Arnold Henson, president of the art club here, said that more divisions have been added this year, hoping to provide something for everyone. Artists from a 75-mile radius of Cross Plains are invited to participate.

Less In-Out Mail Service Here Effective Nov. 10

Cross Plains apparently will have less in-coming and out-going mail service effective Tuesday, Nov. 10, if current reductions in Star Route service are carried through.

If put into effect, Cross Plains will get no mail on Sundays and holidays, and there will be no out-going mail on Sundays and holidays. Therefore no mail will be boxed on Sundays and holidays. At the present time some mail is boxed on a few holidays, and mail comes into Cross Plains on a daily basis, and leaves on a daily basis. There are rare exceptions to that.

Postage went up Sunday, November 1, to 20 cents for a normal first class letter and 13 cents for a postal card. Other forms of mail service also were advanced.

It was believed here that cancellation of holiday and Sunday mail service in and out was not applied to all area post offices only to selected ones, such as Cross Plains. First class mail deposited here after star route carrier leaves on Saturday, beginning next Tuesday, will remain in Cross Plains until Tuesday evening when there is a Monday holiday under the new proposed curtailment of service to this post office.

Next week's issue of the Review will be a day later in arriving at destination if the proposed cut-back in service is implemented.

The varsity Mighty Mite team recorded a fourth victory of the year last Thursday 24-0 over Rising Star in unified effort on the part of the entire team.

Defensive plays accounted for the first two touchdowns for the Mites, both coming in the first half.

Safety Lance Clawson intercepted a Wilkitten pass and ran it back 40 yards for the first Cross Plains touchdown. Quarterback Devin Koenig tacked on the two-point conversion.

The second Mite tally was also by returning an intercepted aerial. Defensive End Tony Evans swiped the Rising Star pass and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown. Flanker Back Clawson got the two-point conversion on a reverse.

Mighty Mite Head Coach Mack McConal said that the team defense, run mainly by Coach Dave Kautz, did a superb job. "They were fantastic," McConal said of the unit. He added that Coach Kautz has been a great asset to the junior high program.

Offensive unit scored the touchdown in the second half. Grades Running High As Peanut Harvest Begins

Harvest of the 1981 peanut crop is moving into full swing in the Cross Plains area.

It is reported that this far grades have been real good, and yields appear to be average or above. No definite figures have been compiled by either of the two peanut processors in this area thus far concerning yields.

Grades, however, are real good. So far dryland peanuts have been grading in the 70's, and irrigated crops have been grading in the upper 70's.

One observer has estimated that if good harvest weather will hold for three weeks, the majority of the crops in this area will be harvested. Some concern is being voiced about early frost hitting and damaging the hay crops.

Although no yield figures were available, it was noted that yields are much better than was the norm last year. Thus far the crops graded locally have been qualifying for the top prices. Such was not the case last year in many instances.

Federal Panel Okays WTU Line To Run Interstate

West Texas Utilities Company and its three sister companies in the Central and South West Corporation received approval from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to interconnect with each other across state lines and operate as an integrated system.

The FERC in Washington authorized a proposal which will result in construction of electric transmission lines connecting the Southwest Power Pool with the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, which historically has operated strictly as an intrastate electric grid.

The proposal filed with the FERC for decision had been agreed to by all utilities affected, including Central and South West Corporation, Houston Lighting and Power Company and Texas Utilities Company.

Central and South West officials said the interconnection would be accomplished with construction of direct (DC) facilities near Vernon in North Texas and near Victoria in Southeast Texas. The North Texas interconnection is projected for completion in 1984 and the Southeast Texas interconnection in

1985. Construction activities are expected to begin immediately following receipt of required regulatory approvals.

Central and South West officials expect customers of the system's subsidiaries in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas to save about \$1.7 billion in reduced expenses between 1984 and 2000 as result of the interconnection.

The CSW companies have sought for several years to integrate the CSW system, but were unable to do so because WTU and Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi are members of ERCOT and have not been allowed to operate in interstate commerce.

The two other CSW companies are Public Service Company of Oklahoma, with headquarters in Tulsa, and Southwestern Electric Power Company, of Shreveport. Both are members of the Southwest Power Pool and already are engaged in interstate commerce

Eight months of Daylight Savings Time is a real possibility for the United States next year. The House of Representatives approved adding March and April to daylight savings time months to the six when DST is currently observed. Proponents contend that additional energy savings can be realized while opponents say more, not less, energy will be used if the two months are added. Critics also argue that school children would be forced to go to school in the dark, and some might drop DST.

If approved by the U. S. Senate, daylight time would begin the first week end in March and continue through the last week end in October.

The House plan will retain the provision that any state entirely within one time zone can drop the entire system if desired.

Mixed Drink Tax Nets City \$297.09

City of Cross Plains has netted \$297.09 from the state's mixed drink tax which was rebated to the city for the third calendar quarter of 1981, according to a report from State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Callahan County received \$345.02 from the state tax.

Texas cities and counties received a 15 per cent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized mixed drink sales. The 10 per cent gross receipts tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and the city-county rebates are sent out quarterly.

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
