#### Trespassing Laws Changed In Texas

With the approach of hunting season in Texas, both property owners and sportsmen should be aware of recent changes in state It spots 2,4044 feet from the south law regarding trespassing, the Texas Farmers Union states.

> A person has committed criminal trespass if he has entered or remains on property or in a building and was notified that entry was forbidden or received notice and failed to leave the premises.

The law states the notice can be any oral or written communication from the property owner or of Baird, spotting 330 feet from a person who is acting under the owner's authority. Also, any fence which is designed to contain livestock is described under Texas law as a notice to a potential

Signs which are posted on property or a building indicating trespassing is not allowed is sufficient notice of a violation.

Persons who violate the trespassing law are subject to a Class B misdeameanor if found guilty. However, if a person carries a deadly weapon in his possession and found guilty of trespassing, that violation is elevated to a Class A misdemeanor.

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
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## Cottonwood News

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
