

Baird Blasts Buffs 55-0; Albany Due Here Friday

Baird Bears proved to be rude hosts Saturday night soundly defeating Cross Plains Buffaloes 55-0 in front of a large homecoming crowd.

The defeat equaled the worst whipping the Herd has ever absorbed from the cross-county foe. In 1971 the Bears humbled the Bisons 61-6, and the 55 points scored by the District 8-AA team against the Thundering Herd equals the second highest total. In 1970 Baird beat Cross Plains 55-16. Saturday's triumph was the ninth consecutive for the Bears over the Buffaloes.

An inept Bison offense could not generate a march, managing only one first down in the first half. Numerous turnovers, lost fumbles and intercepted passes, also greatly hampered Buffalo offensive efforts. A great part of Buffalo offensive woes were caused by an alert and effective Baird defense. Buffaloes lost 29 yards rushing on the night and managed just 34 yards passing on two completions in five tries. Baird managed 20 first downs while gaining 341 steps from scrimmage and passing for 56 more yards on two completions in five aeriels.

Half the lights in the stadium went out briefly in the first half as the Herd was attempting to pass. The kick was short, and officials ruled the play be run over. The punt was blocked the second time after lights were fully restored.

The Bears scored 20 points in the first quarter beginning with a four-yard run by Quarterback Darryl Harris with just 4 minutes and 40 seconds gone in the first quarter. Kicking specialist Alan Bohannon kicked

the first of seven extra points in eight attempts. Less than two minutes later Harris passed to Flanker Sid Grant for 21 yards and six points. With 1:55 left in the first quarter Greg Austin scampered the final five yards of a 29-yard drive following a short Bison punt. Bohannon missed that point, his only error of the night, except in the second half when his 32-yard goal attempt was wide.

Baird added 21 points in the second quarter. Harris scored on a six-yard run, and passed to Grant for a 35-yard touchdown and Fullback Mike Duncan scored from 11 yards out.

Baird got its seventh tally with 9:35 left in the third when Harris scampered 39 yards on first play from scrimmage, and Duncan circled left end from 11 yards out in the fourth with 11:25 showing on the clock.

Buffaloes Lost

Buffalo tackle Wesley Hillburn suffered a fractured leg in the game Saturday. Although he is attending school, he will be lost for an estimated six weeks. The junior was the biggest player on the squad, weighing 215 pounds.

Bisons also lost services of Tony Apple, freshman back, who underwent emergency appendectomy at an Abilene hospital early Friday. He has returned home, and is reported improving satisfactorily. It was expected he would also be lost to the Herd for at least six weeks. He returned to classes on a half-day basis Tuesday.

Albany Coming

Bisons will tangle with another team from Albany on Friday.

Welcome Rain Wets Area In Widely Varying Totals

Cross Plains and surrounding area were being washed with urgently needed rains Tuesday as the Review was hurrying to press.

The immediate Cross Plains area seems to have received more than most surrounding areas. Oran Bains reported more than four inches about noon Tuesday, while a couple of hours later another report listed 3.60 inches measured Monday night, or during darkness early Tuesday, and during daylight hours to about 1:30 p.m. Tuesday. Prior to that the same gauge caught .70 of an inch on Sunday and early Monday.

Much lighter rainfall had been received to the west of the city. Mrs. N. V. Gibbs at Rowden said that just over an inch had been measured at their place on Tuesday.

Irregardless of the amount, everyone agreed that the moisture was beneficial and badly beat the hot, dry weather this area has experienced for the past several weeks.

Because of the late date of the growing season that the

rains came, how much good it will do cotton and maize crops was being debated. It was agreed that all pastures and some peanut crops will benefit greatly from the moisture. One veteran observer stated that the good rains will help dryland peanut make some nuts; probably not bumper crop, but the rain did help. Another farmer said that the moisture came in time for most Spanish peanuts to set a crop.

Late hay crops and other feed crops, such as hegari, are expected to also benefit greatly from the rains.

With a late frost and winter fall gardens will also be helped by moisture, one local resident pointed out.

Other area rain reports listed 3.50 inches gauged by Ron Bagley at Cross Cut just before 11 a.m. Les Byrd in the same community later in the day reported 3.00 inches, and explained that generally rain in that area was heavier to the east and lighter to the west of the community.

Edwin Erwin in the Sabanno sector reported that his gauge showed 2.50 inches at noon Tuesday as the total since Sunday. "I expect we've had over three inches by now," he said about 3 p.m.

The Atwell area had not received as much rain. Alton Tatom said his gauge held 1.60 at mid-afternoon Tuesday, but with the showers Sunday and Monday over two inches had fallen and light rain was still falling there.

The Pioneer Farmers Co-Op reported 3.00 inches at mid-afternoon in the Pioneer locality, and light rain was still falling.

Cottonwood had received "better than two inches" by middle of the afternoon Tuesday, and it was still raining according to

J. P. Clark. He also reported .40 of an inch fell there on Sunday.

Crops, pastures and gardens all will be greatly helped by the rain, but much more is needed to fill earthen livestock tanks in this locality. Many

tanks have dried up, and some wells in the area are reported falling. In most areas only a small amount of runoff has been caught in tanks.

Light rain was falling Tuesday afternoon as this article was being written.

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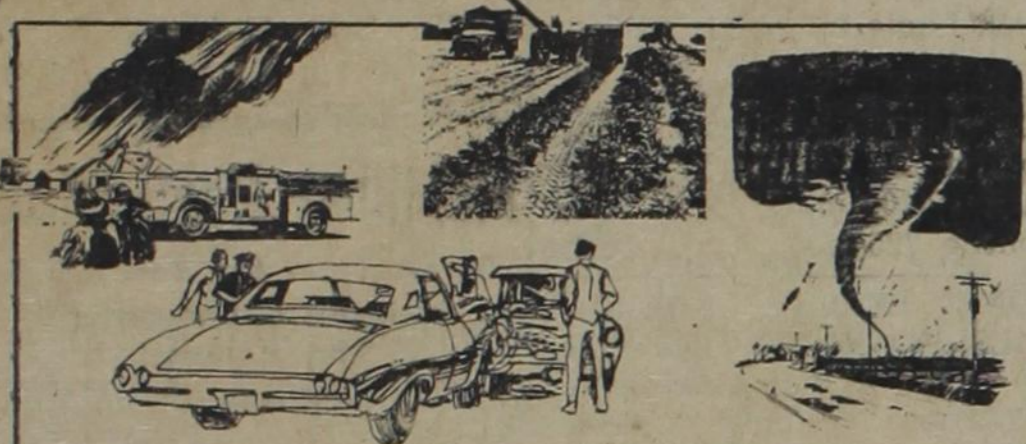

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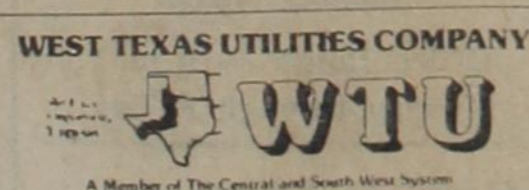

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pre-trial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

al amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."
