The Pride of Cross Plains, the Cross Plains High School Marching Band, is again headed to the state marching contest at Austin scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 16.

The local band won a first district rating in the UIL marching contests held at Abilene November 3, and was the only Class A band certified by judges from Region 2 to compete in the Austin contests.

The Buff band will march in the preliminary competition at 10:24 a.m. at Nelson Field which is at Burger Center in South Austin, according to information received by

Eddie Champion Is Found Dead Tues.

Funeral service for Eddie Champion, 46, of Cross Cut will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday at the Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel.

Mr. Champion was found an apparent suicide victim Tuesday morning in the Cross Cut area about 9:30-10 o'clock. This newspaper could not contact the Brownwood Peace Justice for an official ruling on the death. He was discovered by Dale Crawford, West Texas Public Utilities Company employee here, who summoned local lawmen who, in turn, alerted Rown County officials.

Officiating the final rites will be Charles Butler, minister of the Cross Plains Church of Christ.

He was born Carl Edward Champion in Cross Plains Aug. 28, 1936, and he married the former Alice Parsons Sept. 17, 1960, at Sabanno. They had lived at Dumas 17 years before moving back to this area a few years ago.

Survivors include his wife, Alice, of the home; one son, Eddie Carl Champion of Burkett; a daughter, Elizabeth Scott of Sabanno; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Champion of Cross Plains; four sisters, Joyce Parkinson of Grand Prairie, Borita Champion of Cross Plains; Zonna Mosley of Abilene and Dorothy Mosley of Sundown, and several aunts and uncles.

Clyde Crash Is Fatal To Ex-Local Resident

Funeral was held at 2 p.m. Sunday for Mrs. Bobby Newton (Glenda Bennett) Strange, 35, of Clyde, formerly of Cottonwood and Cross Plains, at the First Baptist Church at Clyde.

Mrs. Strange, who attended Cross Plains Schools, was killed apparently instantly in the collision along a straight stretch of FM Road 18 near Elm Dale Road about 2 miles east of Abilene, according to Department of Public Safety Trooper Floyd Sanders. He said, "It was a head-on collision."

Mary E. Little, 77, of Abilene was reportedly stunned by the impact which happened at 10:35 a.m. She was not believed seriously injured, as was first thought.

Mrs. Little was pulled from the interior of her vehicle by Kent Stennett, 22-year-old highway department worker of Baird, and a 70-year-old Clyde rancher, B. C. Miller.

Officiating the final rites was the Rev. Randy Hatfield of the Cherry Heights Baptist Church at Clyde. Burial was in the Clyde Cemetery.

Born Feb. 22, 1947, in the Cottonwood Community in Callahan County, she lived in Cottonwood until she was 14, when she moved to Colorado City. She married Bobby Newton Strange Nov. 22, 1965, in Clyde. She was employed by the City of Clyde. She was a member of Cherry Heights Baptist Church.

Her father died in 1966, and a brother died in October.

Survivors include her husband; three sons, Scott Bradley, Bobby Dean, and Timothy Lee, all of the home; her mother, Eva Hart of Clyde; three brothers, Weldon and Jerry Bennett, both of Big Spring, and Billy Bennett of Haskell; and a sister, Laverne Niggar.

As a team Cross Plains logged 10 first downs to 10 for Rising Star. Rushing yardage favored the Bisons 413 to 56, and total yards also tilted to Buffaloes 449 to 128. Passing, however, went to Rising Star 72 to 36 on 5 of 25 and 3 of 8, respectively. Penalties were virtually even with Cross Plains drawing 6 for 60 yards, and Rising Star 5 of 25.

Athletic Director Mitchell Ache said that after the first drive, the defense played a good ball game.

Tommy Johnston was the leading ground game picking up 174 yards on 16 carries. Other statistics were reported as Koenig 80 yards on 12 totes, Tony Apple 77 yards on 16 carries and Martin 76 yards on 13 carries.

Bisons will end the season at Lometa Friday. The Hornets were originally figured to finish ahead of the Bisons in league standings, but a down year has deprived the team of its usual offensive effectiveness until now. Friday's hosts are 1-7-1 on the season.

Rising Star kicked off to the Mites to start the second half. Cross Plains fumbled, and the hosts recovered on about the Mite 30. Rising Star went in to score to make the score 6-3 after the hosts failed to convert successfully after the touchdown.

On the return kickoff Mite Darin Apple ran the oval back 60 yards for the touchdown, behind Shane Bubenik's key block which sprung Apple. A two-point conversion try failed.

Leading 14-6 Cross Plains kicked, and Rising Star ran it back to the Mighty Mite 10. On the second play Rising Star fumbled, and Cross Plains recovered on the three-yard line. From that point Mites pushed the ball toward the Rising Star goal on running of

Fullback Ronnie Pope and Quarterback Troy Harris. On the final tally DeShazo broke loose for a 30-yard run early in the fourth quarter. Again a two-point conversion attempt was not good.

Junior High School Head Coach Wack McConal said, "It was a unified team effort." All Mighty Mites played in the contest, and he said, "Our offense played good fundamental football."

Change Name On SS Card Is Harder

"Changing your name on your Social Security card is a little more complicated than it used to be," stated Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. Although the service is still free, evidence substantiating the change of name is now required he explained.

This means that when a woman marries and changes her name, she must submit a copy of her marriage certificate to Social Security with her application for a new card. "Although the original or a certified copy of the marriage certificate is required, it will be returned," stated Hammons. State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams

Now that the dust has settled on the recent election which swept Mark White and his slate of Democrats into office, Capital observers are quietly wondering whether outgoing Gov. Bill Clements will call a fourth special session next month.

Clements told reporters that he had no plans for another special session to wrap up redistricting, but the speculation continues in more than a few circles.

Thought to be behind the move for another session is the powerful Austin lobby, perhaps the biggest loser of all in the balloting.

Most members of "The Lobby," as they are collectively known, openly supported Republican candidates over Democrats and with good reason. The conservative membership of the past two Legislatures has voted in agreement with lobby positions with great consistency.

The lobby has two great friends: Clements and Texas Speaker Bill Clayton, who worked together to produce legislation decidedly pro-business. Some called it anti-consumer.

The Clements - Clayton - lobby team had more than enough clout to powersqueeze Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's leadership in the Senate.

Pro-Consumer Solons

All will change come January 11, when the next session of the Legislature convenes in Austin. The membership in the House, but more particularly the Senate, will be decidedly more moderate, more prone to look at the problems of Texas consumers.

For that reason, some lobbyists and GOP leaders are suggesting Clements call a special session for December to take care of a few special items of business before the moderates take office.

One item could be the finishing touches on the redistricting plans,

which the courts have ordered corrected.

Clements has yet to appoint a successor to retiring Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Joe Greenhill, but he might trust the present Senate, not the new Senate, to vote the needed confirmation.

And before he leaves office, Clements may want to appoint Clayton to an influential post. Clayton, who is out of favor with his Democratic party, might prefer to seek his confirmation also with the old guard.

The New Guard

The advent of Mark White as the new governor definitely marks the end of the old, the start of the new.

The old guard put almost all their financial backing on Clements and Clayton-backed Republicans, and they lost.

No Lobby Ties

White, who struggled for campaign dollars up to the very end, has a unique opportunity to enter the Governor's Mansion unencumbered by political promises to the lobby.

This is in sharp contrast to Clements, who soaked up most available campaign funds and spent a record \$12 million-plus in losing. Or to Clayton, who routinely kept his campaign coffers filled, and who had no trouble replenishing them after Briab.

And while it is true that the lobby will always be able to muster more money to buy influence at the State Capitol, they will have much ground to make up. The lobbyists who unashamedly led a cheering squad for losers on election night in the Secretary of State's Office may find themselves without much influence in the Legislature in January.

In fact, some observers feel their bosses may find it helpful to replace them and start fresh with the new legislators.

Presidential Timber?

Democrats showed unbelievable unity in this year's election, and while every team on the ticket pitched in, much credit is given to the top Democrat on the ballot, U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

While Clements refused to campaign with other Republicans, Bentsen used his great resources to bolster every spot on the slate below him.

As a result, Bentsen now enjoys more popularity within his party than ever before.

It is not unlikely that with presidential elections just two years away, a grateful Texas Democratic Party might swing its weight behind Bentsen as a favorite son.

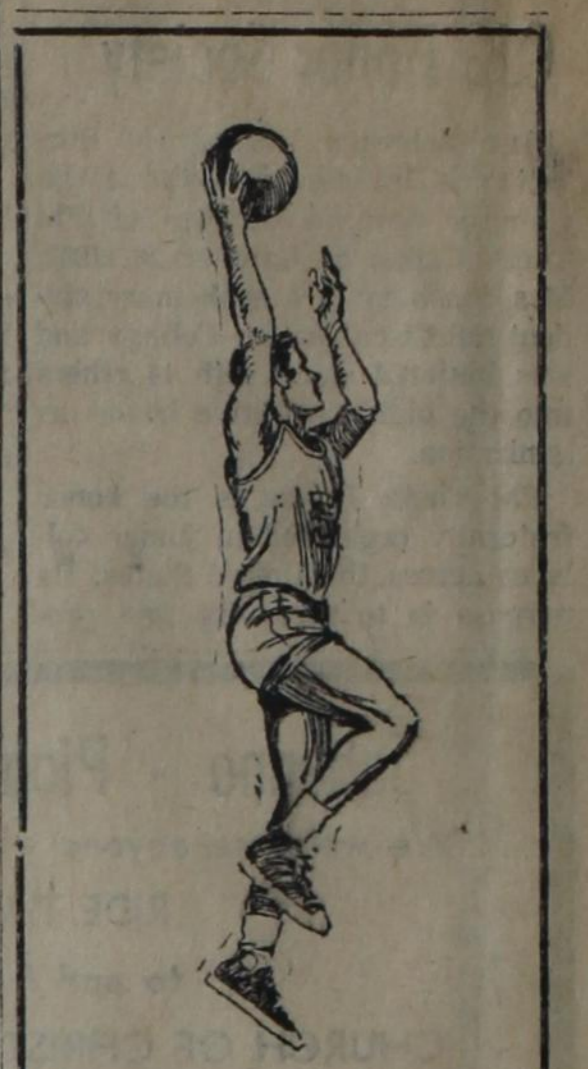
C. M. BOATRIGHTS MAKE QUICK SOUTH TEXAS VISIT
