

Cemetery's Board Accepts 1 Bid; Rejects Other Offers

Cross Plains Cemetery Association Board of Directors accepted the highest bid of \$4,035.50 made by Cross Plains Grain and Peanut Co. for Blocks 55 and 56 Central Addition, City of Cross Plains at a meeting at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday.

In the session at City Hall the directors did not approve bids on the L. E. Johnson house and small barn. It was noted by the board that both are for sale to be moved. Persons interested in purchasing either or both are requested to submit offers as quickly as possible to one of the following directors, E. F. (Franz) Odum, J. H. Balkum, Jimmie Payne, Peggy Koenig or Maurine McCuin. Cemetery directors recently purchased the L. E. (Looney) Johnson place, 2.6 acres, to expand the local burial grounds away from lower ground and high water table. Cost of the

land, house and small barn was \$14,000.

The land sold to Glenn Winfrey, owner of the grain and peanut company here, had been owned by the local cemetery

association for several years. Tom again pointed out that a financial drive will be necessary to help pay for the land purchased. It will be started in the near future.

Sunshine Needed For Harvest And Planting

A few days of sunshine would aid the agricultural industry in the Cross Plains area tremendously.

Dry weather is needed to complete the small grain harvest and to finish planting peanuts and cotton.

One observer said, "We're not in real bad shape yet, but need some sunshine."

Harvest of the grain has been halted for past few days because of high humidity and light showers which have fallen over the area during week end and Monday. Wheat is falling in the field, and the moisture is hurting yields and grades. One area buyer said that it's all number 2 and 3 grain now. Locally, number 1 wheat was bringing \$3.80 per bushel on Tuesday.

The harvest appears to be about one-third completed. Drying weather is also needed so planting of peanuts and cotton can be completed.

In Cross Plains a light shower Friday measured .05 of an inch, and another trace was reported Saturday morning. Showers Sunday morning through early afternoon netted .30 of an inch, and another .39 was recorded here Monday night. The .65 of an inch brings to 2.40 inches the moisture received here in June. Year's aggregate stood at 16.72 inches Tuesday at noon.

ASCS Reminds Farmers To Report Seed Peanuts

Jack Ball, chairperson of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, reminds farm program participants to report 1980-crop peanuts retained on the farm for seed or other purposes when they certify their 1981 planted peanut acres.

He said that seed peanuts are considered as quota peanuts marketed and need to be reported on the 1980 peanut marketing card.

To avoid being in violation of the peanut price support program, farmers who did not retain peanuts for seed are required to report the name and address of the person from whom their seed peanuts were obtained, in addition to the amount and type of peanuts.

If peanuts retained for seed, plus 1980-crop quota peanuts marketed, exceed the poundage quota, a penalty will be assessed.

"We will visit farms for verification of the quantity reported and to determine whether the peanuts retained exceed the poundage quota," Mr. Ball said.

Under the program, farmers are assigned an acreage allotment and a poundage quota, and only peanuts grown on allotted acreage are eligible for price support. Peanuts grown on allotted acres and within the farm's poundage quota are considered "quota" peanuts. Peanuts grown on allotted acres but in excess of the quota are "additional" peanuts and are supported at a lower price, support level.

According to Mr. Ball, loans will be available for 1981-crop warehouse-stored peanuts from harvest time through Jan. 31, 1982. Loans on farm-stored peanuts will be available through April 30, 1982.

Further details on seed peanuts may be obtained from the local ASCS office.
