

the application at your local Social Security office. In addition, you will need to submit evidence of both age and identity. Acceptable evidence of age is a public Ella Mae Baker. or hospital birth certificate or a religious record of birth or bap- were in Coleman on business tism. For proof of identity, acceptable evidence includes a drivers license, school ID card, marriage and divorce record, or any other document providing identifying data. Proof of age such as a birth certificate cannot be accepted as proof of identity. You may apply for the Social Security number by mailing in the application and proofs to any Social Security office or by bringing them in person. However, if you are 18 or over and have never had a Social Suday, and also went bewling. Security number before or you are not a United States citizen, you must apply in person.

If you are not a United States citizen, you should bring in your birth certificate if its available and either your Alien Registration Card or your U. S. Immigration Card. If you are authorized to work by the Immigration and Naturalization Service, we can assign you a Social Security number to use for work. If you are ber but it cannot be used to work. number is (915) 698-1360.

If you have already been issued a Social Security number and have lost the card, a replacement card can be issued. Again, you can obtain the application at any Social Security office. The only evidence you will need to submit is evidence of identity. If your name has changed due to mariage, you can also apply to have a new card with your corrected name. In order to change your name, you must submit documents showing both your old and new names. If your name is be-






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
