A nationwide poll, conducted recently by the Gallup organization, shows that most Americans have varied, but favorable, attitudes toward agriculture, according to word from Cong. Charles W. Stenholm's office in Washington. Among the findings in the

poll were: Americans think farmers are hard workers and are

underpaid; . Three-quarters of Americans believe government assistance to farmers should be maintained, but they disagree which form

that assistance should take; * Although they have favorable attitudes toward farmers, few people would pick agriculture as a job for themselves or their children. Only truck driving ranks lower than farming as an occupation parents want their children pursue;

 Thirty percent believe the average farmer makes more money than they do, although they greatly overestimated the average farm income. The average guess for a farmer's income was \$24,000, more than double the actual \$11,749.

FLUIDS

Change the engine oil and filter every 7,500 miles or at least once a year: Check fluid levels in the transmission, power steering and brake master cylinder to insure your safety. Replace the engine coolant every two to prevent years overheating.

Veterans' Service Officer

Explains Program

When the Fall semester 1985 commences about August of this year, a number of children of wartime veterans will be eligible to enter into courses of education on training beyond the high school level. According to Patt Brandon, Veterans Service Officer for Callahan County, these children of veterans may receive sufficient monetary benefits from the U.S. Government to pay for their

higher education. Eligible for educational benefits under current Veterans Administration laws are the children of veterans who are permanently and totally disabled due to disabilities which were incurred in military service. Also eligible are children of veterans who were totally diabled at time of death, or whose deaths were caused by service-

An eligible child may attend the school of his or her choice so long as it has been

connected disabilities.

approved for VA programs. The child can enroll for full time or part time programs, and will be paid accordingly. The monthly benefit for a child enrolled in a full time course of training is present-

ly \$376. Enrollment at threequarter time pays \$238 monthly, while one-half time pays \$188 per month. Any enrollment at less than onehalf time provides only for reimbursement of the costs of the course. Enrollment can be in a college degree program or any vocational or trade course that is approved for VA training.

Children or parents seeking information on eligibility for VA educational benefits should contact their local Veterans Service Office.





Line Charge A \$1 per month Subscriber Line Charge goes into effect on June 1, for all residental and single-line business customers. The new monthly fee was ordered by the Federal Communications (FCC). Commission Business with multiline telephone service have been paying \$6 per month Subscriber Line Charges

since May 25, 1984. Subscriber Line Charges were designed by the FCC to be paid by all telephone customers as part of their regular monthly phone bills. This fee helps pay for the cost associated with the line connects each customer's home or office to the telephone network

Until now, much of this cost was recovered in the rates customers paid for long distance service. The FCC however, ordered this practice be phased out to reduce the incentive for large telephone users to bypass the long distance network with privately owned systems. Bypass increases the cost of service to the remaining customers. The commission decided that Subscriber Line Charges would be a sound and fair way for local companies, such as Contel, to recover these costs from their customers. The FCC is expected to approve a reduction in interstate long distance rates to offset the

The current plan calls for \$1 per month charges to be applied to the monthly phone bills of all resdential and single-line business customers starting in June, with an additional dollar being applied in June 1986. The monthly fee will be capped at \$4 until 1990.

4-H Fashion Show Set For June 11

The Callahan County 4-H Fashion Show will be held at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, June 11, at the Clyde Senior Citizens Center.

Ms. Tedra Ulmer, Extension Agent-Home Econimics for Callahan County, announced that judging will take place from 9:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m., with modeling of garments for the audience to take place at 10:30.

Participation in the clothing project was up considerably from last year, said Ulmer, and several 4-H'ers are expected to compete with the garments they have constructed. Two juniors (ages 8-11), two intermediates (ages 12-13) and four seniors (ages 14-19) will be eligible to compete at the District 4-H Fashion Show June 24 in San Angelo.

Ulmer explained that the 4-H'ers attended a day-long workshop, then sewed on a individual basis with leaders. This year, each workshop participation practiced sation removal, learned about color, fabric, and pattern selection, and construction a fashion sash.

"The sashes, which cost approximately 50 cents to make, retail for \$5 or more in the stores," said Ulmer, who credits the 4-H leaders for making this year's project a success.

Disability Under SSI Explained

The definition of disability under the supplemental security income (SSI) program is generally the same as under the Social Security disability program - that is, a physical or mental impairment that prevents a person from doing any substantial work and that is expected to last at least 12 months or to result in death. The definition applies to individuals 18 or older.

A disabled child under 18 may also be eligible for SSI monthly payments if his or her disability is a severe as one that would prevent an adult from working, and if it is expected to last at least 12 months or result in death. A

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retarded adult or a retarded child may also be considered disabled under the law.

Regardless of age, a person may be eligible for SSI benefits if his or her vision is 20/200 or less if his or visual field is limited to 40 degress or less with the best corrective lenses. Even if a person's visual impairment is not considered serious enough to fall within the definition of blindness, it may still be considered serious enough for the person to be considered disabled for SSI purposes.

The decision as to disability or blindness is made by an agency of the state in which the applicant lives.

Additional information about SSI benefits as a blind or disabled person may be obtained from any Social Security office.



Plot Markers Are Being Moved In Cemetery Here

There are problems in the Cross Plains Cemetery with burial plots not being adequately marked and with markers being moved or entirely removed.

Jimmielee Payne, president of the Cross Plains Cemetery Association, has reported that there recently have been occasions when a lot was chosen, only to find that it had already been taken but was not marked. It has also been reported that some markers have been moved or entirely done away

Anyone who is interested in, a plot in the Cross Plains Cemetery that is not permanently marked, that is with a large headstone or curbs or both, are asked to check on the markings that are there, if any.

"We have had reports of the metal markers put at grave sites by funeral homes being moved or having disappeared, and small foot grave markers have been reported moved," Payne stated. "The cemetery board urges anyone with plots not permanently marked to check on the status of the lot," he explained. Payne advises that sites of graves not permanently marked should be reported to the cemetery board so they will not be lost and cause problems later.

"We continue to urge permanent marking of all lots in the Cross Plains Cemetery," the board president stated.


