Whether we want to realize it, child abuse is out there. Some of our local and area residents are concerned about child abuse and have been pleading for people to get involved. In last week's column appeared a letter from Ruth Chiaponne of Clyde who is with the Callahan County Welfare Board. She stated that help was needed to stop violations against innocent children. The numbers to call are the local office at 854-1257 or the Hotline 1-800-252-5400.

This week another interested citizen left some information with me concerning an organization called Mothers (and others) Against Murder (MAAM), formed by a young mother, Stephanie Boucher of Forestburg in northern Texas. She made it her personal crusade to fight child abuse by frming an organization to work for legislation and enforcement of laws that would punish the abusers.

MAAM'S stated purpose is to research existing child abuse laws and policies and strengthen them.

The naming of the organization was the first criticism she any form, to any degree, is Murderous! she proclaimed. "Every time a child is abused, in any way, a part of that child is murdered, can never be revived, it is DEAD!"

MAAM contends that specifying Child Abuse as murder is the best, most efective means of accurately defining the whole problem.

Mrs. Boucher became outragel when a mother was found guilty of murdering her step-son and was given a 10 year prison term and fined \$10,000, but the sentence was probated. The jury foreman said, "We felt like the penalty we gave her was the maximum we could give her, and not separate her from her children." Mrs Boucher had set out to become involved with any organization that dealt along the same line as MAAM but found no statewide organization existed. That is when she determined to found MAAM.

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



#### Cross Plains Review - 6 Applying For Benefits From Social Security

Individuals who plan to retire before they reach age 65 should apply for monthly benefits no laer than the last day of the month hey want the benefits to begin, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said ccently.

"In general," Hammons said, enefits that are payable for months before a person reach-65 can begin no earlier than e month the person applies. this provision also holds true for idows and widowers who will bein receiving benefits before they turn 65."

If a person applies for benefits after reaching age 65, retroactive payments can be made for p to six months However, retroactive payments would only be due for months beginning with age 65 in which the person would have been entitled if the application had been filed earlier. To make certain of receiving all benefits due, an individual can apply as as early as three months before he or she wants to start. This would olp assure that the first payment

s received on time. in addition to the information applicants for Social Security chefits are required to submit hose applying for disability in rance benefits should have the emes, addresses, and telephone mers of doctors, hospitals, and

clinics where they were treated. However it is not necessary to wait until all the information is available before applying. The ecple at the Social Security Of fice will advise about other proofs that can be used to support an application.
