

Local Bank Deposits Reach All-Time High

Deposits in the Citizens State Bank attained an all-time high on Thursday, Dec. 3, according to an announcement by W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy, president.

Money held in various types of accounts amounted to \$17,093,724.27. The bank official stated that the local bank's aggregate assets on that day totaled \$21,665,609.05.

Those figures reflect continued growth by the Cross Plains bank, according to McCoy. Figures on the same date last year showed deposits up almost \$2 million dollars.

Totals from last year showed that on Dec. 3, 1980, the Citizens State Bank had \$15,192,501.75 on deposit. The 1981 aggregate is up \$1,901,222.52. Total assets figure has also climbed, advancing almost \$3.5 million dollars. Actual figure growth was \$3,488,339.96 from the 1980 amount of \$18,177,369.07.

"We are extremely proud of the accomplishment," McCoy stated, "but know that it is your good will and our confidence that has allowed us to grow."

He reflected that Cross Plains has a strong economy, fueled by its diverse agricultural base and the strong oil industry. "Peanut harvest has put an extra boost into the economy at the present," he said.

"We look forward to growing with our community, and feel confident we will be able to serve its needs," McCoy stated.

Changes Due January 1 In Brucellosis Program

Several changes which will affect Texas in 1982 have been recommended in the Uniform Methods and Rules (UM&R) of the federal brucellosis eradication program by the U. S. Animal Health Association.

The USAHA has the responsibility of making recommendations to the Secretary of Agriculture regarding changes in the brucellosis eradication UM&R. Provisions of the rules are approved as minimum standards for achieving and maintaining control and eradication of brucellosis.

The Texas Animal Health Commission, the animal health governing body for the state, follows the minimum standards of the UM&R as part of the Texas brucellosis program, explains Greg Gerngross, Callahan County agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Changes recommended regard the state's classification status. Classifications to be effective January 1 include free, A, B, and C. All are based on the number or percentage of infected herds — not individual animals — in the state.

To obtain a free status, states would have a 0 percent infection rate. No tests would be required for interstate movement in this category.

To obtain Class A status, individual states could not exceed a 0.25 per cent infection rate. One negative test with health certificate would be required for interstate movement of test eligible cattle.

Class B status would be obtained by any state with less than 1.5 per cent but more than 0.25 per cent infection rate. One negative test within 30 days and one negative test 45-120 days after

movement are required for interstate movement of test eligible cattle in the B area. Effective January 1, 1982, Callahan County will be in Class B Area.

Class C status would go to all states and areas with greater than 1.5 per cent infection rate. In this instance, test eligible non-vaccinated cattle must have two negative tests before movement and one negative test after movement for interstate shipment.

Additionally, test eligible vaccinated cattle in Class C areas may move interstate with one negative test within 30 days and quarantine and re-test 45-120 days after movement.

Animals that are exempt (non-test eligible) from testing requirements in all classifications are steers and heifers or official calf-hood vaccinates if dairy breed under 20 months of age; beef cattle under 24 months, and non-vaccinated cattle under 18 months, unless pregnant.

Another important factor in the re-classification of states is that Texas will be permitted to keep a dual classification system. Early indications point to a B and C area, with the B area the western portion which corresponds to the present A area, and the C area the eastern part which closely corresponds to the present B area.

Vaccination also is strongly encouraged since these animals will be able to move more freely than non-vaccinated animals. A major thrust of the Texas brucellosis plan is vaccination with reduced dosage of Strain 19 vaccine, Gerngross said.

The classification system is a division to indicate how much infection is in an area, and is not an indication that the state is not making progress.

The malady, which seems more prominent this year, can be controlled with vaccination. "Since blackleg is not the killer it once was," Roy Richey, local agricultural instructor said, "some producers may not have been vaccinated as was formerly done."

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs.

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.

Agent Says Cull Cattle Herds For More Profit

Despite a weak cattle market, it's wise to "clean up" herds by culling open cows and giving more attention to a controlled breeding program by culling late-calving cows.

There's no need to put expensive winter feed into unproductive cows, points out Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Culling the cow herd now will also help you plan on feed supplies for the winter months," the Baird agent said.

"Also, pregnancy testing cows this fall may be a more profitable management tool than ever before," he added.

"Since it's difficult for a cow to produce a calf large enough to pay her annual maintenance bill and leave some profit for the producer, we know an open cow is surely losing money," emphasizes Gerngross. In addition, cows calving during the summer months wean calves 30 to 90 pounds lighter than their herd mates which calve at other times. For this reason it's advisable to cull cows which will calve late next year and buy a replacement which will calve early.

Whoever does the pregnancy di-

agnosis (usually your veterinarian) will be able to estimate the calving date on each animal and year's late-calving cows. Your definition of a late-calving cow should change every year until your calving season has been reduced to 60 days preferably, and certainly no longer than 90 days.

Removing barren and late-calving cows from the herd will increase both the herd's reproductive potential and pounds of calf weaned, contends Gerngross.
