Lawmaker on Liability

I just got a letter from Rick Perry, our state representative, enclosing a guest editorial he had written and requested me to run in the paper.

I think he did a pretty good job talking about a subject that is in a crisis situation, liability insurance.

In fact, I wonder if he might want my job. On second thought, though, I doubt it. I sure don't want his.

Anyway, his editorial follows:

A man in New York City recently tried to commit suicide by jumping in front of a subway train. Although hit by the train, he was not fatally injured. He sued the city, claiming the engineer of the train should have been able to stop sooner. He received \$650,000 for

A young man attempting to burglarize a school building fell through a skylight. He sued the school district's insurer, and settled out of court for \$260,000.

. Unfortunately, cases of this type are no longer the wild exceptions that they once were. All over our nation, juries are awarding more and larger awards than ever before. This is just one of many factors behind the current crisis in the liability insurance industry.

Business people don't have to be told how sharply liability insurance premiums have increased in the last year; that's assuming they can still buy coverage. Insurance companies, faced with numerous lawsuits and claims, are raising their rates to prohibitive prices.

Local governments are not immune, either. Many cities, unable to afford the high premiums, have dropped their existing coverage and gone to a form of self-insurance. According to the Associated Press, at least 45 of Oklahoma's 77 counties either have no liability coverage, or face immediate cancellation of existing policies. Many Texas counties are in equally bad

In my opinion, this crisis has three causes. As I mentioned earlier, large jury awards are one. Sometimes it seems that people lose all perspective when they sit on a jury. They see the injured party; they see the insurance company; they decide that someone should pay for the injuries. The insurance company is the natural choice.

Unfortunately, it is NOT the insurance company who pays; you and I, and even the juror in that case, are the ones who pay. Those jury awards eventually translate into larger and larger premiums and policy cancella-

Furthermore, when a small businesswoman decides he can no longer afford his premiums, curtails

his operations, and lays off half his work force, that action causes ripples throughout a community. Given that every dollar turns over seven times before it leaves the local economy, the multiplied effect of such layoffs can be devastating to a small town, especially one already depressed because of other economic factors.

Another reason for the current crisis is the financial mismanagement of some insurance companies. During the high interest rates of the 70's, many insurance companies cut premiums and took on bad risks in order to have more money to invest. Claims from those policies and the much lower interest rates of today have helped bring about sharp cost increases and cancellations.

Finally, some of the blame must be shared by trial lawyers. Currently, most attorneys take one-third of any award received; if they lose, they get nothing. While the contingency fee system makes it possible for the "little man" to retain good legal counsel that he otherwise could not afford, it also encourages larger claims and frivolous

A legal doctrine called "joint and several liability" has also been sharply criticized. This tactic allows a plaintiff to sue everyone connected with his case, no matter how remote the connection might be; the effect is to find the person with the highest coverage and make them pay, even if they had no direct involvement. For example, a man in a phone booth which is hit by a car can sue not only the driver of the car, but also the manufacturer, the phone company, the city and the merchant who owned the property. In my opinion, this "shotgun's approach to liability is very unfair.

Reforms are clearly needed to curb abuses and make liability insurance affordable again. The Texas Legislature, which meets again next January, has empaneled a special select committee to study the causes and make recommendations for

Some of the changes being considered include placing caps on the size of jury awards, elimination of joint and several liability, and reforms of the contingency fee system. Limits on awards for "pain and suffering" and punitive damages have been pro-

Insurance companies are also being investigated, to make sure that they are not taking advantage of the situation to artificially raise rates and cancel policies.

Obviously, there are times when lawsuits are needed to force a negligent party to pay for its actions. The citizens of this state and nation must have the right to seek justice in the courts. It is clear to me, however, that the system is being abused and must be reformed. Liability insurance must be made affordable again. The time for action is now.

Many of the "ins and outs" of the cattle business will be discussed at the Heart-O'-Texas Cow-Calf Clinic at Brownwood, May 8.

The clinic, which will be at the Brownwood Civic Center, will begin with registration from 8:15-9:00 a.m.

Harry Holt, farm and ranch director for KRBC-TV in Abilene, will serve as moderator for the clinic, which is a cooperative effort of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System and the Texas Power and Light Company.

Leadoff speaker will be Walt Richburg, senior vice president of the Uvalde Bank. Richburg will discuss "Financing the Cow-Calf Operator."

Then Richburg will moderate a panel discussion relating to beef cattle finances. On the panel will be Robert Hopper of Temple, state director of the Farmers Home Administration; Don Neal, a Temple rancher; and Robert WHitten of San Saba, president of the Cattlemen's Production Credit Assn.

Another featured speaker will be Dave Ferrelli of Dallas, manager of meat marketing with Kroger's. He will talk on "Red Meat Consumption - Influencing and Reacting to Consumer Trends.'

How ranchers can increase profits with improved range management will be discussed by Dr. Milo Shult, associate director of the Extension Service.



USDA Conservation Sign-UP May 5-16

Scott Odom, CED of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service today reported that a second sign-up period for the new USDA Conservation Reserve Program will be held from May 5 through May 16, 1986.

Farmers will be offered the opportunity to bid for a Conservation Reserve Program contract for either the 1986 or the 1987 crop year. Bids may be offered for both years, providing different acreage is involved.

Producers cannot harvest any 1986 crop planted on land to be placed in the program. For contracts which are effective immediately, annual payments will be made beginning October 1, 1986 or later, producers will be allowed to harvest their 1986 crop, and no annual payments will be made before October 1, 1987.

Odom said farmers will receive annual rental payments for participating in the program, the amounts depending on the bids per acre and the number of acres under the 10 year contracts. Program participants also will receive conservation payments of up to 50 percent of eligible cost of establishing trees or grass on the acres placed in the Conservation Reserve Program.

"The rental payments will compensate farmers for retiring highly erodible cropland from crop production.' said Odom, "and the conservation payments will partially reimburse farmers for the one-time costs of establishing required conservation practices on the highly erodible cropland."

He said the annual rental payments will be issued as soon as possible after October 1 of each calendar year. Conservation payments will be made as soon as possible after individual participants report the approved conservation practice is completed.

Teachers' Vow

Of all the opposition groups, teachers have the most at

They have publicly vowed to teach Mark White a lesson, singling him out as the man who broke promises to them when he forced the Legislature into special session to pass the

HB 72 education reforms. Last week, thousands of teachers, coaches and principles held a rally at the Capitol and, in speech after speech, blasted the governor for raising taxes, utility rates and

Several candidates spoke to the orderly crowd, including Crowder, Hance and Loeffler, to court their votes.

And long-time political watchers are predicting that if teachers do not unseat Mark White, they will have zero political influence for years to

Supreme Court

Besides the gubernatorial combat, the raft of candidates competing for seats on the Texas Supreme Court are providing the most action.

The issue of ethics on the court continues to surface as the press and a legislative panel probe the conduct of some justices.

Last week, one Texas newspaper reported six justices attended a debutante ball in '83 as guests of an attorney, who only the day before received a favorable landmark decision from them.

All nine justices were invited by attorney Bill Edwards, but only William Kilgarlin, C. L. Ray, Ted Robertson, James Wallace, Sears McGee and

Franklin Spears attended. Some of the weekend expenses were also paid for by Edwards. At the time of the ball, Edwards still had four personal-injury cases pending before the court.

Later, Justices Ray, Robertson, Spears and Wallace voted for the attorney's position in all those cases.

At question is whether the justices violated the spirit of keeping an "arms length" relationship with lawyers with

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cases pending.

Attorney General

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox announced his office was awarded a federal grant to track down parents who cross state lines to avoid making child-support payments.

Mattox will use the \$2.3 million grant to establish a national computer system, the first of its kind, to track down

those who welch.

He said Texas, California and Florida have the highest number of cases.

Capitol Arson

Mattox also said arson specialists have definite suspects in connections with a March 4 fire in the attorney general's office in Austin.

Another fire was set in the AG's Fort Worth office at about the same time, and Mattox expects evidence to link the

Mattox also issued a legal opinion that oil exchanged under contract should be classi-fied as "receipts" for state franchise purposes.

The ruling will probably lead to "tens of millions" in higher

franchise taxes for some oil companies, according to a spokesman for Comptroller Bob Bullock.

"White Oil" Appeal

The controversial "white oil" lawsuit, which threatens to undo the economy of several Panhandle towns, finally reached the 3rd Court of Appeals last week.

At stake is the ownership of some \$25 billion in oil and gas reserves in the Panhandle Field, about eight counties.

At issue is whether operators can use refrigeration units to chill gas vapors and use the extra liquid, or "white oil," to meet the Railroad Commission's test for an oil well.

The court is expected to rule sometime this year.

Title Insurance Savings


The State Board of Insurance last week advised homeowners who are refinancing mortgages as interest rates continue to fall that a current SBI rule may entitle them to a substantial reduction in their title insurance premiums.

Insurance Board members said many property owners who have refinanced loans which are no more than four years old may take advantage of the rule. In some instances, the rule may save the borrower up to 80 per cent of the usual title insurance premium.

Mark Gentle, SBI assistance director of title insurance, said he has been receiving complaints from homeowners who were denied the refinance credit although they clearly
