New WTU Refund Asked

West Texas Utilities Company's retail customers will receive another fuel cost refund and a significant decrease in their future electric bills if a request filed Tuesday in Austin is approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

WTU is asking permission to refund a total of \$5.7 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs, and to lower its fuel charge rate for the months of September, October, and November. The total refund includes \$5,425,372 in actual fuel cost savings which have accumulated from March through June, plus \$306,511 in interest.

This would be the third time for WTU to make a refund to lower its fuel cost factor since its last rate increase in November, 1984. Over \$17.6 million was refunded in August 1985, and \$9.3 million was refunded

"This is not an actual rate case filing," WTU President Glen Churchill explained. 'It is an adjustment possible because the price of our boiler fuel has been declining. Any savings we can make on fuel cost is passed on to our customer as soon as permitted."

The due amounts on customer bills include both fuel costs and base rates. Utility companies are not allowed to make money on fuel. WTU has had no change in its base rates since 1984.

If a reduction in fuel rates, technically known as the Interim Quarterly Fixed Fuel Factors, if approved, WTU officials estimate the fuel cost charges to its customers will drop by 24 per cent, or \$7.9 million, during the three-month period beginning in September.

After the state's Public Utility

Regulatory Act was amended in 1983 the PUC ordered the use of the fixed fuel factors and their use was recently re-adopted in an emergency fuel rule. Previously, an automatic fuel adjustment matched fuel billings to fuel expense each month. These immediate adjustments prevented over-recoveries of fuel costs and made refunds unnecessary.

Under WTU's proposal, all existing retail customers would receive refunds through one-time credits to their bills in the billing month of September. A typical residential customer would receive about \$11.00.

Natural gas is the principal fuel for all of WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of the Company's total operating costs, but have dropped from all-time high of \$3.18 per million BTU in 1983 to \$1.88 in June 1986.

Exa stocks all types of China, China paints, brushes, easels, and accessories. She has her China shipped from as far away as California, Michigan and Maryland. Sweetwater is the closest outlet and then Dallas.

The Kiln where the China is fired is located conveniently in the workroom. China is painted and fired in several different steps. At least four firings are necessary to determine colors.

The gold colors (not the 14 karat gold trim) requires more firings to mature. The changes made from one phase to another is fascinating.

Exa was working on a Sesquicentennial plate which she designed and drew. The plate consists of a blue background with a red trim. Inside the outline of the state of Texas is the state bird, the mocking bird, sitting on a branch of the state tree, the pecan, and holding the Texas flag in its beak. Also, the state flower, the blue bonnet, is pictured to the right of the bird. She originated this piece as a sales item and a personal remembrance. Personal and gift items are available at her workroom.

Oil painting is another hobby she is involved in. She is a member of the local Paint and Palette Club. Many of her paintings decorate the walls of her

Exa has been an active member of the Cross Plains Garden Club since 1962. She has served as the president of the local club for three terms, plus various other offices.





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

Other Acteens eligible for scholarships and the semester awards are Queens with a Sceptor, \$125; Queen Regents, \$150; Queen Regents in Service, \$175; and Service Aides, \$200. An additional \$25 per semester may be added for state and national panelists.

Each scholarship is available for the freshman year, provided the student enrolls for a minimum of twelve credit hours each semester. The scholarship is renewable with a minimum grade point average of 2.50 and a course load of at least twelve hours each semester and is available for a maximum of eight semesters.

Application for the scholarship will consist of the HPU General Scholarship application and a letter from the student's local Acteens director or WMU director verifying the level of achievement. Government Grave Markers **Show Military Service**

to Putt Brandon, Veterans Service Officer for Callahan County, government grave markers for Army Air Corps veterans may now be inscribed to show such military

Government grave markers may be furnished by the Veterans Administration for placement at the gravesite of honorably discharged veterans of the U. S. Armed Forces. Prior to recent date, the VA was not allowed to inscribe information pertaining to service in the Army Air Corps, a part of the U.S. Army from 1926 until the establishment of a separate Air Force

Government grave markers furnished by the VA in the past have been inscribed to indicate such service as being in the U. S. Army. Under the new criteria, when a

veteran of the Army Air Corps or Army Air Force dies, his government grave marker may be inscribed to indicate such service.

This applies only to government grave markers issued from now on. Markers previously issued by the VA cannot be returned for any official inscription change.

Service Officers should be aware of this new provision for government grave markers. Whenever possible, they should also see that the funeral homes and directors in their towns and counties are familiar with the change in policy. In many instances, completion of the VA Form 40-1330, Application for Government Headstone, is accomplished with the assistance of the funeral director handling the burial service of the

VA Warns Veterans Of Insurance Hoax

The Veterans Administration is once again warning World War II veterans not to be misled by false information regarding the payment of a special life insurante dividend.

VA Administrator Thomas K. Turnage, responding to a reappearance of a hoax that has plagued the agency for almost 40 years, reiterated that the VA "does not pay dividends on lapsed insurance policies."

The hoax, which first surfaced in 1948, is once again making the rounds resulting in literally thousands of inquiries to the VA from all over the country. It is refueled every few years by the mysterious distribution of "applications" often poorly reproduced, and sometimes directed to a non-existent "Capt. Prosser" at the VA Insurance Center in Philadelphia. The forms claim that dividends are available for the asking and promises World War II veterans a dividend based on their military service, "even if they haven't kept their policies in force."

The bogus application also claims that Congress has passed a law authorizing the dividends. There has been no such action nor is there any pending.

AUSTIN-Two unrelated events occurred recently which promise to alter significantly the course of Texas government and politics:

· Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock told a stalemated Legislature his plan for resolving the deficit, and,

· Texas Republicans formally targeted Democratic House Speaker Gib Lewis for defeat.

Bullock said if the Legislature meets in special session, he will provide a plan to rollback the sales tax by widening the base to include all goods and services, except food, medicine, and medical services.

It's the first real plan to diversify the state's tax base away from unreliable oil and gas revenues. But as it turns out, the Legislature won't get to consider Bullock's plan until next January. Following Bullock's announcement, Gov. Mark White called for an Aug. 6 special session for budget cuts, not tax issues.

White is relying on lawmakers to work the details. Insiders say the state can raise \$1 billion by making agency cuts and redirecting the cigarette tax from parks to general revenue. This keeps the state in the black until the regular session.

Speaker Gib Lewis has steadfastly opposed consideration of a tax hike in special

Speaker Targeted

Lewis holds that since private industry has made cuts. state government should do likewise, and he hinted at the early retirement of over 5,000 state employees to balance the

But in a surprise development, the state GOP Campaign Committee voted unanimously to target him for defeat by giving out-of-district contributions to his opponent.

"I wasn't for us making this race (Lewis') at first, but I am now," said GOP state chairman George Strake, adding the move has more potential risk and reward for the party since Phil Gramm switched parties.

Maybe more than any other strategic act this election year, the GOP decision will have a dramatic impact on the face of Texas politics: it's controversial enough to be rehashed emotionally for years to come. Why controversial?

Lewis is popular and respected in the House by the GOP bloc which helped put him in the Speaker's chair. Historically, they have never had more influence in committees and on the floor.

But his home district grew straight-ticket increasingly Republican, and last election he got only 47 percent of the vote unopposed. His home Democratic base has dwindled.

For Republicans to attack a sitting speaker in his home district, apparently on the basis of party politics and despite the fact he has been good to that party, has all the elements of a political back-shoot. Then again, that's politics.

Two months ago, apologetic Texas Republicans had an excuse, saying it was "a local" deal. Now, the state GOP is in it up to the elbows, and Lewis and conservative Democrats have grown warier.

The GOP gamble is, if Lewis is defeated, their House bloc will grow with new seats won and converted conservative Democrats, and a Republican could be elected speaker.

The risk is that if Lewis is

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reelected, many GOP House members can kiss their political plums and perqs goodbye and watch the reuniting of a stronger Democratic Party faction.

Another scenario has Lewis and the Republicans falling out, the GOP picking their own speaker candidate, and the Democrats choosing someone more liberal than Gib for Speaker.

Other Highlights

· The U.S. Department of Energy has run into a roadblock in its plans to build a high-level nuclear waste dump in a Panhandle farming county. First, they need a Texas Water Commission permit to drill a test shaft through the underground aquifer.

Texas Water Commissioner Ralph Roming, who happens to be a long-time activist for Panhandle farming and water interests, said last week the feds could wait "years" to get their permit.

· Houston state Rep. Ron Wilson renewed his call for the Legislature to pass his bill creating a state lottery which he says would raise the state \$600 million annually.

 The Select Committee on Higher Education agreed to ask the Legislature not to close three state universities, East Texas State University, Texas A&M at Galveston, and the University of Texas at Permian Basin.

It came nowhere close to agreeing on proposals merging UT-Arlington and UT-Dallas, North Texas State University with Texas Woman's University (both in Denton).

 Witnesses testified in a Houston state district court that no-pass, no-play affected more than one in five minority students, one in three learning disabled pupils, as compared with 15 percent of white students. Data came from hundreds of school districts.

· Responding to a petition, the Railroad Commission decided it will hold public hearings on whether the state's allowable oil and gas production can be regulated to avoid

 Hispanic leaders asked Attorney General Jim Mattox to take legal sanctions against a paramilitary group which plans to patrol the Rio Grande border for drug smugglers and illegal aliens.
