#### Students Reminded Of Charges In S.S.

According to Glyn Hammons Social Security District Manager in Abilene, students 18 to 22 getting Social Security checks are reminded about important recent changes that will reduce or eliminate future benefits. How students are affected will depend primarily on the type of school they are in and when benefits started:

1. If you attend college (or other post-secondary school)-payments can continue until you finish school, reach age 22, marry, or through April 1985, whichever comes first, provided you meet both of these conditions: You were entitled to a Social Security check for August 1981 when the law was changed; and you were attending (not just enrolled in) a post-secondary school full time before May 1982. However, be aware of these

You will receive no checks for May, June, July, and August even if in school full time.

You aren't eligible for cost-ofliving increases that are given aries each summer.





Attorneys for the state say they will show that TDC is providing more than the 40 square feet per prisoner that Justice ordered, but attorneys for the inmates say that is physically impossible because of the current prison population.

Justice imposed the space requirements in his 1980 order for extensive improvements at Texas prisons, which he declared dangerously overcrowded.
