Mesquite Pollution

Old timers can remember when we used to have clear, bubbling springs in this part of the country.

If you know where to look, there are still sites beside creeks where Indians set up camps. Obviously those creeks ran year-around because there are signs that the Indians stayed there for several years.

The Pecan Bayou which runs through the south part of Callahan County used to flow all the time. (I've heard tell it's the western-most officially-designated bayou in the U.S. meaning it had the same characteristics as the bayous of Louisiana.)

What happened?

A story in the Abilene Reporter-News last week gave a big part of the explanation.

This area has been polluted by mesquite trees which have sapped the water from the land.

These trees are not native to our part of the world. They were planted in our land in the form of beans which had stuck to the hooves of cattle driven up from Mexico. (Sometime look at a very old photograph of the landscape of some West Texas area. See any mesquite trees?)

But there's hope we can partially return to the past as far as the mesquites are concerned. The AR-N story quoted rancher S.F. Henderson who has been fighting the mesquite for years on his 13,000-acre ranch in Ector County.

He reported his brush control has paid off with the recharging of underground water supplies and the development of a series of springs on his ranch.

Ranchers in Tom Green County bulldozed and sprayed 35,000 acres of brush north of San Angelo and are now reporting that 10 miles of a creek there has begun to flow again. The creek now runs about 40 feet across and is home to several species of fish.

Public hearings have recently been held at an A&M research center near San Angelo on a brush control program approved by the State Legislature last year.

The new program would provide for reimbursement of up to 70 percent of the cost of brush eradication. However, the legislature has not yet funded the program. If you like water, you might want to talk to your legislator about it.

But I know how to get rid of the mesquite. Discover that it's good for something (besides using little chips of it to smoke meat). Then a blight will come along and wipe them out.

Hospital Use Confronts Baird

For two years now, approximately 10,000 square feet of building in downtown Baird has been empty.

If the building sits for much longer without anyone occupying it, Baird can add one more old run-down abandoned building to it's downtown area

The building, of course, is the Callahan County Hospital which will have been closed two years come this September.

Questions of what to do with the building have been raised recently, after directors of the Mental Health/Mental Retardation program in Abilene brought a proposal to the county commissioners recently about renting the building.

The MH/MR program was wanting to turn the hospital into an activity center for 10 to 12 mentally retarded from Callahan County.

The proposal presented was designed to get those same children out of the state school and into a program where they could become productive members of society.

County commissioners took no action on the matter at their April 14 meeting, but some questions of the legality of leasing the building have been brought up with the commis-

The hospital, built in 1938 by the WPA (Work Projects Administration) of the federal government, was last leased by United Hospital. The group ran the hospital for about two years, before finally giving up, and the building hasn't been used since.

From 1938 to 1975 the county ran the hospital, until it was leased to Dr. Laurence Gayao of Clyde.

Hendrick Medical Center's parent company leased the hospital after Dr. Gayao, before turning it over to United Hospital. Hendrick's ran the hospital for only nine months.

Each group that has leased the

hospital gave the same reason for it's failure, lack of census or the lack of

To reach the break even point, 12 patients must pass through the hospital daily. During the final months before United left, only two to four patients were arriving daily.

With the close proximity of Hendrick and Humana (West Texas Medical Center at the time), many patients were making the short drive to Abilene for medical care.

There has been no interest shown in reopening the hospital since the United group left.

Although it is doubtful the building will again be used as a hospital, county commissioners still seem to have some hope someone will take it over.

The hospital still has all the hospital beds, televisions, some lab and operating room equipment in the building, so commissioners don't want to get rid of the equipment in case someone might want to re-open it.

Another suggestion of what to do with the building was to turn it into a minor emergency medical clinic. According to companies associated with those clinics, they will not go into a county with a population under 35,000.

County commissioners have also heard suggestions of turning the building into an office center and lease it out, but there seems to be some legal questions pertaining to that proposal.

Another suggestions was to just sell the hospital, but there also seems to be problems there, legally.

County commissioners seem to have their hands tied concerning with what to do with the hospital. It seems either the county is forced to make the building a hospital or nothing at all.

Most agree that something needs to be done with the building. Like County Judge Mack Kniffen said, before long the hospital building will look like the Texas and Pacific Railroad depot in downtown Baird did, before recent renovations to the depot.

Fry Now, Pay Later, Under the Sun

The American Cancer Society (ACS) has some words of warning for Texans looking forward to spending time outdoors during the long days of

If you fry now, you may pay later, the Society cautions, because every exposure to the sun ages and damages skin. Skin cancer is the most serious form of "payment" for sun worshippers. More than 400,000 new cases of skin cancer will be diagnosed this year. While the vast majority are highly curable, the problem itself is largely preventable by exercising good sense and taking simple precautions.

"Young people, especially, are unaware of the cumulative amount of damage they are getting when they get too much sun," said Linda N. White, R. N., Houston, Chairman of the ACS Texas Division skin cancer program development committee. "They think because nothing happens this year, or in five years, that everything's okay."

"Also, a lot of people are unaware of the damage done other than skin cancer wrinkles, drying out, the aging process," White added.

"Geographically, skin cancer is more prevalent in the Sun Belt, and because we are in the Sun Belt, people are at higher risk," White

Also at high risk for developing skin cancer are people with lightly-pigmented skin and people who work or spend a great deal of recreational time outdoors.

Because skin cancer occurs more frequently than any other type of cancer, it is important to recognize its warning signals: a sore that does not heal; any unusual skin condition, especially a change in the size or color of a mole or other darkly pigmented growth or spot.

To reduce the risk of damage from too much sun, the Society advises to: *cover up - wear hats and protective clothing;

*use sunscreens - apply sunscreen at least an hour before going into the sun and again after swimming or perspiring heavily;

*avoid the midday sun - between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. the sun's ultraviolet rays (the ones that do the damage) are strongest;

"don't use indoor sun lamps,

tanning parlors or tanning pills. In addition to taking precautions in the sun, the Society recommends

monthly skin self-exams to note any changes in moles, blemishes on birthmarks.

Vets Can Save on Closing Costs toger . the necessary down

AUSTIN - "Texas Veterans can now save as much as \$1,000 - \$1,400 in up front closing costs by using the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program," Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro announced today.

The popular VHAP program offers Texas Veterans a \$20,000 30-year fixed-rate loan at 9.5 percent to apply toward the purchase of a home. When combined with a federal VA loan, no down payment is required.

"The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program is still the best deal around," said Mauro, who also serves as Chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board, "No other loan, not even a federal VA loan, can match its low rate and easy terms."

Mauro reminded Texas REALTORS that, since the federal VA loan rate is currently charging 9.5 with 5-7 points, and since the Texas VHAP \$20,000 loan charges and no. points, a Texas veteran can save as much as \$1,000 - \$1,400 in up front closing costs by using a VHAP loan. The only additional fees with a Texas. VHAP loan are a 1 percent origination fee and a 1 percent funding fee.

"We always recommend going VHAP whenever we're working with a Veteran," said Dot Ray, president of the Lufkin Board of Realtors. "The savings can easily be the difference in whether or not a Veteran can get

Mauro also noted that a recent decision by the Texas Veterans Land Board will allow Texas Veterans to participate in all three of the Veterans programs administered by the board the Texas Veterans Land Program, the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program, and the new Texas Veterans Home Improvement Loan Program.

"By allowing multiple participation in all three programs, we have effectively tripled the number of state benefits for every Texas Veteran," Mauro said.

"What this means is Texas Veterans can now get a \$20,000 loan to buy a house and get a \$20,000 loan to buy land and get \$15,000 home improvement loan to make repairs to their residence," Mauro explained. Mauro said the effects of multiple eligibility on the program will be studied during a four-month test period beginning June 17 and at the end of that period the board will decide whether or not to make the eligibility change permanent.

Loans for the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program are made through more than 200 approved lenders across the state. To find out how to participate in this program or the land or home improvement programs, Veterans can call toll-free 1-800-252-VETS for assistance.

Reading the writings of some columnists and syndicated cartoonists, I realize the vast number of people like those there must be in our government.

That explains, but doesn't help, the eternal sense of frustration an American feels who believes some self-protection is a right, a necessity and, to some extent, a responsibility, since law enforcement cannot do it all.

Recently, I read a column in The Odessa American by Mike Royko. The story seemed familiar, but, on the other hand, it was obviously a science fiction scenario about a mad gun running loose and accidentally shooting Press Secretary James Brady while gunning for President Reagan.

The cast included the good guys, Brady's wife, Brady and the gun control advocates, and the bad guy, Reagan, the crooked judge who wouldn't rule against the main villain,

Those of you who remember reading the column and noticed the shoddy resemblence between it and the true story will notice that, in it, the real criminal, the man who pulled the trigger of the gun, was curiously absent. Also absent was the fact that Reagan himself was shot, a fact the press has played down, if not completely ignored, since it happened.

Have you ever wondered why it is that, whenever anyone is stabbed, bombed, beaten to death or killed in any way other than with the use of a gun, these people are not jumping up and down wanting tighter controls and doing away with these substitutes?

There are at least two reasons. One is that campaigning for gun control is fashionable, particularly among the nonsense, elite groups, but to touch on any other form of death is considered bad taste.

Another is influence by Communist countries. It would be frightening for me to know, even roughly, how much money these countries pour into strong lobbying for gun control, are paying off politicians to introduce more frivoulous laws, tying the hands of the judicial system and letting murderers loose, thus making gun control more attractive for naive people who cannot figure out what's

Let's face it, America has more than its share of naive people.


