To hold the primary in Bexer county will cost \$17,000 according to the estimate of the Democratic committee, and this amount must be borne by the county candidates. The assessments range from \$20 to \$950, the candidates for justice of the peace in the San Antonio precinct having to pay \$600. The cost of the primary election is by no means all the candidate must pay. Gillet No. 1 is almost due north of the old discovery gas well which was drilled by Wakefield and Mook. It is located 125 feet from the south and 450 feet from the west line of the Gillet tract. Geo. M. Vigal survey.

The second test is northeast of the second well drilled in the Cross Plains west field by L. G. Bradstreet and is located on the J. T. Sawyer land, 450 feet from the south and 620 feet from the east line.

These two tests will be watched with interest inasmuch as they are the furtherest tests to be started north of production in this field in which two sands are usually found closely together and a very high gravity oil is obtained.




