Stock Feed Signing Runs Thru Dec. 14

Farmers who are located in disaster designated counties and who are eligible to purchase lower grade Commodity Credit Corporation corn to feed livestock or poultry are encouraged to sign-up at their County ASCS Office. The sign-up period is Dec. 6-14.

According to Scott Odom, executive director of Callahan ASCS Office, the corn is priced at 75% of the 1983 basic county loan rate in the county where it is stored. Nation-wide, about 27 million bushels of US No. 4, No. 5, and sample grade corn are available from CCC. Farmers purchasing the corn are responsible for transporting it to their farms.

Authorization for the CCC corn sales came with President's Reagan's signature last week to a measure passed by Congress dealing primarily with the dairy and tobacco program.

Odom said that in addition to being located in a USDA designated disaster county a farmer or rancher eligible to purchase the corn must also have insufficient feed on hand to maintain foundation livestock and poultry through the end of a 90 day feeding period. The period begins when a producer applies for the assistance. The maximum amount of corn allowed to be purchased will be 10 pounds of feed per day, per animal unit times the number of days in the feeding period.

Health Clinic Set Friday For Students

A health and immunization clinic is scheduled to be held at Cross Plains High School for all school students Friday, Dec. 9. The clinic will be held in the school library.

Purpose of the clinic is to get all students shot records, immunizations, up to required level. All immunizations will be free of charge given by qualified personnel. The clinic will begin at 8:30 a.m.

Elementary Principal Ray Womack and High School Principal Richard Purvis both said that it is imperative that any student behind in state required immunizations get caught up at the clinic Friday. State is now enforcing shot requirements.

Local Garden Club Tips

"It's Time To Deck The Halls"

Collecting greenery for holiday decorations gives you a chance to prune overgrown shrubs. In addition to the cedar you gather from the woods, you can use greenery from your yard for wreaths, garlands, and holiday arrangements. Magnolia, Cypress, boxwood and ivy are traditional Christmas greens. Cherry laurel, sweet olive, firethorn (pyracantha), and nandina work well too.

Take advantage of firethorn and nandina for bright berries as well as foliage.

When you clip branches from shrubs for greenery, you're actually pruning the plants. Be sure to do it properly so you don't ruin their shape. Make a clean cut just above a bud at a 45-degree angle that follows the direction of the bud. Don't leave a stub. It may not heal well and thus provide entry for diseases.

Winter pruning encourages new growth in spring, so if you want a shrub to develop a wider spread, cut above an outward-facing bud. If you want a thicker growth in a shrub with a sparse center, cut back to an inward-facing bud.

Needle leaved evergreens such as spruce, juniper, pine and yew shouldn't need pruning, but you can still clip foliage for holiday decorations. Just be careful not to cut back beyond the needle-bearing side branches. Otherwise those branches will die. Make cuts so they will be hidden by nearby

branches.

Remember that the Chinese holidays, including Burford holly, produce berries on last year's wood. Be careful not to cut too much of the branch, or you'll reduce next year's crop of berries.

Use sharp pruning shears when cutting greenery. Dull pocket knives or kitchen shears will damage plant stems.

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State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — The building courtroom drama pitting Attorney General Jim Mattox against Mobil Oil Corp. heightened last week when prosecutors discovered three tapes of evidence in a safe.

The tapes allegedly contain evidence that Mattox threatened the law firm representing Mobil Oil during a telephone conversation. That alleged threat is what led to an indictment of Mattox on a charge of commercial bribery.

Mattox, who styles himself "The Peoples' Lawyer" and predicts his innocence, said the three missing tapes will actually help his defense because of how the taped conversation will be interpreted.

Two lawyers for the firm Fulbright and Jaworski of Houston allege that Mattox threatened to hold back approval of the firm's bond agreements, which meant a substantial loss of revenue, unless the lawyers agreed to stop their efforts to question Mattox's sister in deposition. The firm was seeking to remove a Laredo judge who was to hear the Mobil lawsuit.

The lawyers said they were given two days to "back off" that effort, and that 12 minutes after the deadline passed, they received an anonymous phone call telling them: "Sorry, but you're out of the bond business."

Prosecutors said that five tapes of conversations had been given to them, but two apparently had been "overlooked" in the safe.

Settling Suit

Meanwhile, the controversial lawsuit which sparked the separate charges against Mattox may be headed towards settlement. Attorneys for Mobil Oil and Clinton Manges, the South Texas millionaire rancher who is suing the oil giant for \$1.7 billion, agreed to draw up papers for a possible settlement.

Under the offer, Mobil would give up its oil and gas leases on 65,000 acres owned by Manges, and Manges, in return, would give up claim on back payments of oil and gas.

Reportedly, Manges would make almost \$2 million in oil and gas production.

Still to be resolved is whether the state's claim is settled for back-payment of 50 years of oil production on Manges' ranch. The state holds mineral rights to some of the acreage.

Mattox is joined in pressing that claim by Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, and stands to gain \$1 million a month to the public school fund.

Official Salaries

About 20 of his appointees make more salary than Gov. Mark White does, according to a list of the 25 top paid state employees in Texas. Heading the list at \$143,000 is the Texas A&M chancellor closely followed by the University of Texas System chancellor. The top 20 salaries all go to academicians on Texas campuses until the list reaches the Governor at \$88,900 a year.

The attorney general and other statewide elected commissioners receive \$69,000 yearly.

Three-Term Speaker?

At the Texas House of Representatives, Speaker Gib Lewis has already claimed enough pledge cards to assure him the victory votes for a second term at the gavel.

Lewis reportedly is also dropping hints he may seek a third term since he says he has received several unsolicited pledges far down the road.

One of the speaker's key chairmen, Rep. Gerald Hill of Austin, is considering giving up re-election bid to become a top aide for Mark White. Hill wanted to run for speaker after Lewis' second term, but apparently doesn't want to wait until after a third.

Hill is a conservative who is generally well respected by other members of the House. His expertise and contacts are considered a potential boost to White's legislative team.

Mondale-Bentzen?

Hill was a top staffer in U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentzen's 1982 re-election campaign, and on that subject, Bentzen enjoys wide support from other Texas officials as the vice presidential choice.

Four of the state's top elected officials support a Walter Mondale-Bentzen ticket: Mauro, Mattox, Comptroller Bob Bullock and Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby is Texas campaign chairman for John Glenn.

Both Mondale and Glenn draw good support from Texas congressmen and state legislators. Reportedly, virtually all of them support Bentzen as the vice presidential nominee and disregard Gov. Mark White as a serious choice for that spot.

Presnal Retires

The quiet, handsome legislator who has wielded the appropriations gavel for the past 8 years, Rep. Bill Presnal of Bryan, announced last week he will not seek another term in the Texas House.

Presnal, who guided lawmakers through budget-cuttings in a low-key, gentle style, is thought to be taking a job with Texas A&M University, perhaps on their legislative team.

Year End Crop-Stock Reports Return Urged

AUSTIN—The Texas Crop and Livestock Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for final 1983 crop acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

State Statistician Dennis Findley reported that producers across the state, and many farmers and ranchers are depending on this survey information for an accurate picture of the 1983 agricultural situation.

Findley explained that the confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, provide information used by producers to make their production and marketing plans for the coming years.

"Without these reports, farmers and ranchers would have to rely on other sources for crop and livestock information," he added.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state as well as county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.



Beware "Easy-Out" Paying Income Tax

Like to stop paying taxes? That's a very tempting idea, and proponents of this notion are making speeches and offering seminars around the country on the "how-to's" of tax evasion. The Internal Revenue Service, however, has some words of advice on the subject, too.

Working toward tax reform certainly is not illegal, the IRS points out. For example, urging changes in the tax laws is the right of every individual, as is arranging one's affairs to pay the lowest possible tax within the law. Also, if you hold securities so as to have a long-term instead of a short-term capital gain, the law supports your move.

However, illegal tax protest, such as advocating or participating in a scheme that results in the unallowed underpayment or non-payment of taxes, or not filing required tax returns, is illegal, the IRS states. The IRS has the duty and tools given by Congress, to enforce the Federal tax laws. When some individuals remove themselves from the law, the burden of taxes is greater for those who willingly comply. In the interest of fairness for all taxpayers, the IRS says it will continue to enforce all federal tax laws, including laws governing those who attempt to place themselves above the law by illegally refusing to pay their just share of tax.
