AARP Tax-Aide Will Begin Here Soon

The Tax-Aide program will begin in Cross Plains on February I, at 10 a.m. to 12 noon at the Multi-Purpose Center, under the sponsorship of the American Association of Retired Persons.

The Tax-Aide program is a mique service which relies upon the efforts of volunteers across the country to provide free income tax counseling to older persons age 55 and over.

Since its inception Tax-Aide has worked with the Internal Revemue Service (IRS) in its taxpayer education programs, providing instruction for Tax-Aide volun-

teers in income tax counseling. Tax-Aide has worked with the IRS autilizing training courses which are conducted after changes in the tax laws have been finalized, developing a training program adaptable to the needs of differing groups. 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
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
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
