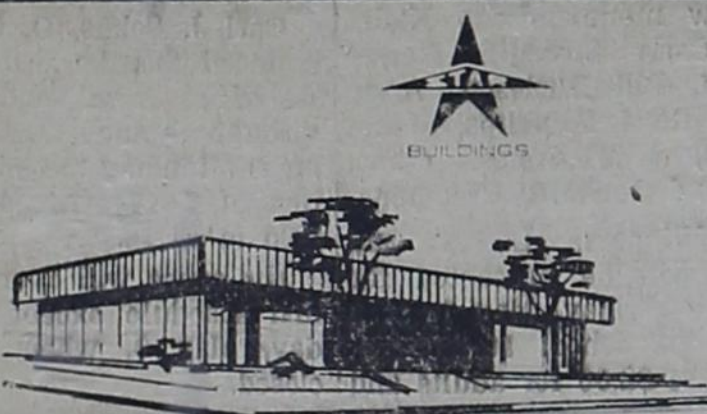

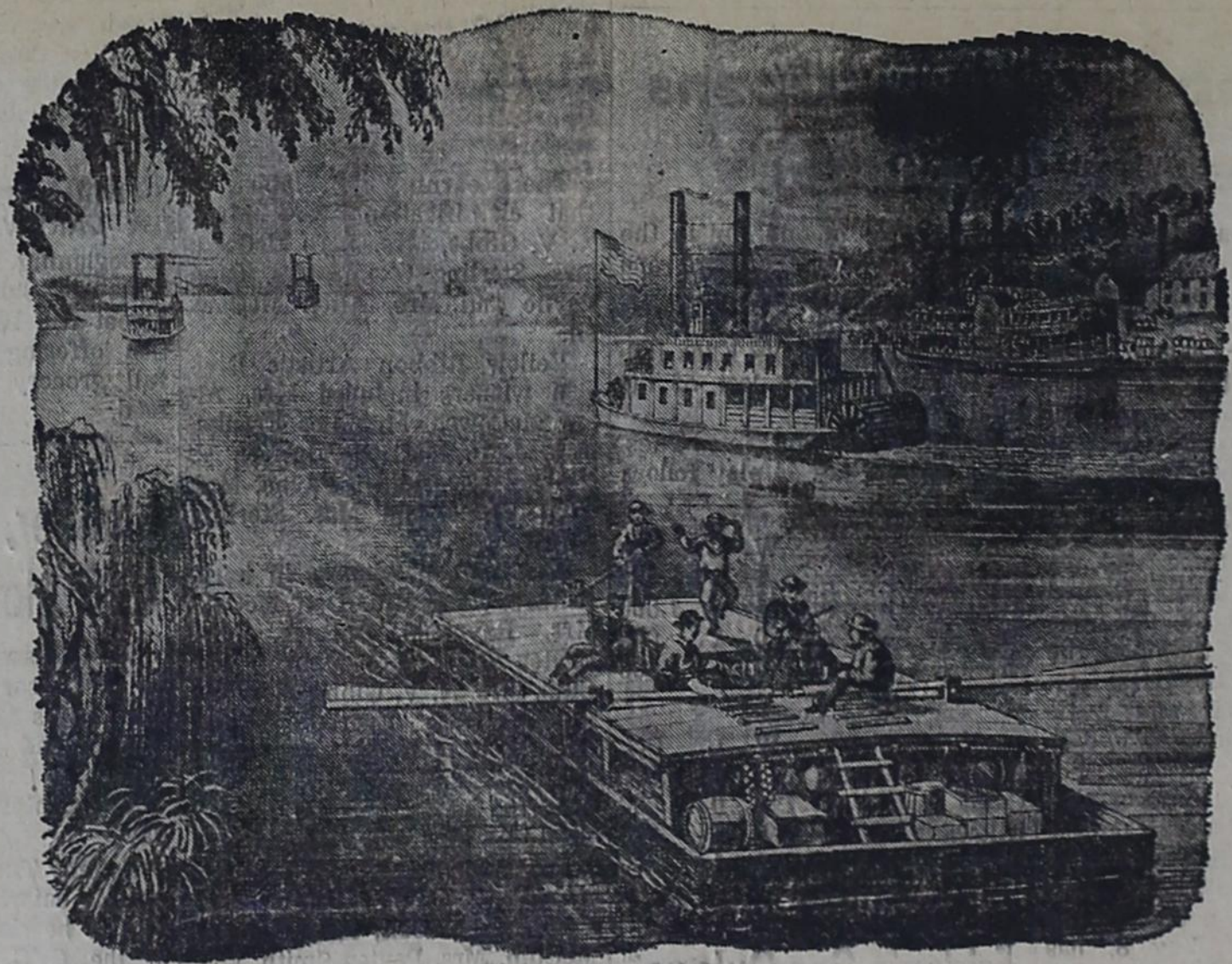

Sen. Farabee Draws Texas 2000 Place

State Senator Ray Farabee has been appointed by Governor Bill Clements to serve on the newly-created "Texas 2000" Commission.

The Commission was formed to aid in the long-range planning program initiated by the Governor in the "Texas 2000" Project. In an executive order establishing the Commission issued April 10, Gov. Clements sets up nine major areas related to the continued economic growth and development of the State.

Those areas are population, economy, water, energy, transportation, agriculture, state and local finance, research and development and future relations with Mexico.

In setting up "Texas 2000," the Governor stated, "One of the things I've noticed since taking office is the lack of any future, long-range data base that would permit us to address critical issues at an early time and thus help us control our destiny."

Sen. Farabee expressed pleasure at his appointment to the Commission, saying, "I am honored that the Governor asked me to participate in 'Texas 2000.' I feel that it is a much-needed program. A long-range planning program such as this will help pin-point the needs of the state, and I feel that in the end will aid the legislature and other governmental bodies in meeting those needs."

Senator Farabee is one of two senators appointed to the Commission. Senator Grant Jones of Abilene is the other. Other members are drawn from the private sector, the academic community and State agencies.

Senator Farabee will serve a one-year term on the Commission.

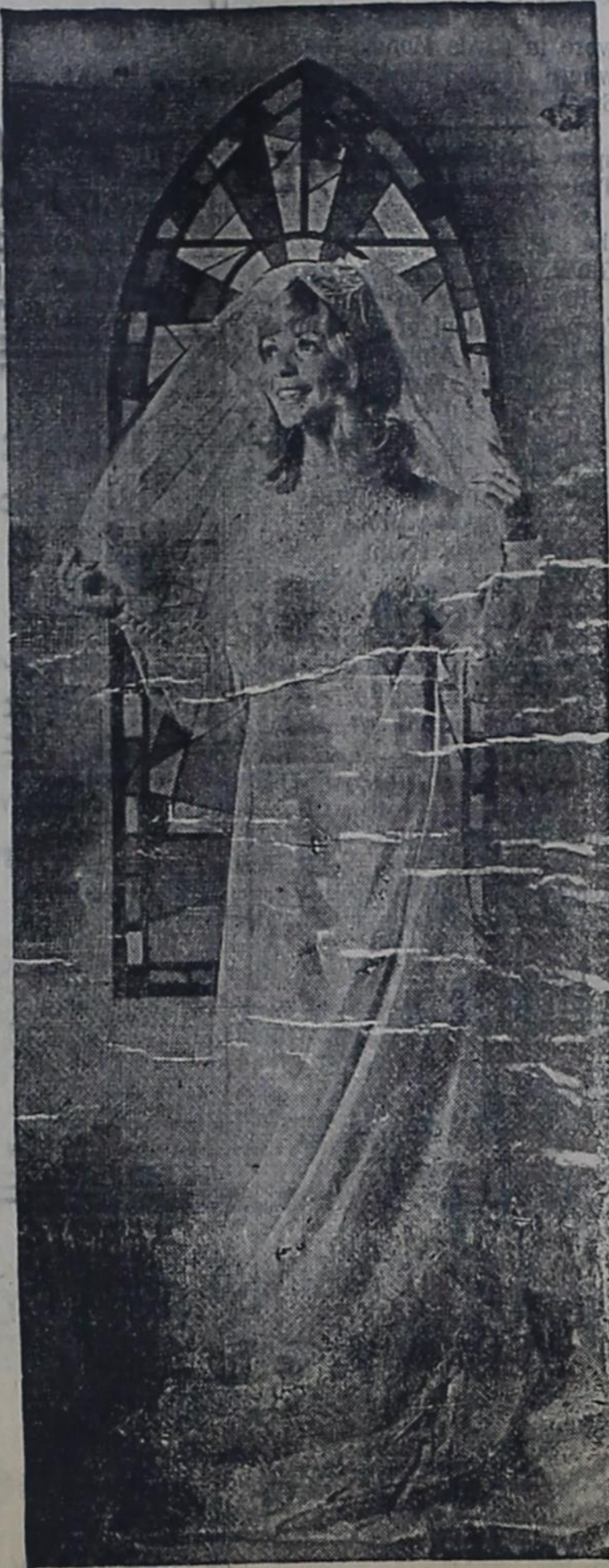

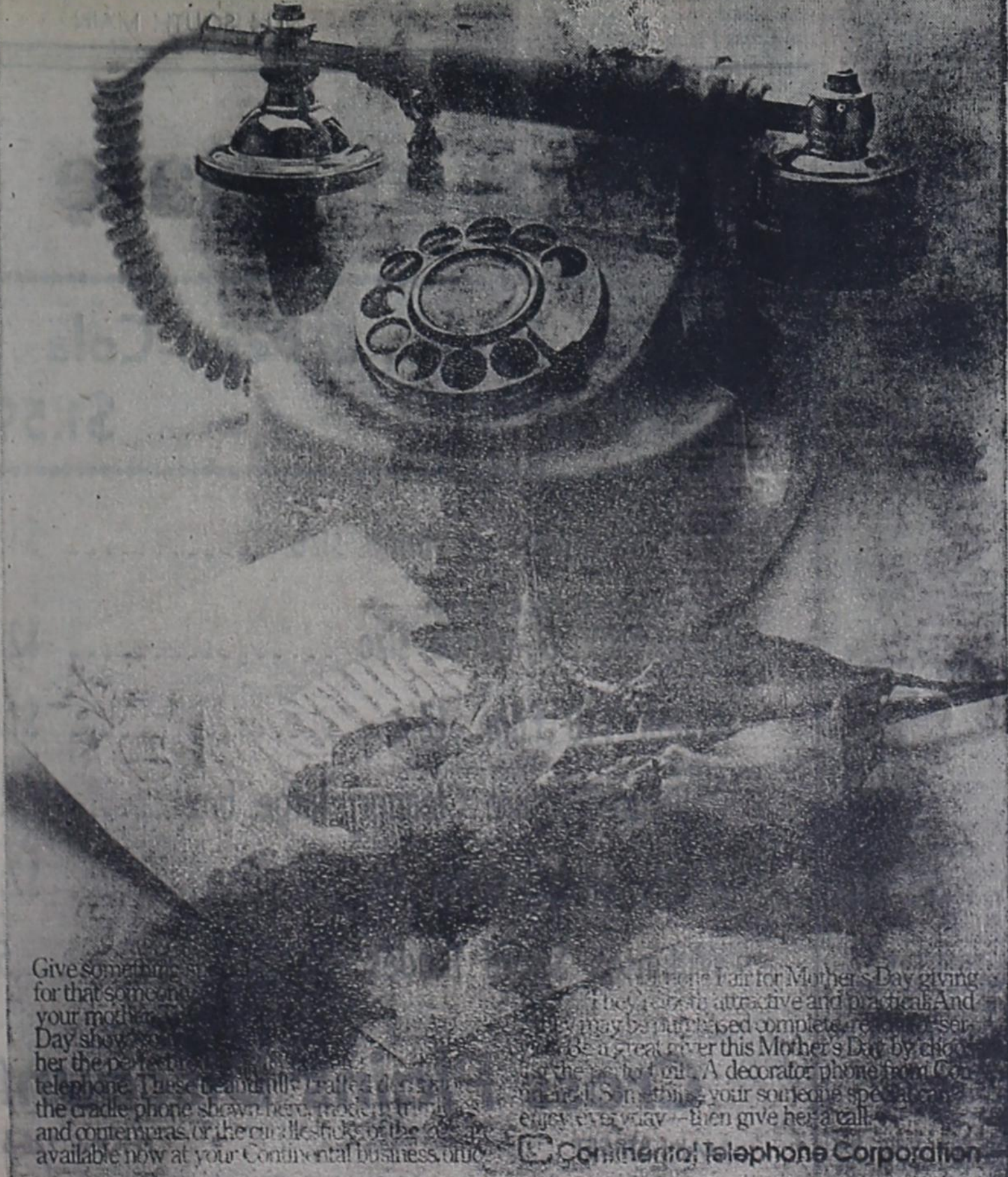

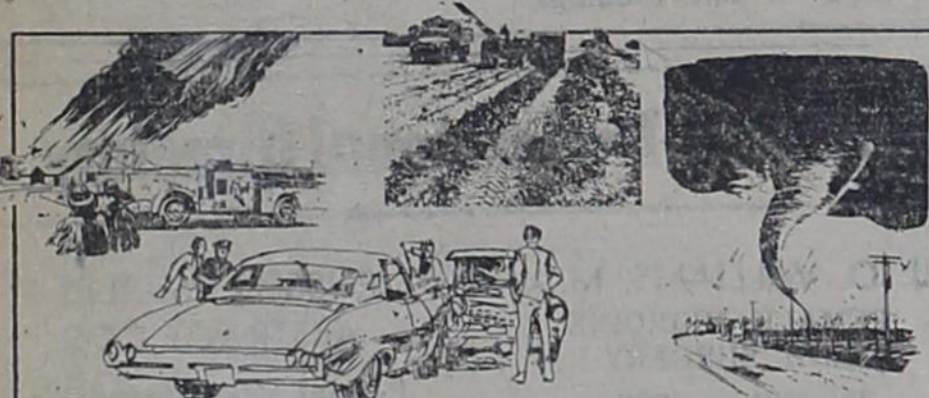

Cliff Waddell of Zephyr, who operates a real estate agency in Early, and formerly lived here, was a Cross Plains visitor Saturday.

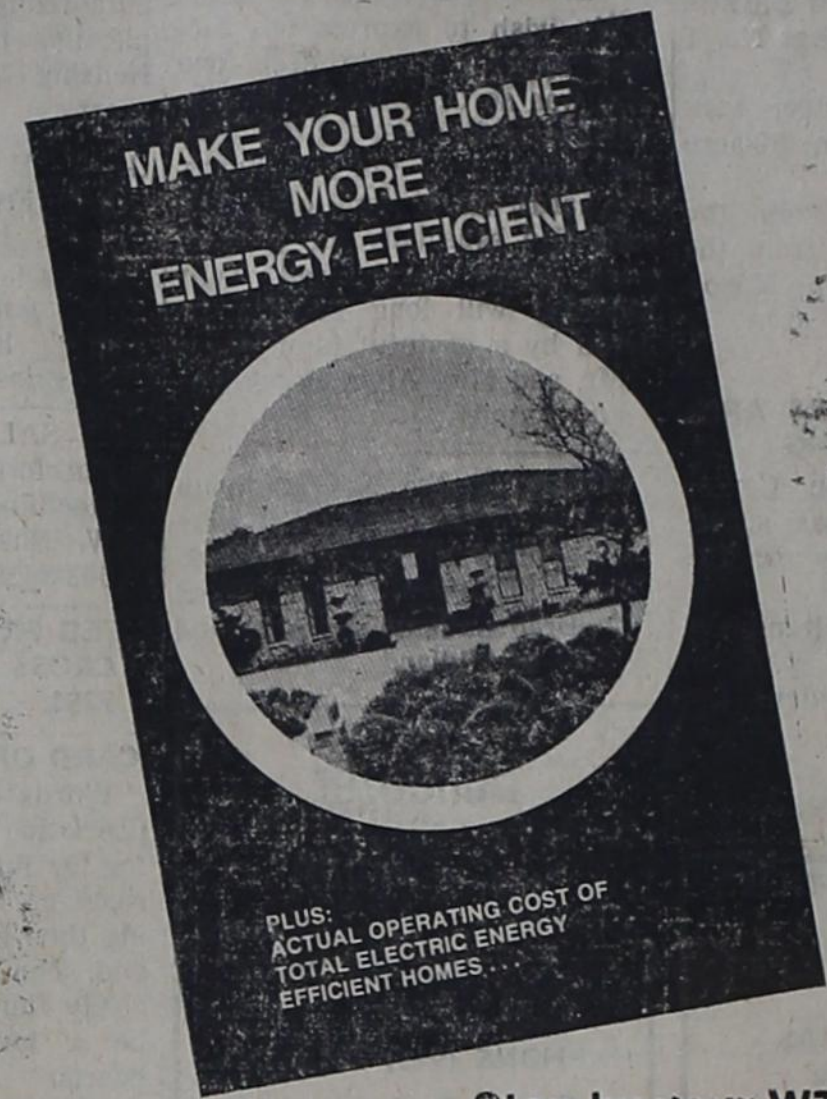

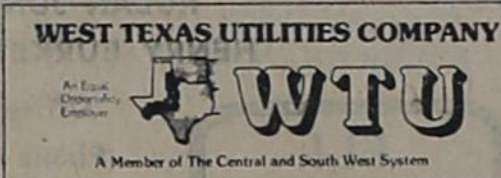
