

Rain Showers Fall Over Area Tuesday Afternoon

Rain showers began falling in Cross Plains Tuesday during the noon hour and fell intermittently through the early part of the afternoon.

Just before 4:30 p.m. one gauge in the township showed .80 of an inch of moisture to have been received here. Another gauge here in a different section of the city showed only .40 of an inch.

The rainfall was badly needed by most of the agricultural industry. Most area peanuts are not ready to dig, and rain of sufficient amount would possibly "make the crop." Those nearer

maturity will dig much easier. Fall gardens were hurting for moisture, as was some early planted small grains. Pastures also need moisture for late grass growth.

Cross Plains had received 23.29 inches of rain through September with 4.25 of that coming last month. Wettest month of 1981 thus far has been March when 6.22 inches fell. In both May and September 4.25 inches have been received.

Light rain was still falling as the Review went to press Tuesday afternoon.

Local gridders tallied a touchdown in the first quarter, and added two more in the latter stages of the second quarter for a 22-0 first half lead. The two units played on about even terms through the second half, with reserves seeing action much of the final quarter.

Head Coach Mack McConal and Dave Kautz both report that they are very pleased with the progress the Mites are making.

The victory upped the local squad's record to 3-1 and they are scheduled to put that mark on the line against a reported quality team at Lometa Thursday. Starting time will be 6:30 p.m., 30 minutes later than normal.

Mighty Mites wasted little time in gaining the upper hand Thursday, as Mite Right Halfback Arthur Agnew romped 50 yards off tackle for the two-point conversion, and the Mites owned an 8-0 advantage.

The second Mite touchdown came in the second quarter as Agnew scored on a 20-yard end sweep. The attempted two-point conversion failed.

Late in the quarter when Evant was trying to move through the air, defending Mite Lance Clawson intercepted a pass and re-

turned it 60 yards for another six points. Darby Nichols tallied the two-point conversion on a pass from Quarterback Devin Koenig.

Leading 22-0 at halftime, the Mighty Mites presented Pam Hutchins as Mighty Mite Football Sweetheart in ceremonies during the game break.

The lone Cross Plains score in the second half was tallied by Agnew. It was on a perfectly executed veer option play covering 10 yards. A two-point conversion attempt failed.

Local Man Trys Molasses Business In This Sector

Michael Ingram is a man who will back up his beliefs and ideas with action and necessary steps.

He had an idea that the sandy land in this area might be good for growing cane for syrup or molasses. Last year the young Cross Plains man flew to Tennessee to investigate the requirements for that type business.

While in Tennessee he learned how to process the cane and purchased a mill at considerable expense.

Last spring the 1966 graduate of Cross Plains High School planted about 20 acres of two different kinds of cane seed he bought in Tennessee, and has reaped his gasoline powered mill. He had hoped for a wet summer as his cane was not irrigated.

Ingram plans to cut the cane in about a month, before frost, a chore which must be done by hand, being careful to keep the cane clean, and in horizontal position to preserve the juice. Head must be cut off and leaves stripped from the stalk.

The cane is crushed in the new three-roller crusher which employs the lay-down method of operation, according to Ingram. The juice is caught and strained through two boxes and finally ends up in a vat 12 feet long, 44 inches wide and 8 inches deep. It is then cooked for six to seven hours until it thickens to a honey-like consistency.

Hoping to produce 500 gallons of

molasses Ingram said we'll have to see how much juice the cane has. He also looks to it possibly becoming an additional income crop for this area.

Burleson, a senior at Cross Plains High School, is being commended in the twenty-seventh annual (1982) National Merit Scholarship Program. Mrs. Bobbie Trammell, counselor for Cross Plains Schools, said that of some 1.2 million students who entered the 1982 Merit Scholarship competition by taking a qualifying test in 1980, about 36,000 are being commended this month, as they begin their final year of high school. These participants scored high, but slightly below students in their respective states who qualified as Merit Program Semifinalists. "We are very pleased that Bill Burleson has reached this outstanding attainment and feel he deserves public recognition," stated Mrs. Trammell.

Bill is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Burleson. He plans to attend Rice University or Texas Tech University next fall.

School officials ask that parents or guardians make arrangements for early return of their students on Friday.

School Bus Safety Week Being Observed Locally

National School Bus Safety Week is being observed during the week of October 4-10, and local persons are being encouraged to promote school bus safety awareness.

Distinct goals for the 1981 School Bus Safety Week are to promote awareness for the need of school bus safety procedures and further the education of the public regarding the need to stop for school buses when they are receiving or unloading pupils.

Cross Plains ISD runs seven daily bus routes with students

transported twice daily between their homes and school. Previous Texas statistics show the following:

(a) Annually approximately 867,000 pupils are transported on approximately 16,000 buses at the rate of about 630,000 miles per day.

(b) Fatal school bus accidents result in a range of 1 to 11 deaths annually in Texas.

(c) Approximately 882 personal injury school bus accidents occur annually inflicting injury to 469 bus occupants.

(d) Of the 469 persons injured, 89 per cent were students.

(e) Of the nine deaths in 1977, one was a student and eight were other than students.

(f) Of all accidents, 55 per cent occurred while the bus was proceeding ahead under actual driving conditions. Fifty-five per cent of these accidents occurred at intersections and 45 per cent occurred at locations other than intersections.

(g) Of all accidents, 75 per cent occurred in urban areas, while 25 per cent occurred in

areas classified as rural.

(h) Of the students injured or killed, 93 per cent were passengers on the bus.

Following is a list of bus safety tips and a reminder of the Mandatory Motorist Law when overtaking or meeting a school bus.

Tips for students riding school buses follow.

1. Leave home early enough to arrive at your bus stop on time.
2. Wait for your bus in a safe place — well off the roadway.
3. Enter your bus in an orderly manner, and take your seat.
4. Follow the instructions of your school bus driver or bus patrol.
5. Remain in your seat while your bus is in motion.
6. Keep your head and arms inside the bus at all times.
8. Remain quiet and orderly.
9. Be courteous to your school bus driver and fellow passengers.
10. Be alert to traffic when leaving the bus.

The Mandatory Motorist Law when overtaking or meeting school buses follows.

Texas Motor Vehicle Uniform Act requires motorists to stop when overtaking or meeting a bus which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children. Motorists are reminded that this law is mandatory when a school bus is displaying two alternating flashing red lights. Motorists shall stop, and remain stopped, until the visual signals are no longer actuated, the bus resumes motion, or the bus driver signals other vehicles to proceed ahead.

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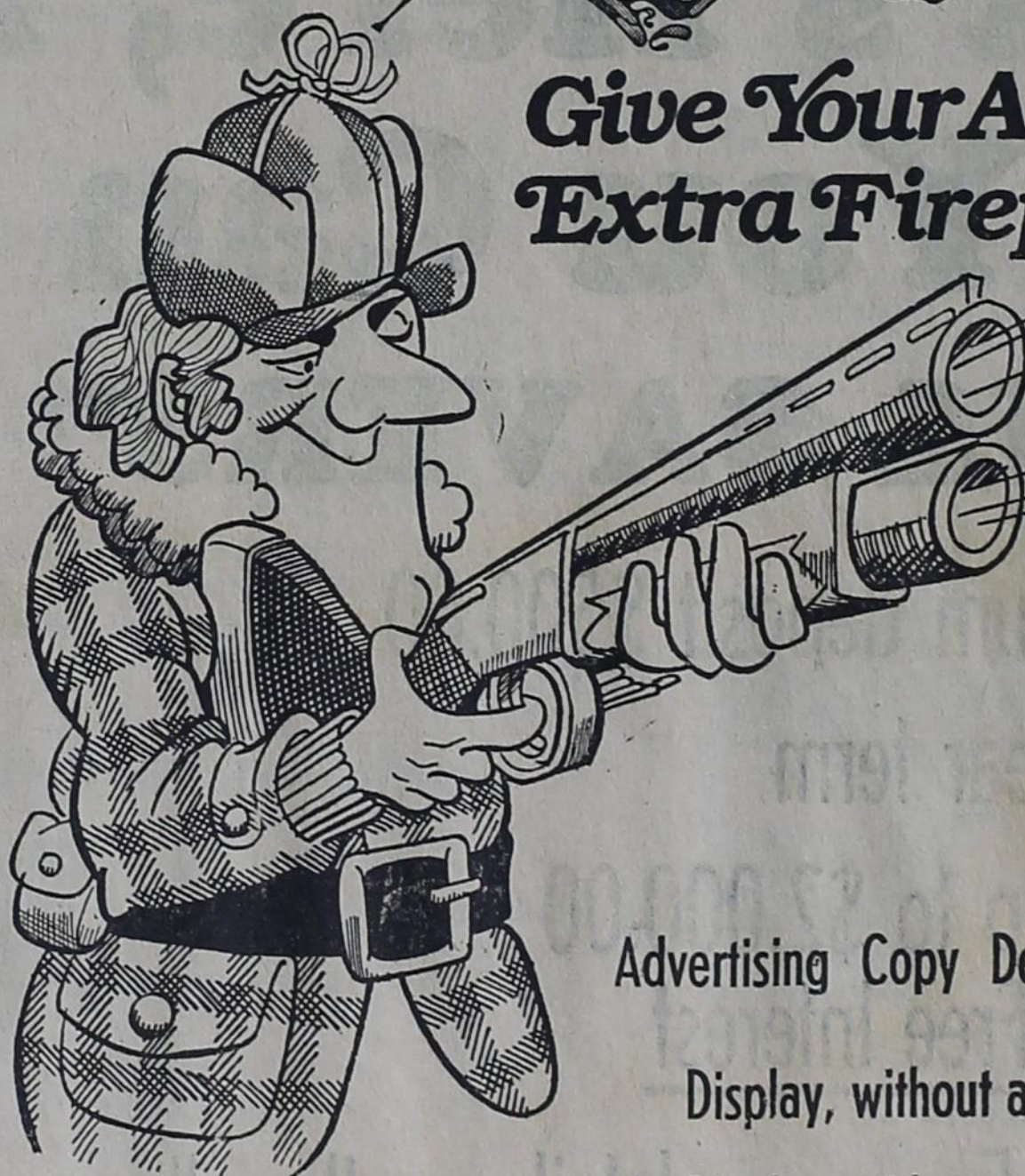
