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Commission. Callahan County asked for and received six variances on noncompliance items. These variances are good for one year, according to Judge Kniffen, "The inspector for the commission that inspects our facility stated our jail had improved immensely since he made his initial inspection four years ago," he continued. "This improvement was brought about by our Jail Administrator Burl Walker, keeping the building clean and in good repair along with the help of the commissioners and their employees working on different phases of non-compliance items, Kniffen added.
