Broken Record on Junk Mail

I know I'm beginning to sound like a broken record, but I recently received two pieces of information that prompt me to jump on junk mail again.

No. 1 is some I got in the August issue of my Texas Press Assn. newsletter (which incidentally didn't come via junk mail).

If you've ever wondered how much of this junk you get in a year, a guy in Davenport, Iowa, has kept score. In a year's time, he got 1,403 pieces of third-class mail that stacked up to over 6 feet high and weighed 175.8 pounds.

And what bugged the guy, Lloyd G. Schermer, (and me) is that this junk mail offered his family almost \$7 million worth of goods and services that were available locally.

"We're paying the government to take business from our local and regional retailers," he said.

And, not only are we doing that, we're also letting these junk mailers do it without paying any local or state sales taxes. That I found out in piece of information No. 2.

It came from the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock who has been in the forefront of efforts to get the Congress to seriously consider a mail order sales tax bill.

The information was headed up with a question: "When was the last time a New Yorker sent money to pay for your local schools?"

It then went on to explain:

"Never, of course.

"We Texans pay our own way with state and local taxes.

"And yet, this year alone, Texas will send \$3 billion to New York, California and New Jersey and even Hong Kong.

"That money will leave Texas in the form of mail orders for all kinds of merchandise.

"Not one penny of Texas sales tax will be collected. And so, not one penny of sales tax will come back to Texas to help pay for our schools, highways, parks, hospitals and colleges.

"No, you and your local merchants will pay for them. Don't you think it's time you had a little help? About \$100 million in help?

"\$100 million. That's the minimum additional Texas sales tax due on mail orders going outside our state. That will pay for a lot of schools.

"The Congress is now considering requiring big national mail order firms to collect the sales tax and send it to the states, including that \$100 million a year to Texas.

"In other words, Congress can make these national mail order operators play — and pay — by the same rules our hometown merchants do.

"Your congressman needs to hear from you. He needs to know that you think local merchants deserve fair treatment and fair competition.

"Please write today. Tell your congressman you support a mail order sales tax bill."

Registration is assigned by last name. It is important that you register at the assigned time.

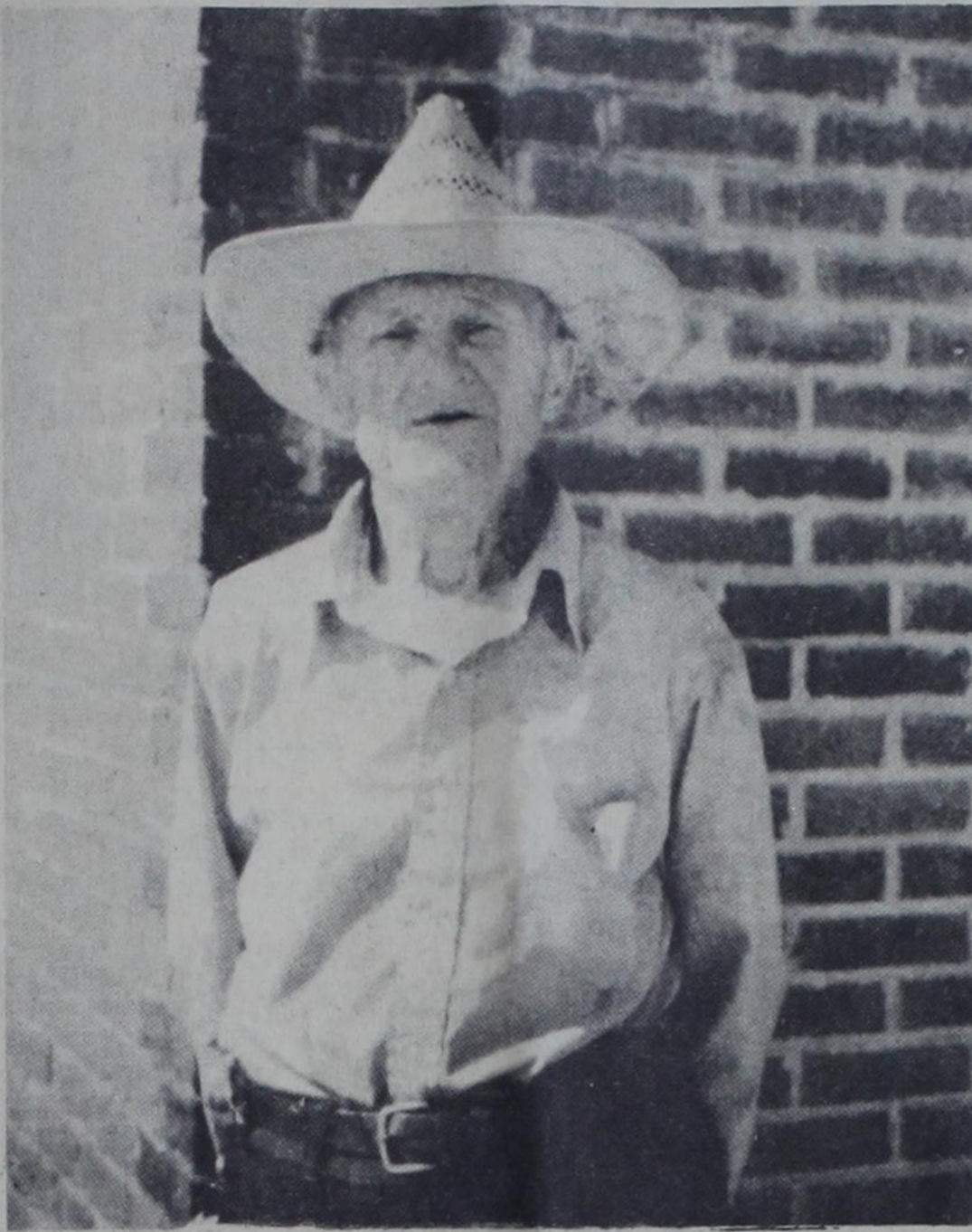
Dormitories will open at 2:00 p.m.,

Lord Allowing 82-Year-Old to Help Feed Needy

Kenneth Jordan, 82 years old, has been a resident of Cross Plains for the past sixty years. Mr. Jordan operated an upholstery shop for 50 years locally. There is probably a sample of his skill in nearly every home in town. He was also employed by Eddie Petty repairing radios for several years.

For the past three years Kenneth has dedicated his life to providing garden vegetables for the Meals-on-Wheels Program at the Cross Plains Multi-Purpose Center. He has a one acre garden which he carefully prepares with a hand tiller and plants the seed with a seeder.

In the early spring he buys garden plants so that he can harvest an early garden.

He also has an irrigation system for watering all the plants. I was told that he even gets up in the middle of the night to change the water on the rows.

Kenneth has bought all the seed and plants that he grows and pays for the water that he uses for irrigation. He said, "The Lord is allowing me to live to help feed these people who are unable to help themselves."

During the gardening season he hauls the vegetables to the Multi-Purpose Center in a wheelbarrow. Some of the vegetables he has grown include tomatoes, bell peppers, cucumbers, cabbage, radishes, egg plant, English peas, onions, mustard greens and turnips. Taking care of his garden is a full time job which demands all his energy.

Kenneth says the Meals-on-Wheels cooks are exceptional. The personnel

About 450 Voters May Lose Right

There are about 450 voters in Callahan County who had better check on their registration certificates or they may not be eligible to vote in the November General Election.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Wauneta Estes said Monday if you did not receive your voter registration certificate in January, you should check with her office at the courthouse at Baird or call 854-1518.

She explained that the Post Office cannot forward your certificate to you if your address is incorrect and that several hundred of them were returned to her office.

There are currently about 450 such certificates still in the office which have not been taken care of by voters and she said if the office doesn't hear from these voters soon, the certificates will be cancelled. If this

occurs, these people will not be eligible to vote in the General Election, in which some key races, including the governor's election, are shaping up.

She said the office must be able to issue a corrected certificate by Oct. 1 to enable the voter to vote in the General Election.

Soil Sample Time Here

Callahan County farmers should take time in the next few weeks to collect soil samples from those fields which will be fall planted to wheat or other small grains.

Soil test results will be returned early enough to allow plenty of time to apply recommended nutrients and incorporate them into the soil during final seedbed preparation.

Incorporating nutrients into a moist seedbed is important to reduce nitrogen volatilization losses associated with surface-applied urea containing fertilizers, points out Greg Cerngross, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas

A&M University System. It also allows placement of non-mobile nutrients such as phosphorus into the active root zone of plants.

Small grains which are grazed naturally require more fertilizer than ungrazed grain because of nutrients removed by grazing. About 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen are removed in forages grazed by stocker cattle for each 100 pounds of beef produced per acre. This nitrogen, less some recycling, must be replaced to provide adequate nutrition for grain production after livestock are removed.

A soil test is still the best way to determine fertilizer needs.

Kenneth agreed to the interview with the idea that a request for beef, pork or poultry be stressed. If there is anyone who would like to contribute, your help would be greatly appreciated.

Maybe we could all follow the unselfish example Kenneth has set. Economic conditions are tough right now but we all need to pull together.

At age 82, I asked Kenneth what keeps him strong and alert and he says walking every day is the key. Kenneth's eyes have been so poor for the past 46 years that he could not be issued a drivers license. He said, "I need to have cataract surgery but I don't have time right now because of the garden."

The only element which keeps him from walking is when the temperature is above 95 degrees. He stated that Mr. Charlie Kent was a man who walked everywhere he went and he lived to be 104 years old. There must be something to the theory.

Kenneth's family originated from Fredricksburg. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Jordan. R. B. Jordan was a lawyer who moved to Cross Plains during the oil boom.

The Jordan family were musically inclined and they played for lodges. His father could play any instrument, his mother played the mandolin, a sister played the violin, another sister played the coronet and Kenneth played the piano. Kenneth's face glowed with pride as he talked about their band.

The only other member of his immediate family still living is a brother, Henry Jordan, an electronic engineer in Fort Worth.

When I asked Kenneth if he had ever been married and he said, "Yes, I was married for five years." It seems that his wife went to help her family during the depression of the 1930's and they never were reunited. Finances pressed relations even back then. We are not the only generation to experience the stress.

Kenneth Jordan is a rare individual who has compassion for mankind. His mind is full of stories and facts about the past which are absolutely intriguing. He told me he could fill up the newspaper every week with the knowledge he has stored.

Francis Langdon, who publishes the *Tonkawa (Okla.) News*, tells me the old Methodist parsonage is empty now. The fella who bought it from the church in 1965 has died and the place is up for sale.

Living in this house in the mid-fifties was like having my own amusement park. Good things seemed to happen when you lived at 709 East Grand Avenue - especially if you were a kid.

It had large empty rooms. It had an attic big enough to play a game of catch. It had a basement with spiders and ghosts and anything else my sister and I could conjure up with our imaginations.

There were air vents you could see through from the second story to the first. My grandmother and I once got down on all fours and looked through one of them to watch my Dad perform a marriage ceremony we'd been banned from minutes earlier.

There was a flat roof outside my bedroom and just above the back porch. I used to spend the night out there in the summer. When the sun came up I could shimmy down a drain pipe and run across the street to Tate's Grocery and nourish my body with Hostess cup cakes and Dr. Peppers.

The large, semi-circular front porch was made of wood and I guess you could say the footing was a little unsteady.

I can still see my dad tripping over one of the steps and rolling to an undignified rest on the sidewalk - all 240 pounds of him.

"Dog blast it," said the reverend, just managing to avoid profanity.

It was in this house my dad taught me about Bud when it meant a football coach instead of a brew.

It was here I first listened to OU football games on the radio. As long as I lived in that house, Oklahoma never lost one. The day the Irish from Indiana drove the fatal stake through the hearts of every OU fan in the land, I was looking on tearfully from another parsonage.

In this old house, though, my grade school totally dominated what

my friends and I saw as the more affluent grade school from the other side of the tracks. The Washington Redskins (my team) beat Lincoln (the rich kids) in every sport all three years I lived in that house.

There was one close call with Lincoln, though. Only the house saved us.

The last sport between the two schools my sixth-grade year was the track meet. Going into the 880-relay we were clinging to a narrow lead.

The coach told us it all came down to this race. If we won it, we could "graduate" knowing we had never lost to the miserable Lincoln Bears. But, if we lost, it would be our shame to bear for life.

I just happened to be the anchorman for our relay team. I just happened to be the guy who got the baton with a slight lead over the Lincoln anchorman. And I just happened to be the guy who got passed and beaten to the tape.

Go ahead, tell me about your Charlie Brown humiliations.

Our coach had lied shamelessly in an effort to motivate us for that race, though. Turns out we had just enough points to win the track meet in spite of my failure.

Had I lived in an ordinary parsonage that race would have cost us the city championship. I've never doubted that.

I stopped through Tonkawa a few years ago and met the man who had purchased the house from the Methodists. He led me on a familiar tour.

He seemed to appreciate the old house the way I did, too. I told him a few stories about it and he invited me to come back again. I promised I would and I'm sorry I didn't make it back sooner.

I'm sure he had stored up a few of his own stories of good fortune at 709 East Grand Avenue.

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Conservation Field Day And Tour

To Be Held September 10

A field day and tour will be held at the USDA Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center near Knox City on September 10.

During the noon lunch, a formal program will be held. Manley Wilder, SCS assistant Chief, Washington, D. C., and Waldo Smith, President of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Brenham, will be on the program.

Steve Useton, SCS District Conservationist at Baird said guided tours are planned through the center starting at 8:30 a.m. Tours will run continually until lunch, then again until about 3:00 p.m.

Several selections of plants are being grown at the center that were not being evaluated during the last field day in 1982.

To get to the center, go north of Knox City on State Highway 6 about 2 miles, then turn left at FM 1292 for 2½ miles. There are signs at both the

turn-off and the center, he said.

Useton said Knox City has a 3,200-foot all-weather runway near the center for those wanting to fly to the field day in private or chartered planes. Transportation from the airport to the center will be furnished by the Knox City Chamber of Commerce.

Grass seed dealers, seed growers, conservation district directors, research workers, wildlife enthusiasts, livestock producers, and others interested in the search for better plants are invited to attend. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

Lunch will be served by the Knox City Chamber of Commerce on a prepaid basis at \$5.00 per plate. Payment must be sent to Doris Crowover, Chamber of Commerce, P. O. Box 91, Knox City, Texas 79529. The deadline for making lunch reservations is September 2. Tickets will be held at the registration desk, and no refunds will be made.

Weekly Health Tip

FOAM INSULATION

Two kinds of foam insulation widely used in houses and mobile homes are urea-formaldehyde and polyurethane. The urea-formaldehyde, which is uncured when installed, may release formaldehyde fumes in the home while it's curing. Sensitive persons may react with symptoms of asthma, bronchitis, anxiety, depression - even hypochondria. So far, polyurethane is known to release harmful fumes only when burning.

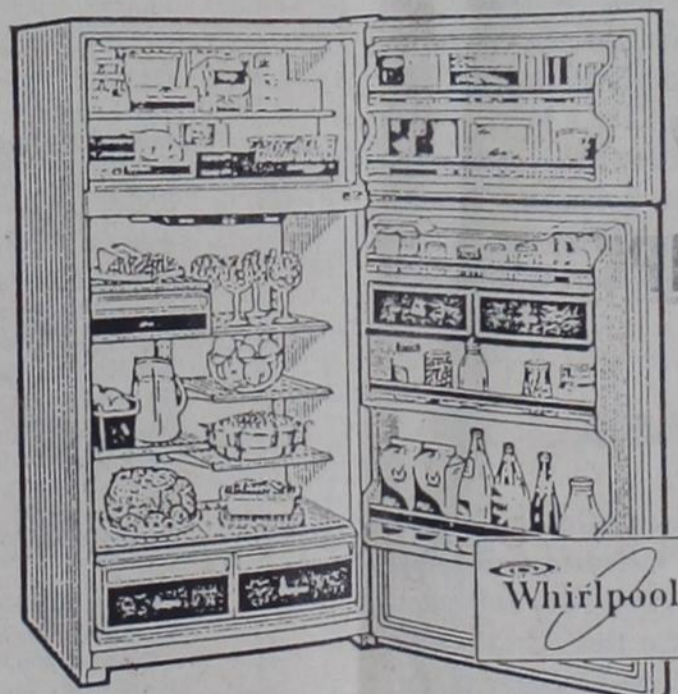
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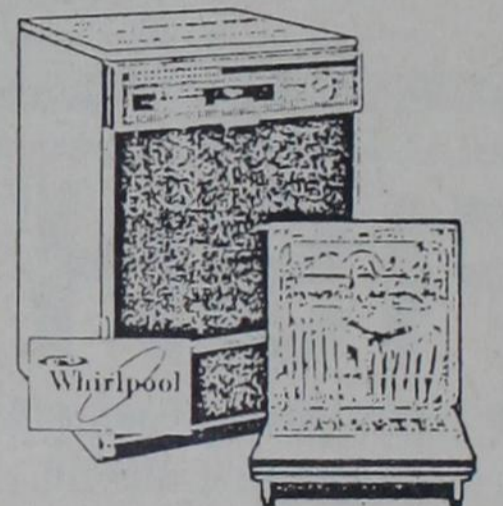
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Bennett Reunion Held August 10

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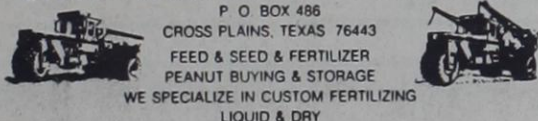
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PIONEER NEWS

Controlling Mesquite And Oak

Mesquite and oak are two of the hardest brush species to eradicate. No matter how good an area is mechanically treated, or how good a chemical is, resprouting or new plants of these pest species is inevitable.

"Cost of controlling mesquite and oak has been on the upswing for many years, so from an economic standpoint, an occasional clean up treatment would save a landowner money in the long run" says Tony Baeza Range Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Baird. "Various methods and chemicals have proven to be effective and economical in keeping mesquites and oak sprouts in check."

Velpar RP has proven to be time saving, as well as economical in controlling mesquite resprouts. Velpar RP is applied to the ground around a mesquite tree, and when it rains, the chemical is dissolved into the soil and picked up by the roots. It is applied with a spot-gun, which screws directly to the gallon or half gallon container, at the rate of 4 ml/inch of tree diameter. At this rate, over 900 one-inch mesquites can be treated with a gallon of chemical.

One of the most effective methods of controlling oak sprouts is by use of goats. Unfortunately, due to the increasing number of coyotes throughout the county, in many cases it has been economically unfeasible to have goats.

Elanco has developed a chemical which is ideal to control oak and other brush species following initial brush control called Spike. Spike comes in pelleted forms and can be safely applied by hand to individual trees at the rate of 4 pellets per inch of tree diameter; but not more than twenty per tree regardless of size of tree.

Like Velpar RP, Spike requires rain to dissolve it and move it through the soil, where it is picked up by the roots. They can be applied anytime of the year, but for fastest results, they should be applied during the rainy season.

Baeza encouraged everyone with brush problems to contact the Soil Conservation Service or the county agent.
