



The Cross Plains Buffaloes will open their 1986 football season at home Friday night as heavy favorites against the Blanket Tigers, but coaches always fear that opening contest because of the unknown quantities.

The Buffs' new coach, Mike Permenter, didn't get any bargain in new district alignments which go into effect this season.

The Buffs posted a 4-6 record last year under coach Mark Davidson, but that was in a Class A district. Unfortunately, Cross Plains had a good ADA last year and got bumped up to a Class AA loop this year.


The assistant of all the individuals and businesses mentioned, plus many more unnamed, have proved invaluable. The Booster Club appreciates the interest and involvement shown the project.

Buckles were presented to the first place winners in each category. Second place through fifth all received trophies.



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
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## COTTONWOOD NEWS

## 4-H Trap And Skeet Shoot

More than 400 4-H members and volunteer adult coaches participated in the 1986 State 4-H Trap and Skeet Shoot conducted at the Greater Houston Gun Club, August 6-9, and Callahan County was well represented.

Fifteen competitive events in American and International Trap and Skeet were sponsored by the State 4-H office in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, according to Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent.

Local 4-H'ers from Callahan County participated in the event, Mr. and Mrs. Terry Ellis, shooting sports 4-H leaders from Oplin, accompanied the

The 1986 State Shoot represents nine years of state level competition in the Texas 4-H Shooting Sports Program, said Don Steinbach, Extension Service Fisheries Specialist and Program Manager of the State 4-H Trap and Skeet Shoot. ## Child Abuse Cases Increased In July

On August 21st, the Child Welfare Board met. Kay Saunders reported monthly statistics for the months of June and July. In June there were only four reported cases of child abuse; however in July, the number of referrals jumped to eleven, six were of sexual abuse, two were of physical abuse, two of physical neglect, and one of lack of supervision. These were cases reported in Callahan County.

The board is a volunteer extension of the department of Human Resources. It is not a money making or a profit making agency; in fact, it has no operating budget. All funding comes from donations and the volunteer effort of individuals as well as civic organizations. The board acted on a motion to provide emergency funds to children who have come under the custody of Callahan County protective services. The board authorized Joan Vestal, Baird representative, to acquire clothing donations and sell them at her personal garage sale, in behalf of the board, scheduled for October. Articles of clothing are presently being accepted at the Methodist Parsonage, where in conjunction with the Methodist Church of Baird, the Childwelfare

board has established a clothes closet for indigent families with little or no resources. Still needed are children's apparel.

At the next board meeting, Eulaine

Dickerson of Clyde will be speaking on her experiences in the foster parent program. The public is encouraged to attend. At the August meeting a film was shown which gave some startling information.

Of abusing parents, well over half have themselves come out of abusing family situations. But the cycle can be broken. Of abusing parents that have gone into counseling and therapy, 80 percent are successfully reunited with their families to have healthy family relationships. Fears, however, have been expressed that funding might be cut from Child protective services as well as rehabilitation services. It is hard to believe that eleven cases of child abuse could come out of Callahan County nearly every other month. But it is equally hard to take the realization that infants, two years and younger, are the ones that are most frequently physically abused. Fortunately and also unfortunately, the leading referral in our county is not physical abuse, but sexual abuse. This is a plague that touches the very heart of our county. The Childwelfare board needs your support. Get to know the volunteers on the board:

## STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN-The real "secret plan" in the Legislature these days is the Senate's strategy to force the House to raise the state sales tax.

That's because nobody knows for sure what will finally force House members to vote out a tax bill. The Texas Constitution says all tax bills must originate in the House Ways and Means Committee.

It doesn't outline how the Senate can force a reluctant House to originate such a bill and the memories of several longtime Capitol-watchers can't recall a precedent.

Last week, Gov. Mark White officially opened the agenda to include his 11/8 cent temporary sales tax plan, saying the budget cuts already passed by the House weren't enough.

So far, the Senate refuses to adopt the cuts until the House sends over a tax bill. And so far. House leaders have laughed at that pressure.

### Force Certification

But a new strategy unveiled last week by Sen. Ray Farabee appears to be a product of the most logical of senate minds. The bill would require the state comptroller to certify whether the 1986-87 state budget will remain balanced.

Of course, it doesn't balance by an estimated tune of between \$3.5 to \$5 billion. The House would be constitutionally bound then to balance it, most likely by producing a tax

Farabee said the Senate would hold approval of the House cuts until the House approved his bill. A few hours later, the House leadership responded-"no deal." Stare on.

### Man of Hour

Thus, lawmakers remained deadlocked, tempers flared, and the governor, Lt. governor and speaker met to cool the coals. Quietly, some lawmakers are wondering if a second 30-day special session is in the making.

The man of the hour in the Texas Legislature, for better or worse, is Ways and Means Chairman Stan Schlueter, D-Killeen, gatekeeper for all tax

As the stalemate thickens, Schlueter finds himself more and more in the vortex of new power and prominence.

An unapologetic conservative Democrat, he is unopposed for re-election. For years he has been a lieutenant in the House power structure, and included in every discussion about future House speakers. Now his

prowess is on display for all

He refused last week to hear the tax bill in committee.

For now, and maybe until next regular session. Schlueter keeps new taxes at bay. If and when he opens the gate, he will give the bill his conservative stamp and perhaps quietly leverage the passage of other issues as well. Some argue he holds the November success of other lawmakers in his hands.

### Senate Highlights

While it waits for the House to thaw, the Senate works on other issues. Last week, sena-

· Amended a House school discipline bill to allow immediate expulsion of students involved in assaults, drugs and possession of weapons.

 Passed two controversial banking bills designed to save failing Texas banks. The Senate vote was 26-2. If the House passes the bills by a two-thirds majority, and voters approve the constitution amendments in November, Texas will finally allow branch banking and outof-state banks.

· Gave committee approval and sent to the floor a bill to legalize betting on horse and dog racing. Senators are betting that Gov. Mark White, who opposes the bills, will be forced to add such revenueraising measures to the special agenda.

 Tentatively confirmed White's controversial nomination of Jo Campbell to the Public Utility Commission. The nominations panel wanted her to explain her side of a pending lawsuit regarding allegations she had illegally discussed and taped rate cases with her staff.

The panel went so far as to summon Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox to a rare secret session to help members determine whether she had violated the law. After the vote, she won praise for

toughness.

· Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby offered a new twist on public education by suggesting that school districts should be fined if their graduates are so poorly trained they must take remedial courses in college. "There is no reason for the taxpayer to pay twice," Hobby said.

### Campaign Shots

The negotiations for a televised debate between White and former Gov. Bill Clements broke off after Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle tried to link Clements with business ties to Libva. Clements' staff walked out of a meeting in protest, calling it low-blow, dirty politics.

at's not standard equipment, but so far his body has rolled out the red carpet and given it a heroes' welcome.

Bill, who is 51, lost his first kidney in 1979. In recent years the other one reached the point of no repair. It meant dialysis treatments three times a week. Four hours at a time.

People on dialysis have their moments. Sometimes they thank God for preserving their lives. Sometimes they curse Him for the same thing.

Bill's darkest moments - the moments when he wondered if it made any sense - he describes as his "extreme spiritual challenge."

Bill applied for a kidney transplant after 18 months. His brother, a good match, according to physicians, was prepared to give him one of his kidneys.

Instead, they discovered a tumor in one of Richard's kidneys. He felt terrible, but Bill says they were lucky to catch his brother's tumor in time.

There was still the cadaver transplant option. The risks were higher, for sure. Some poor, unrelated soul would have to die before his kidney could be implanted into Bill's body. The chances of rejection were greatly enhanced.

Bill thought it over; then decided to withdraw his name from consideration. That was it, or so he thought.

Priends and doctors at the Dialysis Center kept encouraging him to go for the transplant option. It was an opportunity, after all, not available to some dialysis patients.

The pulling back period, he says now, relaxed his mind. "I was able to give up some of my panic," he says. "It was my time of surrender. I just decided to accept whatever happened."

Bill finally put his name back in the computer and waited. Some days he managed better than others.

Dr. James Webster is an informal physician who wears boots and jeans to work. He also has a flair for down playing the dramatic.

"What are you doing this afternoon?" he asked Bill that day.

"I'm taking some people on a (church) retreat."

"How would you like to go to Dallas this afternoon?" "Why?"

"They've got a kidney waiting for

"I felt like somebody had dropped a safe on me," says Bill. "When do I have to let you know?" he asked.

"Well, I'm kinda' on long dis-

Six hours later at Parkland Hospital, they were taking 13 tubes of blood from Bill's body. By 10 p.m. he was being wheeled into surgery. By midnight he had a new kidney and a new life.

All of this came at the beginning of Lenten season. "I'm giving up dialysis," he told his priest, the Rev. Charles Chatham.

Bill hasn't forgotten about the Dialysis Center, though. He knows the struggles the patients are going through. He remembers how the cards, the letters and the visits from old friends helped pull him through his operation. Now he visits the patients at the Center and tries to offer hope and understanding.

It's been six months since his operation. Not once has the body attempted to reject the kidney. They're calling it a picture-perfect transplant.

Bill's optimism has soared. He thinks he may be looking at 10 productive years.

Whenever he thinks about the man whose life was lost and whose family was kind enough to donate the kidney, he is humbled. "I feel like my life has been given back to me for no deserved reason," he says.

Bill now leads a morning prayer service at an Episcopal Church in his community. When it's over he goes to work as a clerk at a convenience

He is an educated man with a B.A. in forestry from Colorado State, and a certificate from seminary at Oberlin College in Ohio. For 19 years he served as a Presbyterian minister.

But medical problems have limited his career. The bills have been high and the income has been modest. He lives in a small, but comfortable home with his wife, Sally, a nurse, and his 15-year-old daughter, Ashli.

His daughter is a polite, seemingly unspoiled teenager. When her dad had the kidney transplant she wrote a story in the school paper explaining the situation to her middle school

Her conclusion, complete with five exclamation marks, hints at a home life with meaning beyond a Ferrari in the driveway:

"I love my dad," she wrote. "He is the greatest!!!!"

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


