> That story was read by Mrs. Doyle Cowan of Abilene, formerly of Cross Plains. From the description of the ring he found used by the paper, "Daingerfield High School, 1967," with initials "GLF" inside, she knew who lost it 14 years ago.

It seems that Gary Lynn Fomby (GLF) had graduated from Daingerfield High School with the class of 1967 about three weeks before he came to work in the oil fields with her son, Tommy Cowan. Fomby stayed with the Cowans that summer and lost the ring. Exhaustive searches were made, the ring escaped notice.

Barnett located the object at the corner of the concession stand near a telephone pole under about two inches of earth. It had not been damaged during those years it was covered at the local teenage baseball park.

Fomby played football for Stephen F. Austin State University at Nacogdoches. He coached football for awhile, but is now a certified public accountant at Hous-

Word of the finding is being sent to him, and Barnett said that he would be glad to let Fomby have it, since he intended to try to find the owner anyway.

Barnett enjoys his hobby, and comes up with unique finds. He is, from time to time; called on to use his detector to help locate metal items ranging from small jewelry items to "lost casing heads" in the oilfield.



A change in the Social Security Law that became effective March 1, 1981, will have an effect on people who delay in filing for Social Security retirement or survivor benefits, Glyn Hammons Social

Under this new law back bene- August 16 commencement, fits can be paid for no more than six months before the month of application. Under the old law the back benefits could be paid for as much as twelve months before the month of the application.






