Sweetwater's Wiggling Big Deal

It's certainly a big deal, as evidenced by the fact that it pulled in 35,000 people over a weekend.

I have only one question: Why? I took Reporter-News columnist Art Lawler up on his invite and went with him recently to the Sweetwater Rattlesnake Round-Up. It was the first time either of us had ever been.

There was a huge crowd. It looked like the West Texas Fair on free night for school kids.

Of course, Lawler chickened-out first, saying he was NOT going to eat any rattlesnake meat. I was sure glad he did, because I had no intention of eating any either.

They can say it tastes like chicken all they want to, but I don't eat anything that's still wiggling when you toss it in the cooking batter.

The event was started in 1958 by the Jaycees there who said they wanted to help out the area cattlemen who were losing alot of livestock to rattlers.

It has grown into a real happening and they bagged something like 8 tons of rattlesnake this year, so it doesn't look like they're making much of an inroad toward eradicating the deadly varmint.

The hunters bring in the snakes, weigh them and they're dumped in various pits in the Coliseum for public viewing.

And that's where my "why?" question comes in.

Once you've seen umpteen hundred wiggling rattlesnakes in some pits, you've seen them. That's it, the spectacle is over. You know that seeing that many snakes together is never going to be a big deal to you again.

They make a big show of milking the poison out of the snakes and of skinning them (if you can call watching some guys behead, gut and peel the skin off snake after snake in an assembly-line process a show).

Most people didn't seem to find all this unappetizing though. I saw a bunch of people munching on fried rattlesnake meat while they watched the guts being pulled out of other snakes.

But after awhile, you realize that the snakes themselves are not really the big thing. The event itself is the big thing. There are hundreds of booths in and around the coliseum hawking everything from sausage on a stick to antiques to guns and knives.

It's actually much like an old-fashioned county fair, with carnival rides and the whole works, kind of like Clyde's Merchants Day, but on a much bigger scale.

So, really, I guess I've answered my own "why?" question. It's Sweetwater's big event of the year. If it wasn't a snake round-up, it would be something else.

Everybody has a good time, the Jaycees make alot of money for worthwhile causes, they judge who is the prettiest girl, who has the best-looking beard and Sweetwater shows its stuff as a viable community again.

I guess that's not too bad a reason to have a rattlesnake round-up.

He will begin serving as superintendent July 31 when Ray Pruitt retires from the job after 12 years.

"He's going to be a great superintendent," said Pruitt.

"He's 100 percent for Eastland schools."

As for himself, Pruitt said he plans to spend time operating his two farms.

Program Offering Tax Help to Elderly

In the AARP program Free Tax Counseling for the Elderly, Mrs. Irma Miller helps people with their 1985 tax returns at the Multi-Purpose Center each Monday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. until April 15.

"Why pay \$25.00 to be advised that you owe no federal income tax?" Mrs. Miller asks. If your adjusted gross income, less contributions and exemptions, amounts to \$2,400 (without Social Security income), you may owe a small tax if you are a single 75-year-old. However, if your taxable income is \$2,900 and you owe a \$55.00 tax and you are age 65 or are permanently and totally disabled, you

may be able to take credit by including your social security income on the special form for that purpose (Schedule R) and not owe any tax at all.

If your only income is Social Security and you have no tax liability, or if you are a well-to-do business man, we probably can't help you. But if you are in the group mentioned above, we are here to help you if you need the help. Don't wait until April 15. Mrs. Miller says she had to turn away some last year. Call for an appointment at 725-7696 or 725-7698.

WTU Asks Another Rate Drop

West Texas Utilities Company's retail customers should see another decrease in their electric bills soon if the Public Utility Commission of Texas approves a request filed Monday in Austin.

WTU is asking permission to refund to customers a total of \$9.3 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs, and to lower its fuel charge rate. The total includes \$9,146,092 in actual fuel cost savings which have accumulated since the current fuel rate for WTU was set by the PUC last August, plus \$215,837 in interest.

This would be the second time within a year for WTU to make a refund and to lower its fuel cost factor. Over \$16 million was refunded in August 1985.

If a reduction in its fuel rates, technically known as the Interim Quarterly Fixed Fuel Factor, is approved, WTU officials estimate the fuel cost charges to its customers will drop by 8.2 per cent during the three month quarter beginning in May.

The due amounts on customer bills include both fuel costs and base rates. Utility companies are not allowed to make money on fuel. WTU has had no change in its base rates since 1984.

Under WTU's proposal, all existing retail customers would receive refunds through one-time credits to their bills in the billing month of May, except for seasonal cotton gin customers, who would receive their refunds in December.

A typical residential customer would receive refunds of \$22.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said this refund, as well as the one made last year is necessary because of a softer fuel market and the fixed factor method of collecting for fuel costs.

The present method was ordered by the PUC after the Public Utility Regulatory Act was amended in 1983. Previously, an automatic fuel adjustment clause matched fuel billings to fuel expense each month. These immediate adjustments prevented over-recoveries and made refunds unnecessary.

Churchill said WTU's fuel costs have declined two years in a row.

"This reflects our successful efforts to purchase natural gas at lower prices to the extent possible, and to take advantage of declining prices," he said.

"Also, we had substantial benefits from lower fuel costs associated with power purchased over our system's high voltage direct current tie with Public Service Company of Oklahoma, which now has been in operation for a full year."

Natural gas is the principal fuel for all of WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of WTU's total operating costs, but have dropped from an all-time high of \$3.18 per million BTU in 1983 to \$2.55 in 1985.

The projects are also varied, including such items as the Alamo (even one cut from soap), log cabins, cattle brands, and rattlesnake skins.

The students, their teachers and the library extend a Texas "Ya'll come" to the entire community.

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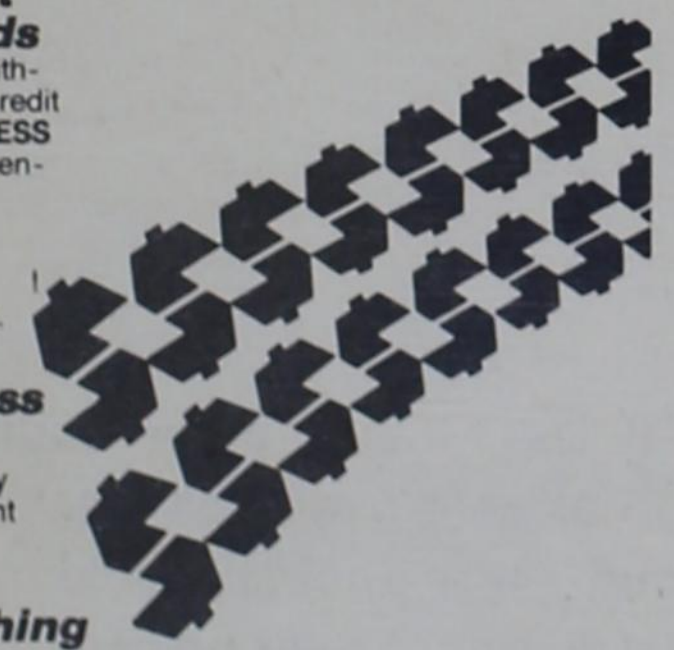
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BURKETT NEWS

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



Crepe Myrtle

Timely garden tips from the Cross Plains Garden Club — a continuing project.

The Crepe Myrtle, a deciduous shrub or small tree with striking blooms in the spring and summer, has become one of the most popular and beautiful plants grown in Texas. Few plants can offer the gardener so much for so long and yet require so little.

Easy to care for and so adaptable to nearly every type of soil. It is sometimes called the "Lilac of the South". The common name, "Crepe Myrtle" comes from its crepe-like crinkled and ruffled petals and the resemblance of its leaves to the true Myrtle.

The flowering season begins in June or July in most of Texas and continues through fall.

The colors are red, pink, white, lavender, or purple.

In the fall, leaves turn beautiful shades of yellow, orange or red. The trunk and branches have an attractively gnarled, twisted character.

In spring and summer, the bark peels to reveal new bark ranging in color to light pink to light green.

Crepe Myrtle can be planted nearly year-round when using container-

grown plants. Balled-and-burlapped plants, however, do best when planted during the dormant season or in very early spring.

Deep watering is required during dry spells in summer when it is growing and flowering.

Crepe Myrtle requires very little pruning to maintain its naturally graceful form, but you should tip-prune to remove old flower clusters and promote new growth.

Another big plus for the Crepe Myrtle is its high resistance to insects and disease. In fact, it can be one of the most pest-free landscape plants available when located in a good growing site.

So plant and enjoy!
