Most will not have to worry about being late for anything the first day or two if clocks are not changed, but they might have to wait an hour before being able to conduct

their business. Turn clocks back an hour upon going to bed Saturday night and Sunday you will be in step with most U. S. citizens. If laws are not changed, on the last Sunday next May we will again spring forward before falling back again on last Sunday in October.

He lived and worked in Cross Plains many years, moving to Merkel in the late 1950's or early 1960's.


