

Renfro, Johnston Enter School Board Election

With filing deadlines today, Wednesday, in both Cross Plains School Board and Cross Plains City Council elections for names to appear on the ballot, competition has developed in one portion of the school board race.

Two additional candidates filed for full terms on the school panel during the past week. They are Rodney Renfro and Freddie Johnston, both newcomers to local politics. They join Reggy Stover, incumbent seeking a second three-year term, and Donald Strength, another newcomer, who filed previously. Other incumbents, Benny Glover, did not run for re-election.

Tom Ames is the only announced aspirant for a two-year unexpired term on the school board. He was appointed to fill the seat vacated by Richard Purvis, now high school principal, by the board last summer. Hopefuls may file with Joe E.

Hanke, Jr., school board secretary, until midnight Wednesday, March 4.

No new candidates have filed in the city council vote where three seats are being vacated. All three incumbents have filed for re-election. Asking new two-year terms are Raymond Franke, Frank Robertson and Dwayne Wilson.

Any person who wishes to file for a council post should file with City Secretary Debbie Gosnell before 5 p.m., close of business day, at the City Hall Wednesday, today.

Both elections will be held at the City Hall on Saturday, April 4.

Drawing for position on the school board ballot will be held at 10:30 a.m. Thursday, March 5, at the superintendent's office. Candidates who cannot or choose not to be present will have drawing done for them.

More than \$92,000 was paid at the premium sale for a high percentage of more than 300 entries at the annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show here in Cross Plains Friday and Saturday.

The Cross Plains steers captured the two top places in the show.

Grand champion was shown by Jo Jo Koenig, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Koenig of this community. Her top entry was the first place winner of the European Cross medium weight classification which shaded four other European Cross class winners for the championship. The local high school student sold her animal to Ken L. Horan for a reported \$3.07 per pound.

Kelli Hargrove, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Hargrove, had the reserve grand champion, second place finisher in the medium weight European Cross class. Her steer was also bought by Mr. Horan for \$3.00 per pound.

Miss Koenig showed under the Cross Plains FFA banner, and Miss Hargrove, a junior high school student, was showing as a Cross Plains 4-H Club member.

Rain Measures 4 Inches Still Falling On Tuesday

Additional rainfall was blessing the Cross Plains countryside Tuesday after slow, soaking rains had wet the territory during the week end.

One gauge in the city showed a total rainfall of four inches about 1:30 p.m. Tuesday. The same gauge registered 1.90 inches for the slow, light rains which fell over the area Friday and Saturday, seeming to end with a springlike shower with accompanying thunder about 3 a.m. Sunday.

Rainfall returned to the Cross Plains area during the early morning hours Tuesday, and showers ranging from light mist to heavy downpours had yielded another 2.10 inches of moisture to just after noon. That brought the total to an even four inches for the five days.

The moisture has been extremely beneficial to small grain

crops, which had reportedly begun to suffer, early gardens and pastures. Tuesday's rain had fallen at times hard enough to produce some runoff which is needed to fill stock tanks in the area, some of which are low.

If the old adage of "thunder in February means frost in April" holds true there will be no frost in April. However, March was only a couple of hours old before thunder was heard here.

Thus far in 1981 Cross Plains has received 5.65 inches of rain, above average. In January .90 of an inch fell here, and in February another .75 was received. A portion of the 4.00 inches measured here the past five days fell in February, but was totaled on Sunday, March 1.

Rain was still falling as the Review went to press Tuesday.

Ray Watson, 51 Is Killed In Truck Crash Friday

Raymond Earl Watson, 51-year-old resident of the Sabanno community, was killed in a one-truck accident about 3:51 a.m. Friday about a mile west of Lenorah on Highway 176.

Watson, who was driving for Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply, Inc. of this city, died when his tractor-trailer rig overturned and burned.

Funeral service was held at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains. Officiating the final rites was the Rev. W. L. Cass of Tyler.

Burial was in the Lakeview Cemetery at Winters, directed by Higginbotham Funeral Home of Cross Plains.

The Martin County Sheriff's office said Watson apparently fell asleep at the wheel of the truck when it veered off the highway, overturned and burned. Watson was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace S. E. Kennedy.

Born Feb. 15, 1930, in Pampa, he had lived in the Cross Plains area for many years. He was a telephone construction worker and truck driver. He married Sharon Gresham Dec. 21, 1952, in Winters. He was a Baptist.

He was preceded in death by three sons.

Report Changes To S.S. Office - Manager

"An increasing number of social security and supplemental security income recipients have their monthly checks sent Direct Deposit to their bank, savings institution or credit union" according to Glyn Hammons, District Manager in Abilene. "Because so many people are receiving their checks at their financial institution, it becomes very important that they report to the Social Security Administration any changes in income, resources and living arrangements," Hammons added.

Due to recent amendments to the Social Security Act, disabled and blind students over 18 who receive supplemental security income benefits may be eligible for higher benefits, since some of the deeming provisions no longer apply. This is one example of why it is important to keep the Social Security Office informed about an individual's status. If a person fails to notify the Social Security Office of changes that may affect eligibility, it may cause the person to be overpaid. Everyone receiving Supplemental Security Income is reminded that it is their responsibility to keep the Social Security Office informed of any changes in their income, resources and living arrangements.
