While I was wondering what I could write that would help make more people realize the necessity of reporting abuse, 1 received a letter in the mail from the Regional Director for Children's Protective Services that answers both questions. I'm certain he won't mind me sharing a portion of it with you. "Yesterday, I read three diifferent reports on children who have died from abuse and neglect in this area. The reports were done by Protective Service workers and included pictures of the victims and detailed findings of the autopsies done. After eleven years in child welfare, you would think that I would get used to reading this kind of material, but I haven't yet.'


