Doesn't It Look Familiar?

I'm no oil expert.

I know you drill a hole in the ground to get it and that's the extent of my expertise.

But I do possess a good deal of gasoline-buying expertise, as most everybody else in the country does, and I think what I'm about to say is thought by most everybody.

We all have this feeling in the pits of our stomachs that this cheap gas is not going to last long. In fact, I wouldn't be surprised to see it higher at the end of this year than it was at the end of 1985.

They can talk all they want to about OPEC and the spot market and the commodities exchange price. This cheap gas was brought on pure and simple by a glut created by fuelefficient cars.

I've got a 1986 hotrod Buick that will get nearly 30 miles to the gallon on the highway. I had a new non-hotrod Buick in 1975 that wouldn't come close to getting even half that many miles to the gallon.

You multiply, say, 15 miles to the gallon by millions of miles by millions of cars and that's a lot of gasoline not being burned.

So, how are they going to combat this and drive the price of gas back up? Simple. They cut back big on the amount of gas for sale. That's easy to do. They just quit pumping it out of the ground. Then when it gets scarce and the price goes up, they just start pumping again.

They're kind of using a lesson taught by the coffee-bean growers. Any time they want to jump the price of coffee, all they have to do is say they had a big freeze, or drought, or something, in Colombia and it severely hurt the bean crop. Sure enough, the price of a can of coffee takes a big jump.

And with an oil well, you don't even have to blame it on a drought. You just quit pumping.

I'm not saying this is wrong. It's not, as far as the oil producers are concerned. If I had any oil wells, I'd do the same thing. After all, they're not in the business for their health.

But it looks like the old federal government is falling into a trap, as the old federal government is prone to do. Some federal gas mileage requirements imposed against U. S. automakers have already been relaxed and it looks like more relaxation

So, the old U. S. automakers will the old U. S. automakers are prone to do, and start making gas-guzzlers

And where will the old consumer be? Right in the middle, as the old consumers are prone to be, owning a gas-guzzler with high gas prices.

So what will happen then? Everybody will start wanting a highmileage Jap car again and the old U. S. automakers will scramble to start making high-mileage cars again.

Doesn't this all sound a bit familiar?

Program on Summer Reading to Begin Here

"All About Texas", this year's summer reading program at the Cross Plains Public Library, will begin on Wednesday morning, June 11, at 10 a.m. It will continue on Wednesday through July 16. Students who were in grades 1 - 6 during the 1985-86 school year are eligible for the program. The theme offers so many possibilities that students are encouraged to enroll before June 11 so that the program can get under way the first day.

The first session will include an overview of the six programs, a film, "Star of the Republic," the breaking of a pinata, refreshments, and checking out books. Other areas of involvement include Indian lore, arrowhead collections, picture writing, songs of the "six flags," wild flowers, rope tricks, rodeo clowns, Texas folklore, the filling of a time capsule, and other activities to be planned.

Another event for school-age people is the contest related to the Robert E. Howard Commemoration. The Friends of the Library are sponsoring a poster contest open to students in grades 1 - 12. The theme is to be any aspect relating to the writings of Howard or to his life. Suggestions might be the artist's idea of Conan (not based on those of artists who illustrate the books), of Howard himself, or of the world Howard used in his Conan stories. Imagination is the word.

Entries should have the student's name and grade in the lower right hand corner. They must be submitted at the library by June 10 for judging. Three winners will be chosen, one each from grades 1-4; 5-8; 9-12. Winners will be announced and prizes awarded at the library on Saturday, June 14, during an open house to be held between 2:00 and 4:00 p.m.

Blood Drive Set

The AARP, Kiwanis and Beta Sigma Phi are co-sponsoring a Community Blood Drive on June 10, between 11:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. at the Cross Plains Community Center. The blood will be donated to the Meek Community Blood Bank at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

The response to the drive last October was very good and several rare blood types including AB negative, O negative and B negative were obtained. The O positive type was valuable too.

Members of the community have already benefited from earlier dona-

Approximately 67% of all people use blood, yet only 5% donate. Any person in good health is eligible. Seventeen (17) year olds may donate with parental consent. Those over 66 can donate with written permission of their physician. If you take medication, note the name and dosage so your eligibility may be determined.

Your blood type makes no difference because every type is the right type. The rarest blood is the type that's not available when you need it.

If you wait until there is an emergency to donate, it could be too late. It takes 6 hours to do the necessary typing and testing of the blood. It must be available at the very moment it is needed, and your needs cannot be met if the supply is not

Some people feel that a large amount of blood is discarded but less than 5% of the blood collected was not used within 21 days after dona-

If you plan on participating in this worthwhile project you need to eat a good meal before donating. It only takes 30 minutes to give a pint of blood. If you donated every time you were able, in one year it would only take three hours of your time.

Remember, you save a life when you donate blood!





5 Bingo Groups Suspended

AUSTIN — State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said five bingo organizations were suspended for failing to distribute 35 percent of their proceeds to charity.

"We're just making sure bingo organizations are complying with the law. If they don't they'll lose their licenses just like these groups did," Bullock said.

All of the groups were given the opportunity to voluntarily surrender their license or be suspended.

Bullock issued the 35 percent rule after the Legislature failed to adopt bingo reform legislation last year. The rule requires bingo organizations to distribute a minimum of 35 percent of adjusted gross receipts (gross receipts minus prizes) to charity quarterly.

"The Legislature legalized bingo in Texas to benefit charities," Bullock said. "I'm going to see that this happens."

Bullock also suspended 19 groups and 3 groups surrendered their licenses for not filing their reports on time. Bullock's office reviews individual quarterly reports and will continue to do so to ensure compliance with the rules.



WASHINGTON — On June 18, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will begin to poll wheat producers to determine whether they favor the imposition of mandatory limits on wheat production, a USDA official announced today. The poll is required by the Food Security Act of 1985.

Richard W. Goldberg, acting under secretary for international affairs and commodity programs, said the poll is non-binding upon the Secretary of Agriculture and response by wheat producers is voluntary. Producers will be asked if they favor imposition of mandatory limits on production of wheat which will result in wheat prives that are not lower than 125 percent of the cost of production.

Each producer will be mailed a wheat Poll ballot on June 18. Responses must be postmarked by July 7.



3 Rule Changes For Charity Bingo

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday issued three rule changes affecting charity bingo games in Texas.

"The charities should be getting the money from these bingo games. We just want to make sure they do," Bullock said.

Bullock now requires an officer of the organization applying for a license appear in person at the Comptroller's office in Austin to be briefed on the requirements for holding a bingo license. License suspensions in past months resulted because bingo operations failed to fully understand what the law requires for holding a bingo license.

Another rule change prohibits landlords, distributors and manufacturers from being involved in the operation of a bingo game and also prevents them from paying expenses or lending money to bingo organizations.

"We're just spelling out what the spirit of the law intended-that bingo games are to be run by the organization holding the bingo license,"

Bullock said.

The third rule change requires licensed charity landlords to place money from bingo rental proceeds in the bingo account, not in their general account to make sure bingo proceeds money isn't co-mingled with other funds.

Bullock said these changes were implemented to insure the charities get the benefits from bingo games.


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
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AUSTIN-In the latest salvo of what promises to develop into a full-scale political struggle, Texas officials vowed to force the feds to put a pro-posed nuclear waste dump site somewhere besides the Pan-

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby changed the complexion of summer political campaigning by confirming the likelihood of new and expanded state sales taxes next session.

Hobby said he would resolve a projected \$1.3 billion deficit by broadening the state sales tax-base to include several professional services now exempted. Food and medicine would continue to be ex-

empted. When the most powerful man in the Legislature speaks, all listen. While others tend to play coy or demagogue about tax issues, Hobby's expertise and reputation for integrity lend the aura of "bottom line" to his statements.

Govs To Debate

This year Texas Republicans are using the specter of new taxes to attract support. They say they'll cut state spending rather than raise taxes.

Whether or not that's realistic, they've scared such tax advocates as Gov. Mark White, a Democrat, into silence on

Last week, White and former Gov. Bill Clements agreed to a Texas League of Women Voters debate. Their handlers are arranging a date now.

The prospect of additional sales taxes, now vague, may be polarized into aye and nay by then, because Hobby has said it must be considered. He makes other Democrats consider a tax increase; he makes Republicans reconsider how frugal they want to be.

Breadbasket Nuke Dump

President Reagan last week chose the proposed nuke dump site in Deaf Smith County for the final three sites being considered by the feds. It made residents and some Texas officials hopping mad, again.

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox vowed a lawsuit to stop the project's location in a major Texas farm and ranch center. And Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower and others swore to get in on the fight, too, to protect the Ogllala Aquifer, as well.

Reagan's decision is considered one that will drastically change the farming community there, whether the highlevel nuclear waste dump is eventually built.

The U.S. Energy Department plans to spend \$850 million in six years studying the nine-mile square site. While the study will employ some 800, as much as 350 acres of privately owned farm land may be purchased or con-demned by the government.

The fight will go on for a long time. For now, this issue puts Texas Republicans on the spot, just as the tax issue touches Democrats in the '86 general election.

Other Highlights

-Capitol architects planned to put up the aluminum Goddess of Liberty statue last weekend with a helicopter. In the time capsule were official letters, and a gold "GIB" lapel pin from Speaker Gib Lewis.

-Gov. White indicated last week he may seek a third term if re-elected, a move to counter rumors he has visions of the White House.

-The governor's wife hits the campaign trail this month to bring disillusioned and angry teachers back into his fold. A recent TSTA survey indicated some 41 percent of Texas public school teachers are thinking of finding new jobs.

-For those political observers who know Houston turns out the most voters, a local poll shows 21 percent of its residents plan to move within two years for economic reasons.

-In the area of state agencies, the Department of Human Services plans to seek a 20 percent boost in state funding next year, while the Texas Education Agency said they have trimmed \$140 million from this year's budget.

-The longtime doorman of the Texas Senate, Joseph Lowell Gault, who died last week, drew tributes from Hobby and other leaders of the Senate.

-State District Judge Byron Croiser of Cleburne was indicted on two misdemeanor counts of official misconduct related to jury empaneling.

-Texas senior citizens are planning a "Silver Haired Legislature" for September, an exercise in electing delegates to participate in a mock government. The idea is to learn more about the legislative process in order to lobby more successfully for laws of interest to senior citizens.

One in six farmers to leave business during this year

(AUSTIN)--More than one out of every six farmers and ranchers questioned in Texas expect to leave agriculture before the end of 1986, according to a new survey conducted for the Texas Department of Agriculture by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Poor financial conditions in agriculture were cited by 18 percent of those surveyed as their primary reason for leaving. Texas has approximately 184,00 farmers and ranchers.

The Texas percentages are about double the level of lowa farmers now experiencing economic problems. according to a similar survey in that state, suggesting that the worst of the farm depression is moving into the

While producers in every area of the state reported serious financial problems, the greatest concentrations of financially-stressed farmers appeared in the Panhandle and Gulf Coast areas. In the Panhandle, 23 percent of farmers and ranchers surveyed said 1986 would be their last year, with 87 percent of those citing financial reasons for their exit from

Along the Gulf Coast, 19 percent of farmers surveyed expected to leave farming this year.

The Panhandle and Gulf Coast areas also claim the greatest percentage of commercial, full-time family farmers, those with gross sales between \$40,000 and \$500,000. Although only 31 percent of the survey respondents statewide fell into that category, over 50 percent of Panhandle producers and 43 percent of Gulf Coast producers had sales in that range. In contrast, 78 percent of the respondents in East Texas reported gross annual sales of

The most immediate problem indicated by the survey is credit. Over 20 percent fewer Texas farmers and ranchers applied for loans in 1986 than in 1985. Among the factors affecting this decline are delays in farm program regulations, tighter requirements from commercial lenders and a 50 percent cut in Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) direct loan funds. FmHA provides about 16 percent of operating loan money for Texas farmers.

Again, the Panhandle and Gulf Coast areas will be most affected by credit problems, since producers there depend more heavily on credit. Sixtyseven percent of Panhandle producers and 56 percent of Coastal producers applied for credit in 1985, compared to 49 percent statewide.

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

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
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
