### Keep Em Busy

Our esteemed state legislature is not exactly covering itself with glory during the current session, and Governor Bill isn't doing a whole lot better.

About the only major decision they have made so far was an irresponsible act to say the least.

At Governor Bill's urging, our lawmakers have robbed \$32.5 million from badly-needed highway funds to help bail out the Texas prison system and pay compensation claims of state workers.

As they usually do when they want to get a bad idea onto the books, they did this in a hurry without even giving highway officials a chance to comment on the plan.

In a letter to the editor in Sunday's Abilene Reporter-News, Tom K. Eplen, an Abilene attorney and bona fide expert on Texas highways, called this a masterpiece of juggling and a matter of robbing Peter to pay Paul.

He explained this raid on highway funds much better than I can and I highly recommend that you read his letter if you've still got Sunday's Reporter-News lying around.

But I read a couple of other stories in issues of the Reporter-News last week that gave me an idea of how we can solve this problem of an inept legislature — keep them busy with other, unimportant matters.

There was another story in the Sunday paper about the pigeon population around the Capitol being about 400, which is about twice as high as the groundskeeper thinks it should be.

They were trying to figure out what to do with these excess birds. I say they should let them be. If the lawmakers are busy sidestepping pigeon droppings, maybe they won't have time to pass other bad legislation like the highway fund raid.

Also, last week there was a story about House members unanimously approving making the Lightning Whelk the official sea shell of Texas.

Same maneuver. Let's think up a lot of other "official" things they can designate - like the state's official insect, or the official weed of the state. Why, if we really put our heads together on this, we could keep them tied up until the session is over and they can't be of any more danger.

He was born August 24, 1912 in Cross Plains. He retired in 1974 from the Texas Highway Department where he



#### Land Bank Announces Rate Reduction

AUSTIN — The Federal Land Bank will reduce its interest rates for long-term mortgages on June 1, according to James R. Isenhower, president of Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman. Don Rogge, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas, announced the rate change at the bank's annual meeting.

Isenhower and other officials of the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman were among the more than 500 Federal Land Bank Association stockholders who met in Austin recently. Local association officials attending the annual meeting with Isenhower were Directors W.R. Hickman, Jr., and Jim Bob Thweatt of Coleman and Hadden Payne of Cross Plains.

The Land Bank's new variable rates will be 10.25 percent on farm and ranch loans and 10.50 percent on farm related business loans and rural residence loans. The decrease represents a one-half of one percent reduction on farm and ranch loans and a three-quarters of one percent reduction on farm related business loans and rural residence loans.

"In some ways, our situation looks a little better today than it did last year at this time," says Isenhower.

"For the most part, the Texas District has the authority to set its own interest rates. Until last fall, that was all being determined by the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D.C.," says Isenhower. "Also, we were pleased with the recent court decisions regarding the assessments on the Texas District."

Federal judges in both Texas and Massachusetts ruled earlier this year that at least one of the regulations which required stronger banks like Texas to transfer funds to troubled banks in the system was invalid.

Rogge also announced a new loan program he said the FLB plans to initiate within the next 60 days. The program carries an even lower interest rate for loans to buy rural real estate.

The Federal Land Bank makes loans for a term of 35 years. This program will provide a fixed rate for the first 10 years of the loan. Rogge said he anticipates the rate will be set at approximately 8 7/8 percent. He added that the lower interest rate will be available only for a limited time.

Aimed at stimulating the state's sagging teal estate market, Rogge said the plan possibly would encourage other real state lenders to initiate similar programs, further enhancing land price stabilization efforts. He said details of the plan will be available soon.
