Big Voter Turnout Likely In Demo Voting Saturday

An extra heavy turnout of voters across Callahan County is deemed possible for the Democratic Primary Saturday, May 5.

A much heavier than normal absentee vote total was reported by County Clerk Darlene Walker at mid-afternoon Tuesday. At that time there had been 118 ballots cast absentee, 101 by personal appearance and 17 had been re-

turned by mail. The county officer said that some mail ballots were still out. Absentee voting deadline was Tuesday.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Saturday all across the state. Voting will be done at the Cross Plains City Hall, according to Joe Ingram, election judge. He also announced that the Democratic Precinct Convention will be held at the Cross Plains Fire Station at 7:15 p.m. Saturday.

Closest thing to a hotly contested state-wide race is the battle for Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator. Names in that race as they will appear on the ballot are Kent Hance, David Young, Robert S. Sullivan, Harley Schlaner, Lloyd Doggett and Robert (Bob) Krueger.

Races for various judge posts offer some choice, and two persons are vying for the State Representative District 64 seat, although three names will appear on the ballot. Still in the race are Kenneth F. Neighbours and Riek Perry, listed one, two on the Callahan ballot, and Sam Newcomb. The latter dropped out of the race about three weeks ago, saying a medical problem heretofore unknown led him to abandon the race.

During the 1971 meeting a motion was made and approved that no curbs would be allowed in the new cemetery. In 1973 on May 6th the association elected its first vice-president of the association, Jim McCowen. Persons to fill this office since were: Charles Waggoner, Knox Waggoner, Mrs. John Purvis A. L. Breeding, Homer Griffin and John Crowley. On May 2, 1982, the Cottonwood Historical Association started holding its memorial services with a noon luncheon at the Cottonwood Community Center and the program and business meeting following.

WTU Saving On Fuel Cost Estimated \$13.7 Million

Efforts to obtain cheaper boiler fuel for its power plants are paying off for West Texas Utilities Co. and its customers.

Through an agreement reached earlier this year, WTU is receiving 20 million cubic feet of lower cost natural gas daily for use at its Fort Phantom Hill Power Station near Abilene.

The savings in WTU's fuel bill this year will amount to about \$7.7 million, which will be passed along to the customers. The only hitch is that the customers will have to wait until the company's fuel cost factor is adjusted by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. Under new PUC rules, the fuel factor, which is the amount WTU is allowed to charge its customers for fuel, is set for a 12-month period, or until the utility's next rate case. Under the old system, the fuel factor was automatically adjusted each month to reflect the current cost of fuel.

The cheaper gas is being purchased from Central Energy Transportation Co. and pipelined from Erath County by Lone Star Gas Co., which is WTU's principal fuel supplier.

"This is only a small amount of gas, considering the total volume used at our eight power sta-

tions, but we try to take advantage of every opportunity to reduce our fuel costs," said Walter Meller of Abilene, WTU's manager of System Production.

"Deals like this help offset the higher price we must pay under our major contract for a dependable, long range supply of natural gas," Meller explained.

The Central Energy contract runs to September 1985. Total savings to WTU through the term of the contract will be approximately \$13.7 million.

For the past two years WTU has been buying a quantity of cheaper low BTU gas and blending it with pipeline quality gas for use at its Paint Creek Power Station.

Fuel costs have risen sharply every year since the Arab oil embargo of 1983 started the world energy crisis. In recent years, fuel expenses have accounted for at least half of WTU's total annual revenue and for a major portion of customer bills.

All of WTU's existing power plants burn natural gas as a boiler fuel. The Oklahoma Power Station, now under construction near Vernon, will be the company's first coal-burning plant and also will be the largest plant in the WTU system.

Tickets to the event, at which time coaches will present plaques to outstanding athletes and honor all the athletes competing at the Figa school level, are on sale at \$3.50. They may be obtained from Lucille Koenig at Western Auto, from any booster member or at the gate on Friday.

Activities at Lakewood includes golf, fishing and possibly swimming. Burleson reported that Lakewood said it was hoped that the pool would be ready for use by that date.

Ordinarily an all-sports banquet is held, but Burleson reported that

most of the athletes readily agreed that the picnic would be more enjoyable. There will be no special speaker, and each coach will be charged with presenting his own team or teams and recognizing players.

Pioneer News Items

Easter Sunday has passed; indeed the greatest of holidays because, if we cannot say at Easter and at all times "He is risen", we are of all people most miserable. Jesus was born, Jesus served, Jesus died (in our stead), but His crowning victory was His Resurrection.

Jesus knew this, so He chose to appear during the forty days following His Resurrection, as many as eleven times to Mary Magdalene at the tomb; to the women enroute to Galilee, Mat. 28:9; to Peter 1 Cor. 15:5; to the two disciples on the Emmaus road; to the apostles Jn. 20; 28; 19-21 (where He showed them His hands and His side); to eleven apostles Jn. 20:26-28; to seven disciples fishing in the Sea of Galilee, Jn. 1:34; to Peter (his charge); Jn. 21:15-17; to eleven apostles Mat. 28:16 & 17; to 500, 1 Cor. 15:6; to James 1 Cor. 15:7 and again to eleven apostles. Acts 1: 2-9; where He promised power to them after the Holy Spirit would descend upon them; "He then ascended and a cloud received Him out of sight."

Jesus knew the importance of these appearances. Though there was a great earthquake; though darkness enveloped the land and though the veil of the Temple was rent in tow, yet there was skepticism among many and doubt in the minds of some believers.

His later appearances, to Paul as one born out of due season Acts 9: 1-5 and 1 Cor. 15: 8; to the 120 on the Day of Pentecost and to John on the Isle of Patmos, testify to the presence of the Christ in the hearts of all who desire His presence and who meet conditions Mat. 11: 28-30; Jn. 3:16. As surely as we can say "He is risen" so can we say "He is with us."

Apply For S.S. Card Before It's Needed

People in the Big Country area who expect to need a Social Security number should remember to apply for it before they must have the number, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

People should apply for a number at least three weeks before the number is needed. This length of time is down from the four to six weeks it used to take, Hammons said. The reduction in time has taken place because Social Security is in the process of modernizing its computer systems. This is one of the first results of this effort.

When applying a person must have evidence of age, identity, and citizenship or legal alien status, Hammons said. In addition, a person 18 or older who is applying for the number must appear in person.

The best evidence of age and citizenship is a public or hospital record of birth or a religious record of birth or baptism established before age 5. Only if these records do not exist should other evidence be submitted.

Evidence of identity can be any document showing identifying data such as physical description, photograph, or signature. Examples include driver's license, voter's registration, school record, report card, identification card, marriage record, divorce decree, draft card, military ID, building pass, baby's hospital wrist band, adoption record, or organization membership.

People applying for a duplicate card to replace one lost must provide evidence of identity. Also, a person who wants to change her or his name in Social Security records must provide evidence of identity under both old and new names. A person born outside the U. S. must submit evidence of Current U. S. citizenship or legal alien status.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency are acceptable.

More information about Social Security numbers can be obtained at the Abilene Social Security office, located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is 698-1360.

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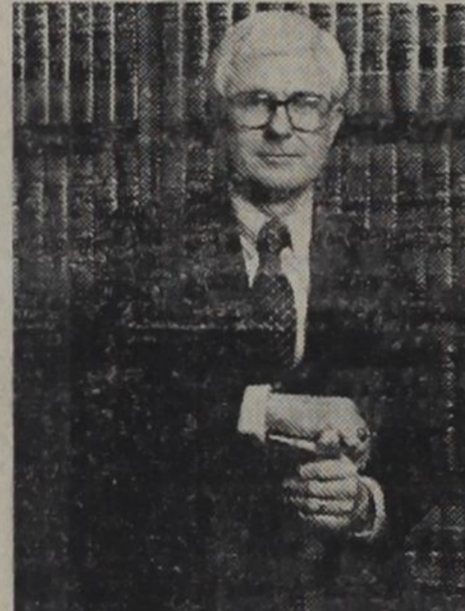

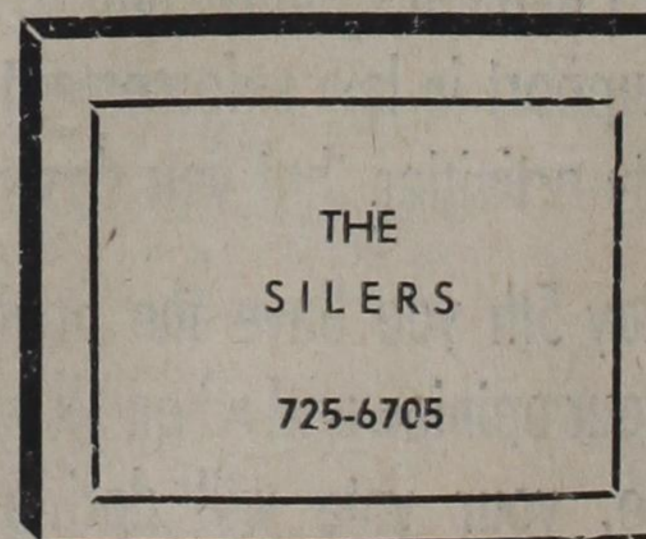

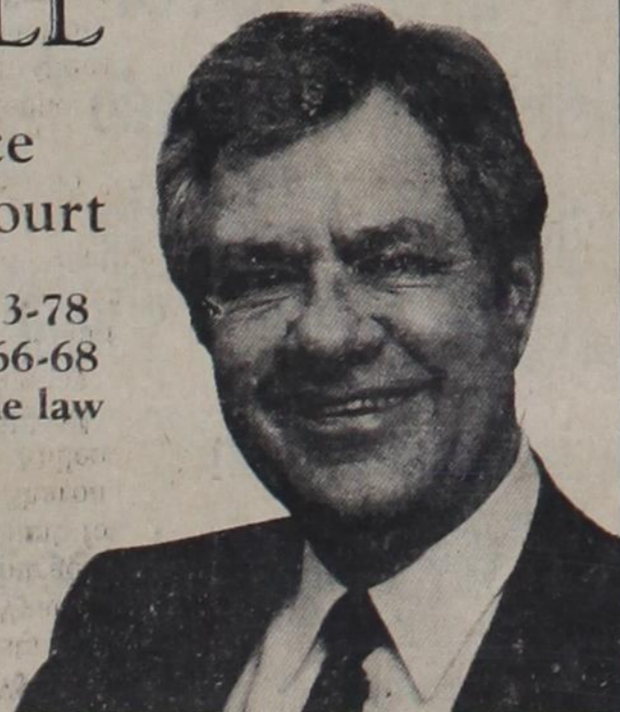
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
