

Peanut Acreage Reapportioned

The final date to release or request peanut acreage for 1966 is April 4th. As of this date, the requests exceed the released acreage and if a drastic turn of participation does not occur, we are going to have a large number of disappointed peanut farmers.

Help is needed to secure the release of adequate peanut acreage to grant every request on file. Each producer requesting additional acreage should contact his neighbors and encourage them to release their acreage where they do not intend to plant it. Our record show that each year considerable acres is not planted or released and with the help of active peanut producers, we hope to secure the release of this acreage.

Cotton, Grain Crops Must Be Planted In A Workmanlike Manner

It is very important that each producer participating in the 1966 annual programs completely understand that in order to be eligible for payments, the crop must be planted and farmed in a workman-like manner with the expectation of producing a normal crop. This means that land preparation, planting, and cultivation of the crop must be the method normally followed by farmers in the community.

Any acreage which the county committee determines was not planted in a workmanlike manner will not earn full diversion or price support payments or be counted as planted acreage.

In making this determination, the committee will consider seed bed preparation, manner and time planted, variety and pounds of seed used, replanting if necessary, and method of cultivation and care the crop received.

Final Date To Sign Up In 1966 Farm Programs

Farmers interested in signing intentions to participate in either the wheat, feed grain, or cotton programs for this year are reminded that April 1 is the final date for accepting agreements.

Funds for accepting requests to retire allotted or base acreage under the Cropland Adjustment Program are adequate at this time. The acreage ceiling for peanuts has been reached, but we can accept applications to divert wheat, cotton or feed grain acreage. The term of contracts under the CAP is for 5 or 10 years.

Mental Health Conference In Lubbock March 28-29

The third in a series of mental health conferences will be held at the KoKo Palace in Lubbock, March 28-29. The subject of this meeting will be "Illness - A Family Crisis." The conference is open to professional nurses, professional nursing students, psychologists, teachers and counselors.

Hildegard E. Peplau, R. N., Ed. D., Professor in Nursing and Director, Graduate Program in Advanced Psychiatric Nursing, Rutgers University, will be the featured speaker for this conference.

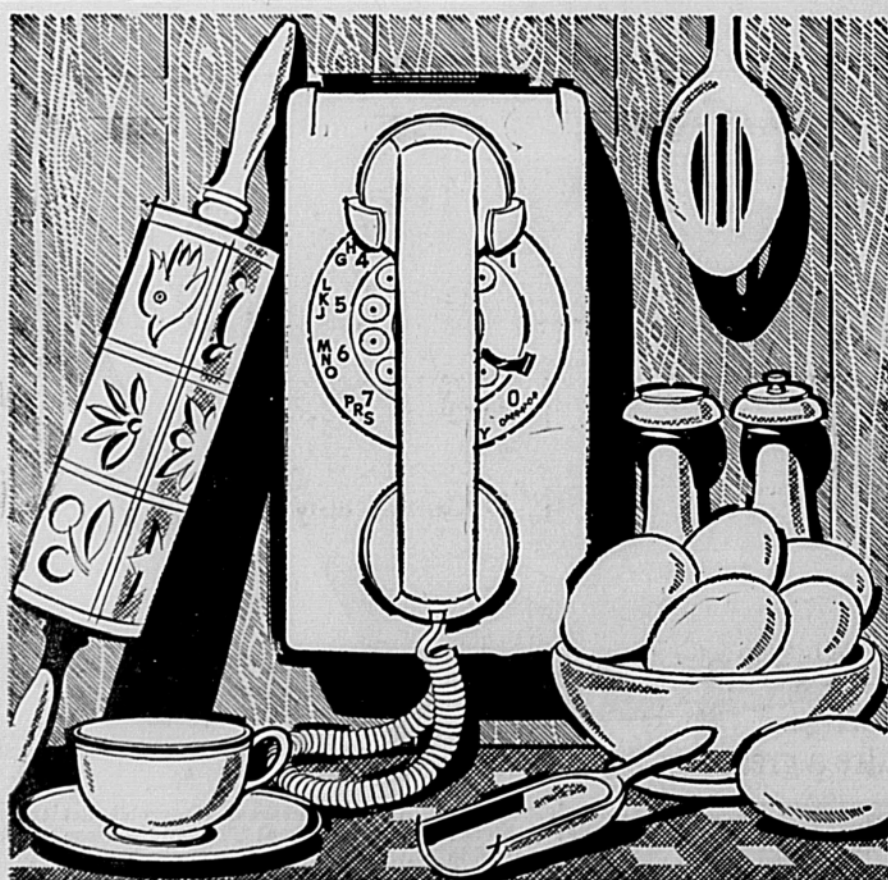
