How 'Liability Policy' Works Liability insurance protects the insured individual (the car owner) from the risk of financial dis- teet. aster resulting from his being No. 1 Martin will be drilled 11,found liable for injuries to others 800 feet from the north and 3,050 due to an accident, McCormack feet from the east lines of E.

When a person buys liability insurance, his insurance company agrees to protect him against accident claims, to defend him in court, and to pay damages to the person suing the car owner, if the car owner is found guilty. This type of insurance does not

provide for the car owner's own osses such as damage to his own car or personal injury, McCormack notes. (Another coverage, 'collision," pays for damage to the car owner's own car.)

Liability insurance, instead, protects the car owner financiallyby defending him against the claims of those he has injured in an accident.

Two parts usually comprise a liability insurance policy: bodily injury and property damage.

Under the bodily-injury section, it protects the car owner in claims involving injury to the "other car" driver and his passengers or injury to pedestrians injured in an accident with the car owner's automobile.

Under the property-damage section, the policy protects the car owner against claims which involve damage to another person's property or automobile.

How Much Coverage? In Texas, the minimum liability limits are 10-25-5 - meaning coverage up to \$20,000 for all persons injured in an accident but limited to \$10,000 for each individual and \$5,000 for property damage.


