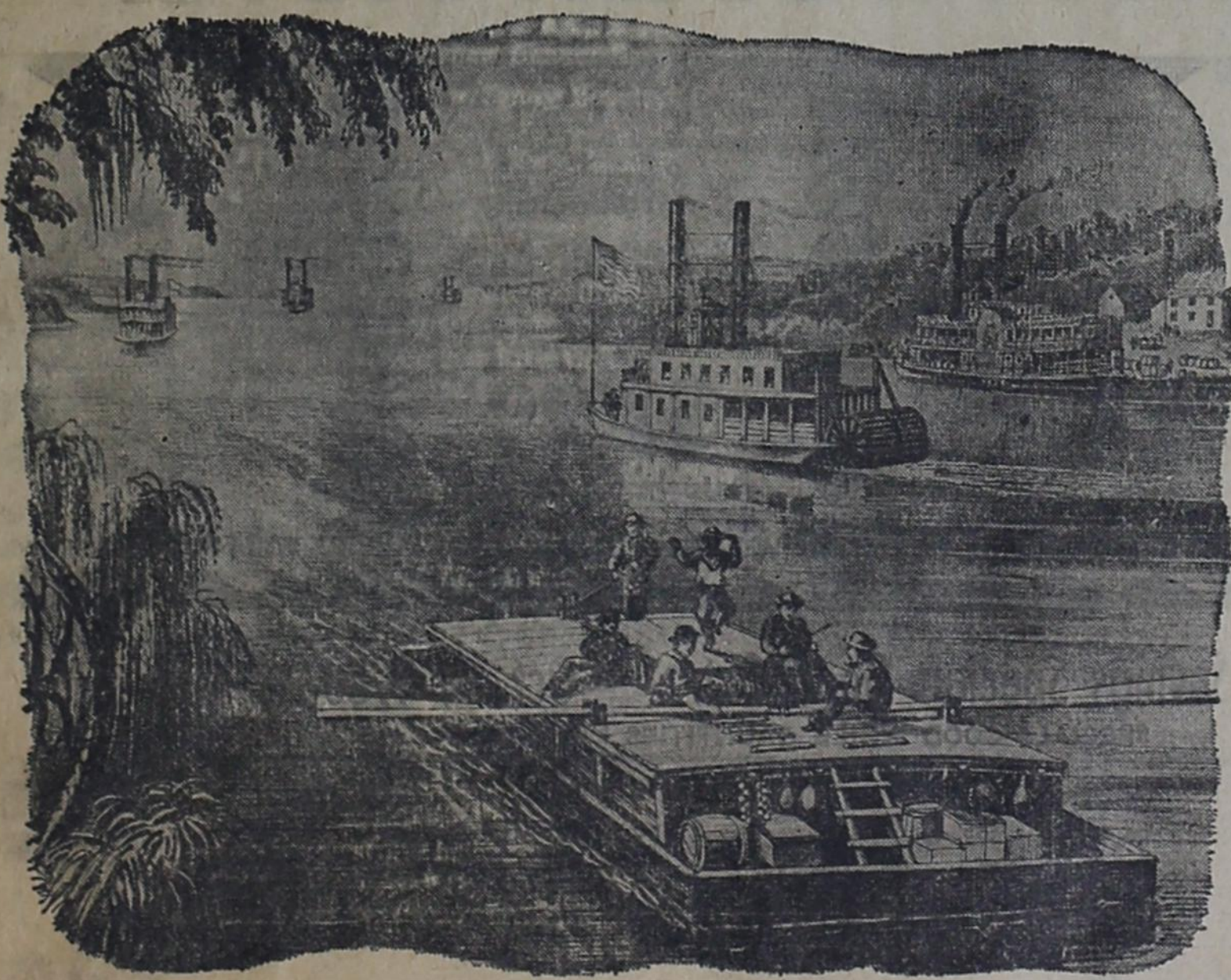
