Pneumonia Not Welcome Gift

As I approach my 51st birthday, I've got something I never had before — pneumonia.

Yep, the old iron man, the old stoic, the one who bragged he hadn't really been sick since he got the measles in grade school, has been stricken.

I'd like to make you feel sorry for me, but I'm actually beginning to feel better, thanks to a bunch of shots, pills and cough syrup — and time.

Pneumonia is a strange illness. I've got what they call the "walking" kind, where you are still mobile but don't really want to be.

Like my doctor said, in "olden times", telling someone he had pneumonia was like telling him to start packing for the Pearly Gates. My grandfather died of it way back when, and his son, my father, nearly did when I was about 18 months old.

My mother tells me she was awoken in the middle of the night by me bawling, as I was prone to do, she said, and she looked in on my father while she was up.

She said he was in the "crisis" period which people reached with pneumonia in which they either made it, or didn't. She said he was green and didn't look like he was breathing.

Her mother was there too and they immediately began trying to wake him up. My dad says he can remember that, and the fact that he didn't want to be disturbed. He was sleeping so peacefully, he said. Actually, he was passing away.

Of course, we didn't have a phone then, so my mother went down to the phone office and called the doctor.

The doctor came and immediately asked if we had any whiskey in the house. Naturally, we didn't, but my mother thought of a friend who would occasionally take a nip and went and got some. They got some of it down him, and my dad's heart started pumping again.

My dad says he got the pneumonia in just a few minutes walking home from work against a cold north wind.

I got it by exercising outdoors one night and then being cooled off by a south wind. It hit me as suddenly as if I'd been gassed.

When I was young, the phrase "take care of yourself" meant nothing to me.

Now, as I'm approaching 51, it's beginning to. It had better if I want to see many more years go by.

I guess we should pay attention to Dr. Red Duke when he tells us on TV to "take care of yourself."

Plane Crash Kills Man Known Here

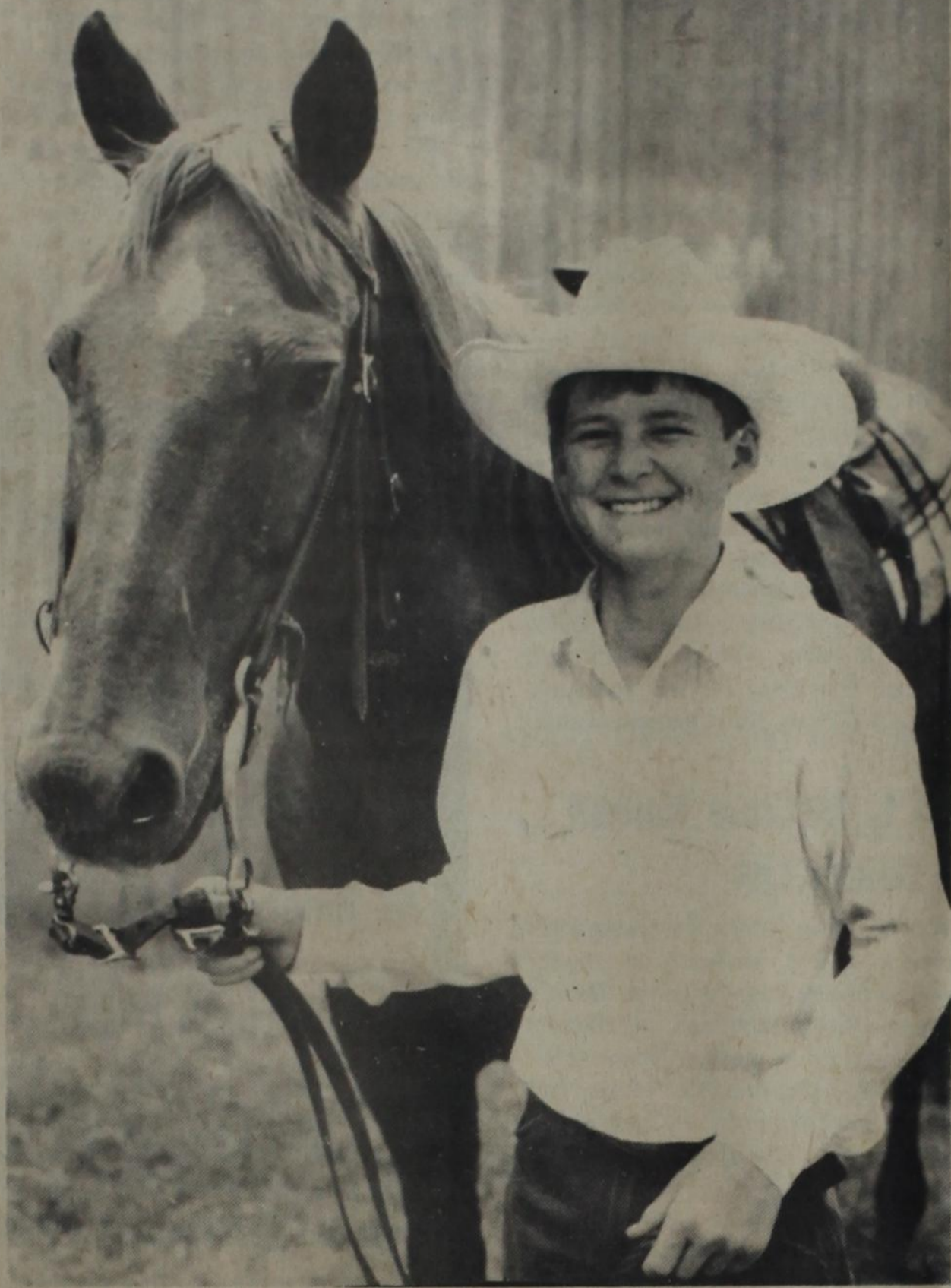
Rev. V. Creath Davis, executive director of the Christian Concern Foundation, along with George L. Clark, chairman and chief executive officer of MBank Dallas, Hugo W. Schoellkopf III, the pilot of the plane and a sporting goods company executive, and Trevor E. Mabery, a surgeon, were killed in an airplane crash on June 28.

The men were killed when Schoellkopf's twin-engine Cessna crashed in the rugged wilderness near Dead Indian Peak, about 30 miles east of Yellowstone National Park in Wyoming.

The men had been to Montana for a religious retreat.

Rev. Davis owned a farm at Cross Cut and was active in the oil business, cattle, and farming concerns. He was a Baptist preacher, Christian counselor, and well known author. The acknowledgement of one of his books listed several Cross Plains men.

A memorial service for the four prominent Dallas men expressing thanksgiving for their ministry drew more than 3,000 people.

Commodities Distribution July 16

CENTRAL TEXAS OPPORTUNITIES INC. will distribute USDA Commodities at Cross Plains from 9:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. on July 16. Items available this month are butter, cheese, honey, and rice.

All eligible persons will receive emergency food assistance without regard to race, sex, political beliefs,

age, national origin, or handicap.

Shut-ins are encouraged to designate an authorized representative to pick up for them.

Commodities will be distributed on a first come-first serve basis.

Volunteers are greatly needed and appreciated to help with this much-needed program.

Those Receiving Commodities Up

Just from the number of people receiving free government food commodities here, the economy in Callahan County appears to be worse than a year ago.

The number of people receiving food commodities in Callahan County has increased 10 percent, according to Malinda Winfrey, Callahan County Director for the food program stationed in Cross Plains.

From June 1986 to June 1987, 126 more people have signed up for the free food distributed in Clyde, Cross Plains, Putnam, and Baird. According to Ms. Winfrey, 1,220 received food commodities in June 1986 and June 1987, 1,346 were in the food program.

The commodity give-away in Clyde has shown the largest increase in a year's time among all the county towns. Clyde also holds the distinction of having the largest number of people served in the program. The number of people served by the program in Clyde has increased 20 percent, from 443 served in June 1986 and 551 served last

month. Clyde has also seen an increase since the first of the year. April 1987, Clyde had 534 being served and May 1987, there 536 being given food.

The town of Cross Plains has the second highest number of people served in the program. In June 1987, 431 people had signed up for the program. That is slightly higher than the 409 people that had signed up in June 1986. The town has seen a drop in the number of people receiving free food since the first of the year. April 1987, there were 457 people served and the May 1987 figures were 401.

Baird is the only town reporting a decrease in the number of people signed up for the program this year compared to last year. In Baird, 337 people had signed up in June 1986 and last month only 326 people were being served, a decrease of 11. The town has also seen a decrease since the first of the year. In April 1987, there were 344 people served and in May 1987, 324 had signed up for the program.

Even the small town of Putnam has

seen an increase in the number of people served in the government program this year from last year. In June 1986, 31 people had registered and in June 1987, 38 were receiving the food commodities.

Ms. Winfrey said that entry into the program is based upon the monthly gross income of the family and the number of people in the household. She added that residents over the age of 60 are allowed to have a higher monthly income to enter the program.

Cheese and butter are distributed through the program once every month. Ms. Winfrey said that sometimes flour, corn meal, dry milk, honey, and rice are distributed to the needy.

The food commodity program is put on in Callahan County by the Central Texas Opportunities office out of Coleman. CTP serves eight surrounding counties. Ms. Winfrey said that all surplus food stuff is stored in Cross Plains, although "very seldom do we have a surplus."

Stroke Victim Has Yard of Week

This week Ruth Barnett is being noted for her beautiful well kept yard. The lawn is always perfectly mowed with everything in place. She mows the front yard, while Colby and Brock Walker mow the back.

Large pecan and paradise trees provide a cool shade around the house. Ruth stated that she stayed outside much of the time and really enjoyed her yard.

Pots of red and pink geraniums and red and white petunias surrounded the base of the large tree adding color to the greenery. She stated, "The flowers were really pretty prior to the rain and hot weather."

Ruth's front porch is lovely with many hanging plants and pot plants. She has moss, purple jew, begonias, ivy, cactus, baby jew, ice plant (with pink blooms), teardrop jew, jade, kalanchoe, and fantasia.

All of the different varieties appeared so healthy and strong. Ruth informed me that she applies plant food every two weeks.

A Virginia creeper and English ivy were growing over her kitchen window, and she stated that they really blocked the sun from the west in the afternoon and evenings.

Beside her driveway there is a large sunflower plant which Ruth said Hadden Payne questioned her choice in flowers. As a farmer, he naturally wouldn't want a sunflower on his place. Ruth smiled and said, "I have always thought they were pretty."

A vegetable garden, 12 feet by 15 feet is located in her back yard. Cucumbers and beans were growing on 48 inch high frames. The frames provide more efficient use of the space, plus gathering vegetables is much easier. It eliminates the need for bending and stooping. She also has tomatoes, potatoes, okra, and squash.

Throughout the interview, Lady, Ruth's little dog, was busy investigating everything. Of course, every few minutes she would run back to her master and climb on the back of her patio chair, just to check things out. The two have a special bond and it was very obvious.

Ruth has a unique personal story which I asked if she would share. You would never guess that the person described above had suffered a severe stroke several years ago.

Ruth has made a remarkable comeback and her determination to get well can give hope and encouragement to others.

She has been through many hours of painful physical therapy in order to be independent. For a time, Glenda

Chandler stayed with Ruth and administered therapy between treatments, and cared for her.

Ruth said, "Without the help and encouragement of my family and friends, I couldn't have kept going. Their calls and visits were invaluable."

Ruth remarked, "Accept the support of others, if you are in need of comfort. And always try to wake up happy every

morning."

"I try to see the funny side of situations and find something to laugh about," she said. Her attitude is admirable considering all the obstacles she has overcome.

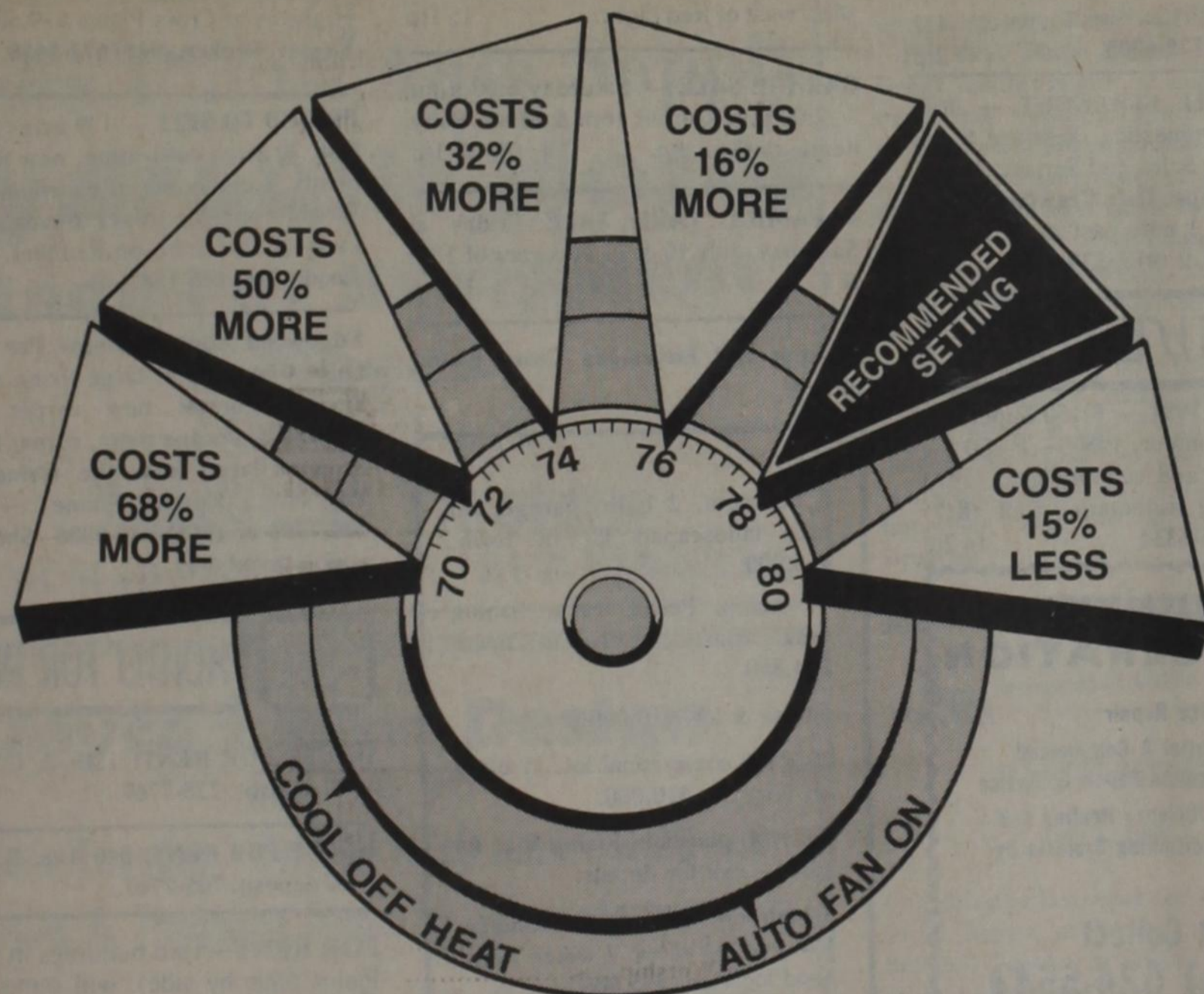

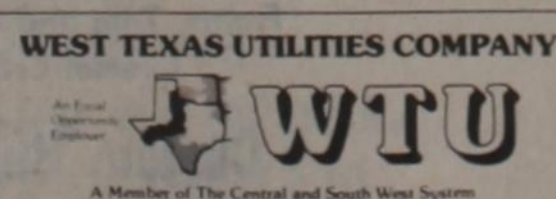

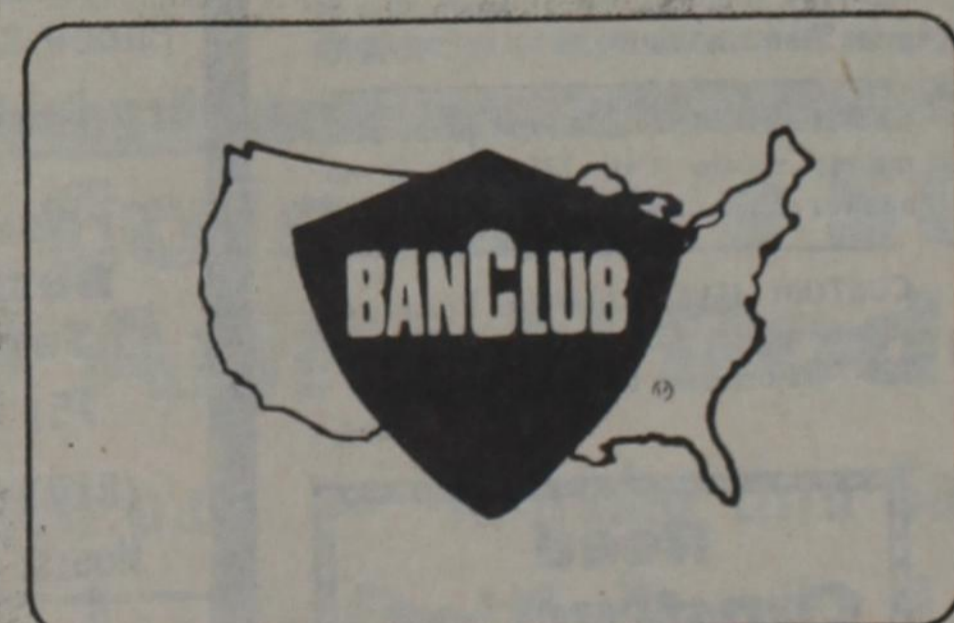

Written Warnings Good Protection

Dear Commissioner Nabers: I have been reading your columns and I notice that you often emphasize giving employees written warnings or reprimands. Is there a law that requires an employer to do this before he can fire somebody?

Dear S.W. No, there is no law which requires you to give written warnings before terminating an employee. It is, however, good business practice and good protection for you as an employer to do so.

A written warning, signed by the employee, is excellent proof that you notified the employee of the problem, gave him or her an opportunity to take corrective action, and advised the employee

of the consequences of failure to take such action.

Verbal warnings or counselings are often forgotten, misconstrued, or underestimated as to their importance.

Dear Commissioner Nabers: How much money can a person receive in unemployment benefits and how long can they draw it?

—W.H.
Pasadena, Texas

Dear W.H.: The amount of benefits available to a claimant depends upon their earnings. Currently the maximum weekly benefit amount is \$210 for 26 weeks — a total of \$5,460. The minimum weekly benefit amount is \$33.

In order to qualify for the maximum benefit amount, an individual must have been earning approximately \$20,000 a year at least a year and a half prior to the date of the claim.

Dear Commissioner Nabers: Can a person draw unemployment benefits and Worker's Compensation at the same time?

—L.T.

Dear L.T.: No. The Texas Unemployment Compensation Act provides that a person receiving

Worker's Compensation payments during a period when he would otherwise be eligible for unemployment benefits will be disqualified from receiving unemployment benefits.

You should be aware, however, that this disqualifying provision does NOT apply to a SETTLEMENT payment made by your Worker's Compensation carrier in lieu of litigating a contested Worker's Compensation claim.

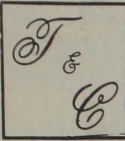




