the secretary-treasurer stated. She listed the repair job as \$393.71 in material to Higginbothams and \$610.00 in labor.

Hail Hits City Tuesday Causing Light Damage

Hail pounded Cross Plains Tuesday afternoon, striking about 4 p.m. The ice balls, a couple re-

ported about the size of golf balls or the north side of town, fell for several minutes and ranged mainly in size from pea to large marble. Damage was already reported to vegetable, especially tender garden plants and fruit crops.

An estimated half-inch of rain, also fell from the cloud which carried the hail.

It was not known for sure, but damage to cars or roofs was not thought to be done by Tuesday's hail.

A cloud which hit here with vivid lightning and a brief high wind delivered .20 of an inch of rain to Cross Plains about 3 a.m. Tuesday.

The early-morning storm did considerable damage in the Cross Plains Sector. Mrs. Les Byrd reported that a west window was blown out at her home and some trees were blown down and big limbs broken from trees. It unroofed the southwest corner of her garage, but left less than one-half inch of rain.

The .20 of an inch of rain received early Tuesday brought to 2.15 inches the amount recorded here in June, and increased the aggregate to 13.75 inches for the year.

City Takes July 4th As Holiday Monday

Although usually a festive holiday, Cross Plains may observe a quiet July 4th Independence Day Monday, according to soot reports from local business persons.

A spot check reveals that virtually all downtown Cross Plains business firms will be closed Monday, giving proprietors and employees a two-day, and some who are normally closed on Saturday, two and three-day summer breaks. Lone exception to this rule was J & S Supermarket, who announced business as usual that day.

In contrast virtually all concerns on highways leading into Cross Plains will be open, following regular schedules. Eating establishments, not customarily closed on Monday will be open, as will most of the service stations and convenience stores.

There is no special activity planned in Cross Plains for July 4, but many area cities and communities have programs and festivities slated.

Many Cross Plains residents have plans to be out-of-town at one of those festivals, while others plan to rest or host guests.

Traffic is expected to be heavy, and special steps are to be taken to deal with that problem.

Captain G. J. Matthews, Highway Patrol Commander of the Abilene District of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Excessive speed and driving while intoxicated will prove to be highway killers during this July 4th holiday week end." "Those two violations of the traffic law will in all probability, account for more than half of the estimated 49 traffic deaths during this holiday week end," Captain Matthews said.

Last year, during the July 4th

week end, 64 traffic deaths were tabulated by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The DPS will again be conducting "Operation Motorcade" during this week end. "Operation Motorcade" is a time when all traffic accidents are reported to the DPS headquarters in Austin so they can be tabulated and information can be released to the news media. This is done to try to focus public attention on the dangers of driving during peak holiday per-

iods, hoping to hold the death toll as low as possible, Matthews added. He stated, "We have to have voluntary compliance of the traffic laws, by the majority of the motoring public in order to be successful in reducing accidents."

"If drivers will just slow down and not drive if they have been consuming alcoholic beverages, many of the deaths that occur on our streets and highways could be prevented." Captain Matthews concluded.

Football Field Is Getting New Type Of Irrigation

The Cross Plains Board of Trustees has given approval for installation of a new type watering system for the football field.

Head Football Coach and Athletic Director Mitchell Atchley explained that this new system is known as leaky pipe. The concept is that is buried beneath the football field and the water is dispersed underground. Therefore you do not need a high powered watering system, but just a constant flow of water. It is now being installed and will be completed this coming Saturday. It is hoped this new system will solve the watering problem for the football field.

The firm making the installation is ENTEK Corporation of Southlake, located in the Dallas area, and represented locally by Mike Kelley, construction contractor.

Lee Thompson, school superintendent, further explained that the

local installation is a pilot project for the company with the guarantee that if it doesn't work, the school owes nothing.

Garden Clubber Discusses Hanging Basket Purchase

Editor's Note: Following is an article submitted by Dorothy Webb of the Cross Plains Garden Club concerning hanging baskets that withstand the heat of summer. Mrs. Webb said that the article, which she believes to be an excellent one, was taken from the Texas Gardener.

One of the most frustrating things is buying a beautiful hanging basket of vining geraniums, petunias, or fuchsias in the spring and by early summer finding that nothing you do will keep it happy during a Texas summer.

Many of the traditional hanging basket plants can't keep up with the pressures of a Texas summer, so we're recommending some different varieties. Here also are some tips on how to cut down on plant loss.

Use a tighter soil in your basket by mixing top soil in equal parts with your usual light weight potting soil. This will help cut down on moisture loss. You can also buy substances to mix with the soil which will help to retain water.

Use one of the controlled release fertilizers to insure that the plants will have a constantly available supply of fertilizer throughout the summer. Only use about one half of the recommended amount, since you'll be watering frequently and you may wash out too much fertilizer. You may therefore have to replenish the controlled release fertilizer more often than is recommended.

As to which plants you should use in your hot weather basket, use your imagination — try any plant that likes hot weather.

One of the best of these plants is lantana. Its beautiful flowers come in many colors, from yellow and lavender to bicolors. Lantana will tolerate some shade as well as full sun.

The annual periwinkle looks great in a basket, especially the

varieties Polka Dot and Pink Carousel. They will certainly tolerate the heat and full sun, though they won't go long without water.

Impatiens are excellent for shaded areas, and come in a wide variety of forms and colors, like the lovely orange Tangelow variety. Achimenes also grow well in the shade, produce magnificent blooms can be overwintered to bring you blooms again next spring.

Vines like the creeping zinnia (sensivitalia) and Thunbergia vine, or blackeyed Susan vine, look great in a basket. Just pinch them back a few times to develop bushier growth.

Herbs make great warm season hanging baskets, too. Just plant a basket with basil standing upright in the center, with sweet marjoram, oregano, lemon verbena, tarragon or rosemary as trailing plants around the sides. Hang the basket outside the kitchen for easy access.

The origin of this tune is obscure, but it may have been written by John Stafford Smith, a British composer born in 1750. 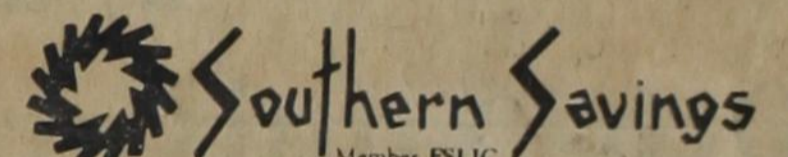
