
The piece was hand-printed like a real letter, although it was obviously made up.

At the March 18 meeting of the Cross Plains Independent School District Board of Trustees a motion was approved to offer Randy Taylor a contract as band director and music teacher for the 1987-88 school year.

Mr. Taylor has accepted the contract and will be a member of the faculty for the 1987-88 school year.

Taylor received a B.S. Degree in Music Education from Tarleton State University in 1975 where he graduated with honors. He has an Associate of Arts Degree from Cisco Junior College, 1973, and graduated from Cisco High School in 1971.

He has been the Music Director at

Wylie Independent School District since 1983.

Prior experience includes Music Director at Clyde Consolidated Independent School System, 1980-1983, which included programs in elementary, junior high, and high school band for Clyde and Hamby campuses.

children. **Board Eyes Break, 'Fridays Off'**

The Board of Trustees met in regular session on April 15. Action was taken by the board on the following issues: 1. Approval was given to participate in the Chapter 1 and 2 Coop sponsored by the Education Service Center 14 in Abilene for the 1987-88 school year. 2. The 1987-88 school calendar was discussed in regard to the opening of school, to have a spring break or continue the "Fridays Off" holidays, and the close of school. Current state regulations set September 1 as the earliest that school can open for the year and school cannot continue past the end of May. School holidays are set by the local board and administration. In the discussion, it was pointed out by the administration that students were given 10 absences per year to be used for extracurricular activities. By scheduling "Fridays Off" to correspond with extracurricular activities the students

can participate in additional activities and do not have days at school when so many students are gone. Due to extracurricular activities it becomes impossible to hold class. It was also mentioned that the current trend is to hold extracurricular activities after school hours or on Saturday. While this trend does reduce the days of school a student might miss during the year it also is forcing the student to choose between extracurricular activities as more and more activities are moved to Saturday. No decisions were made at this time concerning the 87-88 calendar pending any changes from the state



IF YOU WERE A PARENT, WHAT STANDARDS WOULD YOU **SET FOR YOUR TEENAGER?**

Being the parent of a teenager is definitely not an easy job. Neither is being a teenager. Teenagers travel many rough roads and often don't know which way to turn. One road leads to God, another leads to drugs, up ahead there's sex, and the road goes on and on. Parents are often the deciding factor to which roads their children choose. The choice may be excellent or horrible. Parents are often given credit for excellent choices made by their child when actually no credit is due. But parents are also blamed many times for a horrible decision their child may make, and this isn't right either. Parents can only do so much. Both drinking and especially drugs lead to so many deaths and crimes it's pathetic, and most parents, including myself, don't want to spend their entire life raising kids so they can kill themselves or become criminals.

> The way I look at it the sooner my child has good, dependable friends, the sooner my child will be going out, going to town, dating, etc. Some may call this blackmail. Maybe it is, but if blackmail is what it takes to save my teen's life, that's what I'll do. Truthfully, I don't believe choosing my child's friends would be fair, but it certainly wouldn't hurt to make some strong suggestions. I strongly feel Christ can be very

> important and very helpful during the teenage years. If my teenager believed in Christ, understood Christ, and went to Christ for answers, I would feel more secure with the roads my teenager would choose to travel over the years. I don't think a teen should be forced to go

Oregon Man Bicycling Around America For Special Olympics

Special Olympic's motto is "Let me win, but if I cannot win, let me be brave in the attempt."

Monty Palaniuk is trying to convey that message as he bicycles around the country. The 37-year-old man from Canby, Oregon plans to bicycle through the states making up the outer borders of our country, totaling about 8,500 miles.

Palaniuk, who lost his left arm in an industrial accident 13 years ago, rode through Cross Plains last Wednesday morning enroute to the Special Olympics in Austin.

Palaniuk is attempting to reach other amputees with the message that they are capable of doing many things, and that they don't have to sit around and feel sorry for themselves.

He left Oregon on February 28 and bicycles about 50-70 miles per day. Sometimes he is offered shelter at night, and told how courteous many people have been.

Cross-country bicycling is not new to Palaniuk as he traveled from coast to coast and border to border, approximately 7,000 miles from August 1985 until August 1986.

This year he is promoting Special Olympics. He plans to visit every regional center. "I'm doing this on my own. I told the Special Olympics people I'll make publicity along the way," said

Palaniuk.

He said, "The rain and cold on Monday was rough, but I was fortunate to have a young couple with two children offer me shelter for the night."
