

Albany Blasts Herd; Annual Buff-Cat Grid Feud Renews

Cross Plains Buffaloes dropped a second straight football contest Friday. Albany Lions hosted the Herd and handed the Bisons a 53-0 defeat in the non-conference game.

Opening week Cross Plains bowed to Baird 34-6. The Bears are also a District 8-AA member.

The District 7-A Buffaloes were never in the game last Friday, as the Lions scored the first four times they got the ball, rolling to a 27-0 first quarter advantage. In the second period the Lions added insult to injury when a lineman tallied a touchdown. A pass from Quarterback Ricky Peacock was tipped and bobbled around until it ended in the hands of a lineman, Henry Garcia for a 33-0 count. The Lions counted another six points in the third canto, and iced the cake with 14 points in the fourth stanza.

Cross Plains was reportedly inept on both offense and defense. The Herd surrendered the ball three times on interceptions and hurt efforts by being flagged for

an excessive amount of penalties.

Head Coach Ed Higgins said, "Blame the defeat on me, but please, cheer the players on." He added that the Buffaloes are a much better football team than they showed Friday. He also said that Albany was a much better team than he thought. "That, however, is no excuse for the way we (Cross Plains) hit," Higgins said. He continued, "Albany hit and hit hard. We did not hit, and we took a good country licking."

The annual Buffalo-Wildcat grid contest is set here Friday at 8 p.m.

Rising Star is picked to finish fourth in the East Zone of District 7-A, while the Buffs were tabbed for the same place in the West Zone of the loop. Although the Buffaloes managed to shade the Wildcats 12-0 last year, three all-district performers are back from that 2-8 Cat team. That trio is composed of Thad Chambers, 210, fullback, Clay Shults, tight end, and running back Terry Wal-

ker. Another threat is running back Jon Vaughn. Size is a trump with guards Bill Nall, 210, and Jerry Anderson and tackle Wade Ratliff, 215.

Cross Plains is seeking its first win of the 1981 season, while the Wildcats are 1-1, losing to Eden 21-6 in the opener, but blasting Tolar last week 42-6.

In the 43 gridiron meetings Cross Plains has claimed 28 wins while Rising Star has triumphed 17 times. There have been three ties, all 6-6 deadlocks, in 1929, 1974 and 1976.

Cross Plains Mighty Mites defeated visiting Albany Junior High School Cubs 32-8 in football season opener for the Mites.

Athletic Director and Junior High School Head Coach Mack McConal said that the Mighty Mites quickly rolled to a lead and scored three touchdowns in the first half. Cross Plains gained a 32-0 advantage before the Albany team scored in the third quarter.

Initial Mighty Mite touchdown was scored by Flanker Lance Clawson on a 65-yard run. Right End Tony Evans made the two-point conversion on an end run around for an 8-0 lead.

Mite Left Halfback Bryan Brown rambled for another 65-yard touchdown when he went off left tackle. Devin Koening tacked on the two points on a quarterback keeper.

Shower On Monday Helps Peanut Crop

Thundershowers late Monday afternoon dumped heavy rains on portions of the Cross Plains area, and added sparkle to an already bright peanut crop prospect.

Rain fell in wind-driven sheets over much of the Cross Plains area just after 5 p.m. The down-pour lasted about 30 minutes and yielded amounts ranging from .80 of an inch at Pioneer Co-Op to 3.40 inches at the Edwin Erwin place in the Sabanno community. Although winds accompanied the rainstorm, there was no damage reported outside of minor limbs broken from trees.

It was reported that a heavy hail storm moved through the country from somewhere between the Pioneer and Sabanno communities southeastward to just west of Rising Star and possibly further. Heavy hail was reported to have fallen in the area of the George Steel place just west of

Rising Star, and Dick Grider said his fall garden was heavily damaged in northeast part of Pioneer community.

The moisture aided the peanut crop, according to most farmers. Overall the peanut crop prospects look good this year, and most local observers believe it will be two weeks or more before locally produced peanuts begin to move to market.

The rain was spotty again, and could vary widely in any given sector. Some rain reports gathered by the Review are: N. V. Gibbs at Rowden, 1.30 inches with some wind; J. P. Clark in Cottonwood (week end and Monday)

.90 of an inch; Alton Tatom in Atwell where some marble size hail fell but did no damage 2.29 inches; R. T. Watson place in Burkett area 1.65 inches; Mrs. W. L. (Les) Byrd in Cross Cut just over 2.00 inches with .50 on Sunday and 1.50 Monday; Edwin Erwin at Sabanno 3.40 and Pioneer .80 of an inch.

In Cross Plains the total varied from one side of town to the other from 1.60 to 2.00 inches on Monday and Saturday's shower from .20 to .40 of an inch.

The 2.40 inches total raised the month's aggregate to 4.25 inches. Thus far in 1981 Cross Plains has received 23.09 inches of rain.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 1981

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

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above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these purposes.

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

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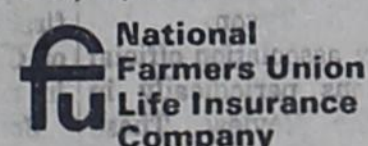

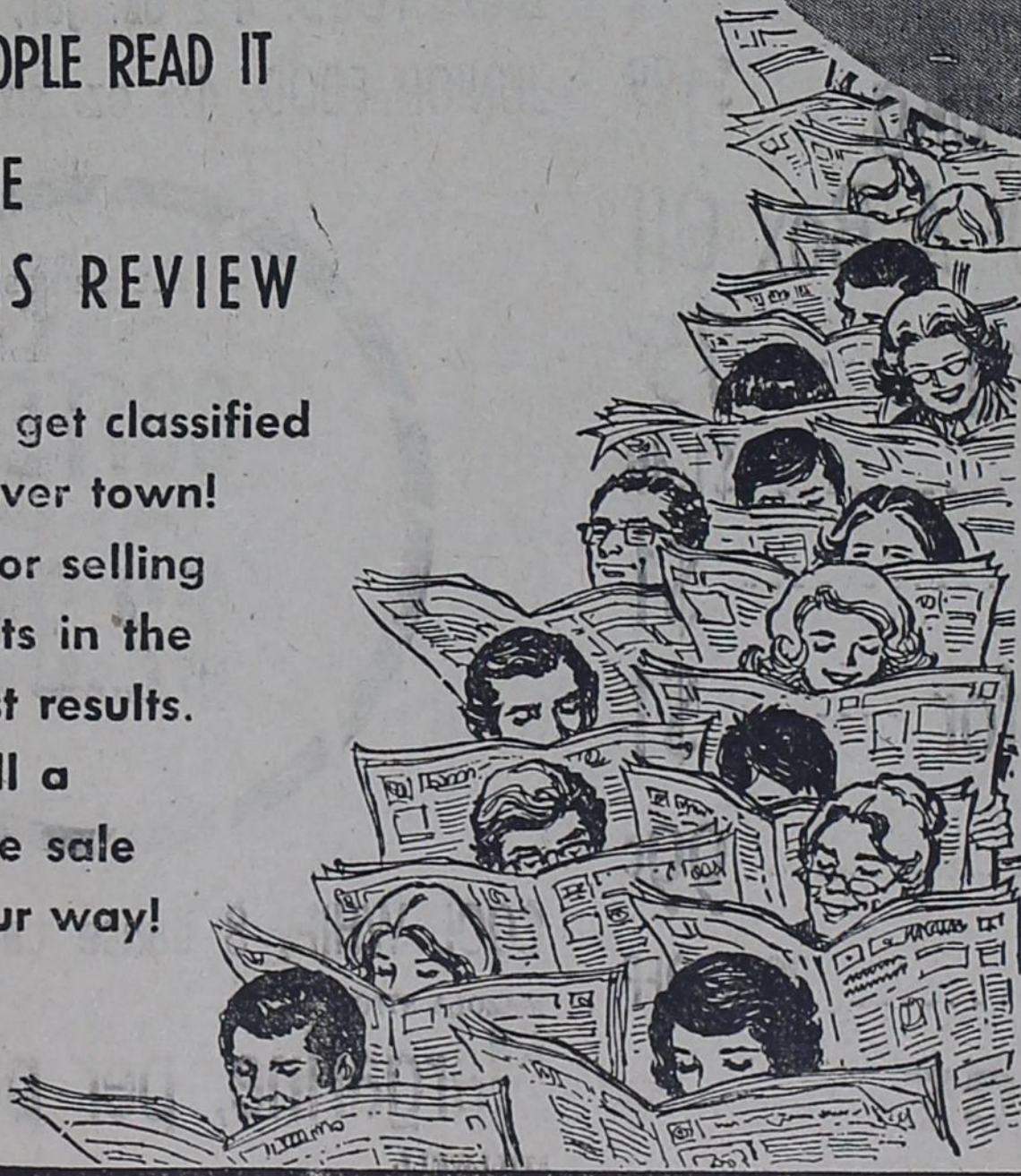
