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**State Capital HIGHLIGHTS**

AUSTIN—Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, who this year came onto the statewide picture via his present prosecution of Attorney General Jim Mattax on commercial bribery charges, said recently the public is demanding a higher standard of conduct from public officials.

The image of the public official has been more than a little tarnished this year, what with House speaker Gib Lewis being fined \$500 for financial disclosure irregularities and a former legislator sentenced to prison for cattle rustling.

Now another legislator is being investigated by the House ethics committee for alleged misuse of state funds in '81 and '82. This time the legislator apparently is going to investigate the committee, too.

Houston State Rep. Ron Wilson won't say why he is doing it, but he obtained the office expense accounts of 25 other representatives and two former members.

One legislator speculated Wilson, if found guilty, was going to take a few other careers down the tubes with him. Whatever the motive, another legislator warned, Wilson may have trouble getting his targets' votes when he needs an important bill passed.

**Redistricting**

The redistricting battle is well into the end-game stages, but yet another challenge to the plan must be resolved.

This one, a joint effort by the Texas Republican Party and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, seeks to redraw district lines in Dallas County.

In 1981, the Legislature drew lines which created two GOP districts and a minority district. Later, the federal court altered the plan to produce two white Democrats and one Republican.

But with the challenge back in court again, one of those judges, controversial William Wayne Justice, has excused himself from the case. The judge dropped out after Republicans hired a Tyler attorney who had represented Jus-

tice on private legal matters.

**New Polls**

Behind-the-scenes campaigning is in full gear, as candidates jockey for funds and support in the coming May primaries, and the first of the season's major polls was released last week in Texas.

A Dallas Morning News/Gallup poll tested 1984 presidential and Senate races with the following results:

—President Ronald Reagan leads in Texas with 50 percent approval against major challengers.

—Democratic challengers Walter Mondale and John Glenn each posted 48 percent matched against Reagan.

—A Mondale-Bentsen ticket rated 50 percent against 47 percent for the Reagan-Bush ticket.

**Senate Races**

On the Democratic slate, Bob Krueger at 33 percent leads liberal Lloyd Doggett with 12 percent and conservative Kent Hance with 8 percent; undecideds, the big factors, posted a high 44 percent.

For Republicans, Phil Gramm at 46 percent had a big edge over Houstonians Ron Paul, 16 percent, and Rob Mosbacher, 4 percent.

The poll also indicated Krueger could beat Gramm today by a 50-to-32 margin.

In a surprise to many Texans, the poll also indicated Gramm would lose to Doggett by 31-to-44, but beat Hance by 43-to-41.

**Doggett, Hance, Tower**

Doggett, a feisty consumer advocate in the Texas Senate, caused much speculation about his lack of campaign funds last week when he laid off his campaign employees by about half. He held his first major Washington fund-raiser this week.

Hance, meanwhile, has shown his seriousness for the campaign battle by hiring a former campaign director to Gov. Mark White, a Washington media consultant and a Boston pollster.

U.S. Sen. John Tower was expected to be named chairman of Reagan's re-election campaign in Texas, along with five finance co-chairmen.

**Prison, Insurance Boards**

The State Board of Insurance voted unanimously last week to ban blanket accident insurance policies which many small businesses buy as substitutes for workers' compensation.

Gov. Mark White successfully backed the state prison board away from its plans to implement a prison dairy last week. The board voted to scuttle the project after White and legislators objected to the use of funds.

White reportedly was angry that his request to hire more prison guards was ignored.

## Applying For Benefits From Social Security

Individuals who plan to retire before they reach age 65 should apply for monthly benefits no later than the last day of the month they want the benefits to begin, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

"In general," Hammons said, "benefits that are payable for months before a person reaches 65 can begin no earlier than the month the person applies. This provision also holds true for widows and widowers who will begin receiving benefits before they turn 65."

If a person applies for benefits after reaching age 65, retroactive payments can be made for up to six months. However, retroactive payments would only be due for months beginning with age 65 in which the person would have been entitled if the application had been filed earlier. To make certain of receiving all benefits due, an individual can apply as early as three months before he or she wants to start. This would help assure that the first payment is received on time.

In addition to the information all applicants for Social Security benefits are required to submit, those applying for disability insurance benefits should have the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals, and clinics where they were treated. However it is not necessary to wait until all the information is available before applying. The people at the Social Security Office will advise about other proofs that can be used to support an application.

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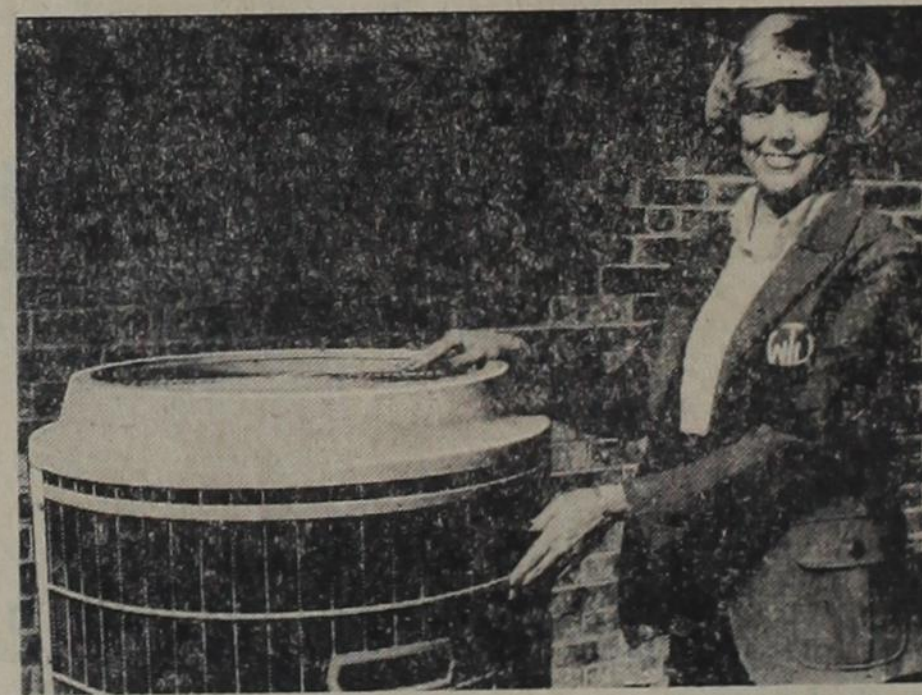
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
