Operator set the 2½-inch casing at 2,790 feet, five feet off bottom.

He added, "I have asked Representative Nabers to serve on the committee because he is one of our outstanding members in this area and will add a great deal to the work product of the committee."

Nabers is chairman of the House Financial Institutions and Calendars Committees.

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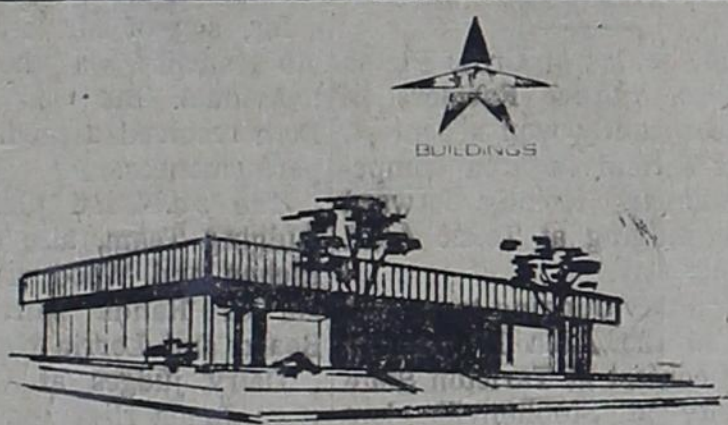

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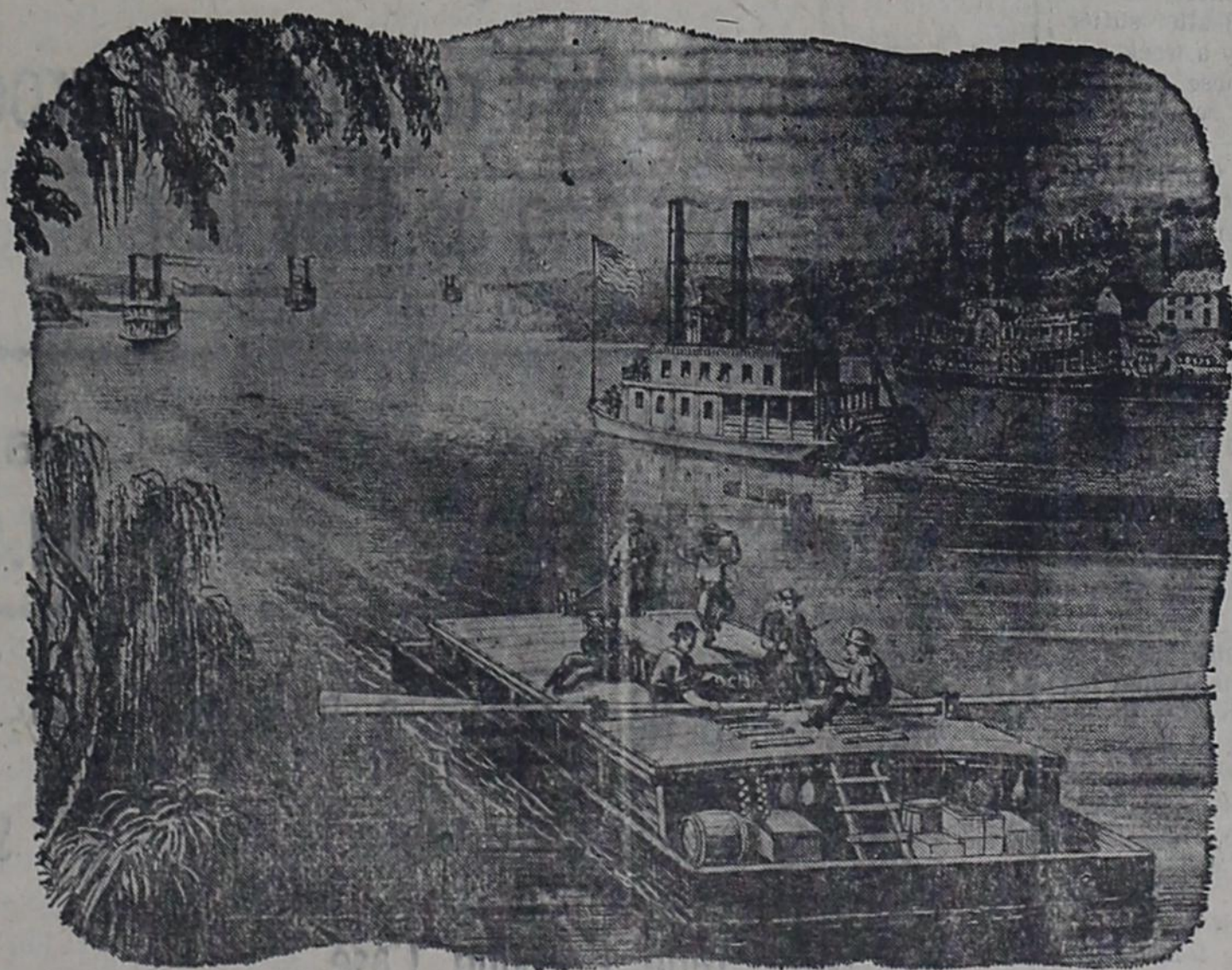

April 15 Important For S.S. Folk, Too

April 15, 1981. This date is quickly recognized as the filing deadline for federal income tax returns. However, it has an added significance for many persons who drew at least one benefit check from Social Security for 1980. Those who had earnings in 1980 in excess of \$3,720 (if under age 65) or \$5,000 (if at least age 65) must file an annual report of earnings with the Social Security Administration. The deadline for this report is also April 15, 1981. It must be made before that date or a benefit penalty may be imposed.

Persons who had previously provided SSA with an estimate of earnings for 1980 of over the allowable limits should receive an annual report form in the mail during February. However, failure to receive the mailed form does not excuse a failure to file before April 15. If a form is not received by mail it will be available at any Social Security office.

The reports are necessary to determine the exact amount of benefits due in 1980. Since the payments were made based on an estimate of earnings they may vary as being either too high or too low. SSA will make an adjustment for 1980 after the report is filed.

Though the filing deadline for annual reports and tax returns are the same they are unrelated. Filing a tax return with the Internal Revenue Service will not be sufficient to meet the Social Security annual report requirement. This must be done directly through SSA.

Darrell Collier spent the night Saturday with Matt Strickland.

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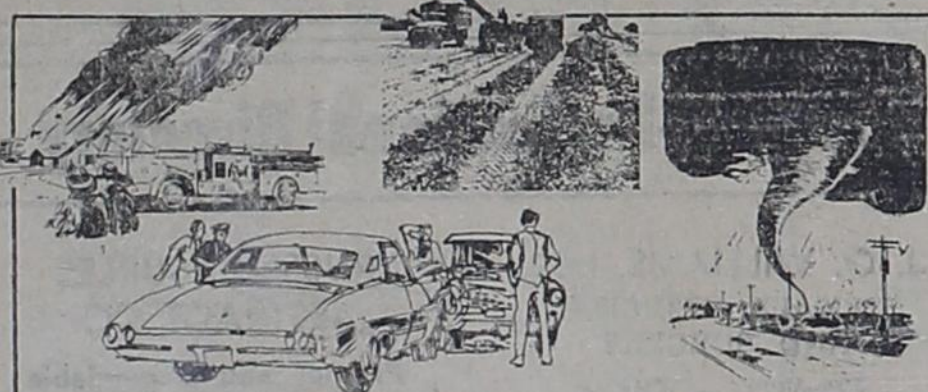
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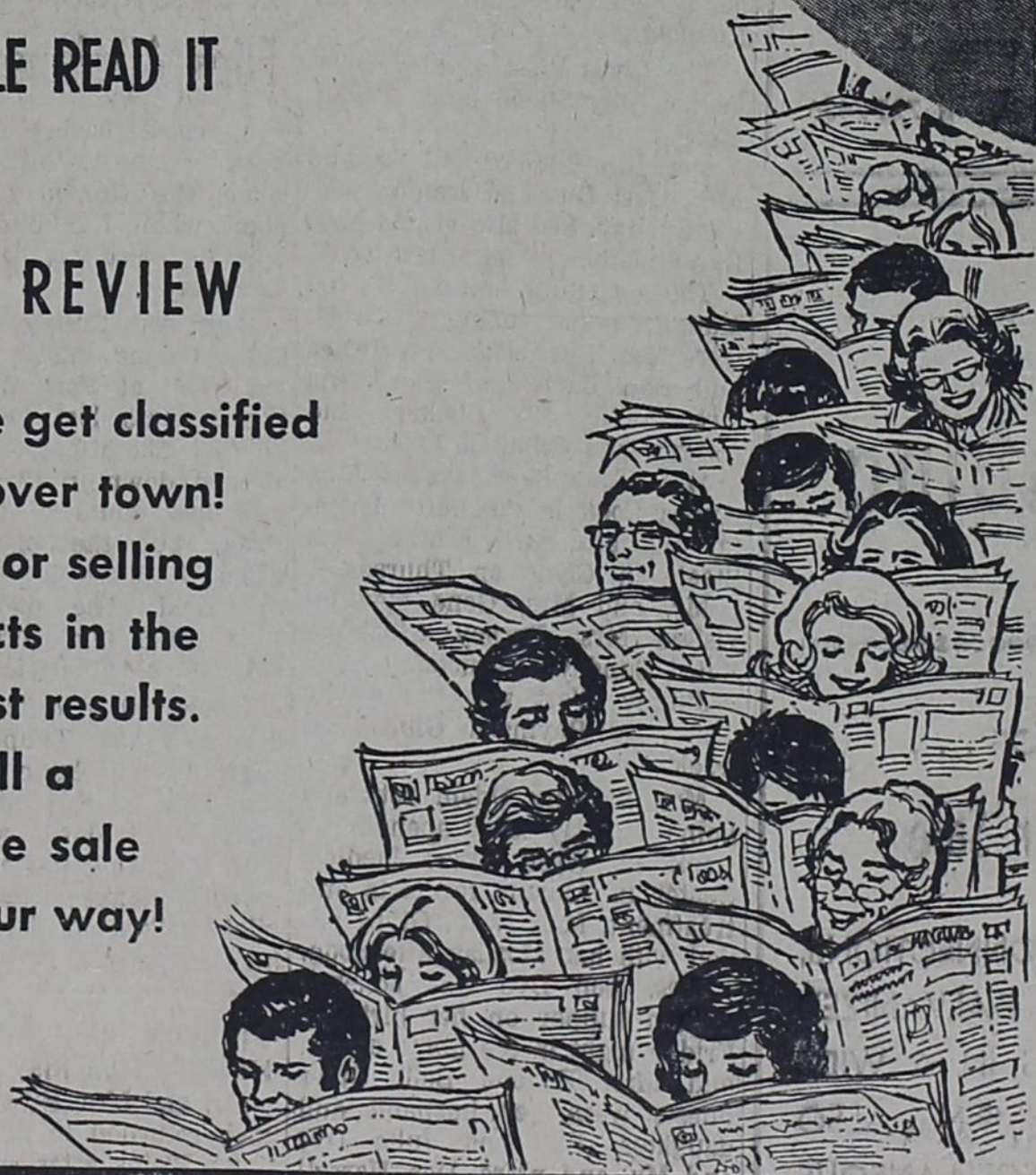
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Farm Bill Hearing Slated For Abilene On April 20
