Everyone is invited, so come expecting to have a good time and fellowship.

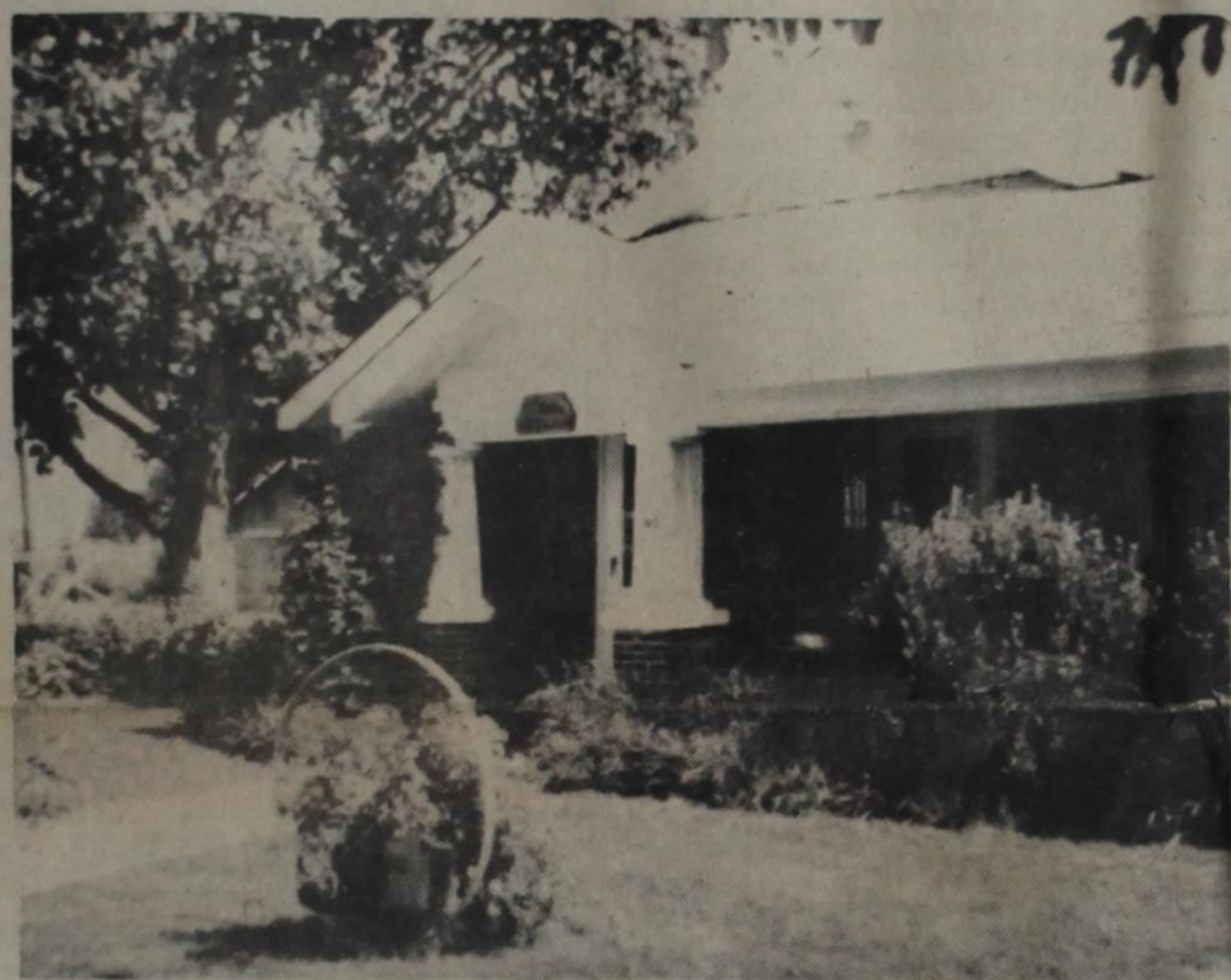
Yearbooks Ready To Be Picked Up

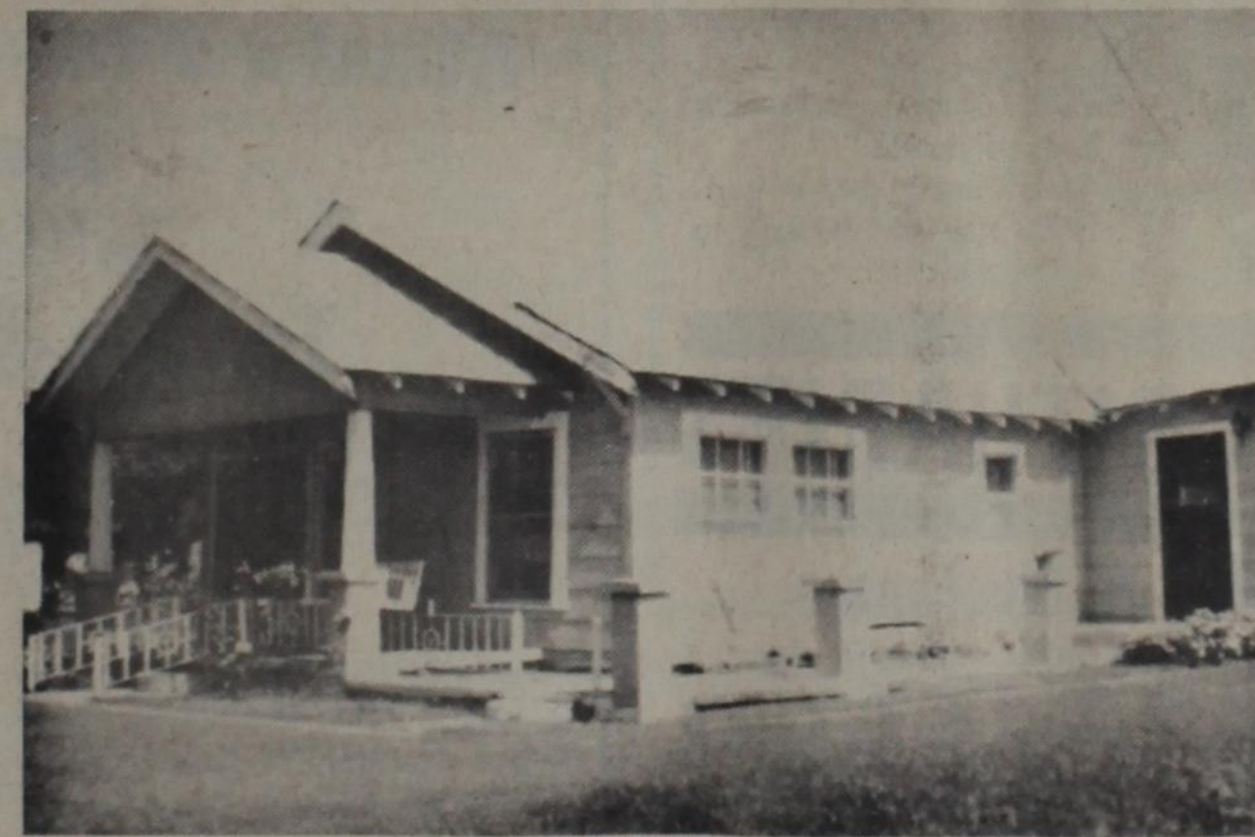

Big Crowd Eyes Crime Prevention

The Crime Prevention Program sponsored by the Cross Plains Kiwanis Club in conjunction with the City Marshall, Justice of the Peace, and Sheriff's Department was attended by more than 250 resident of Cross Plains. Additional chairs were obtained to seat all those who demonstrated interest in the program. The majority of the crowd were ladies who live by themselves. It was stated that 65 percent of the population of Cross Plains is made up of just this group.

The meeting began with a brief welcome by Rolan Jones, Justice of the Peace, and the reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Brian Keele, local Church of Christ minister, led the prayer.

Wayne Knowles, Deputy Sheriff, introduced Bill Skinner, Callahan County Sheriff, Robert McCool, County Attorney, Gene Hicks, Constable from Rising Star, Sheriff Underwood from Eastland County, and City Marshal, Jerry Martinez. They represented all the law enforcement agencies currently investigating recent major crimes.

Jerry Martinez gave an update on the kinds of crime committed locally and the percentage of convictions. He stated that 30 percent of crimes were unreported.

Glenn Lawrence, a former Cross Plains resident, who is on the Abilene Police Department, introduced the Crime Prevention Program and two speakers, Gerald Finch and Leonard Hudson.

Finch spoke to the group about protecting your home and property and being able to recognize a threat. He explained how the Neighborhood Watch program works and the advantages it provides. He also spoke on firearms safety and different methods of protecting yourself. Also, the legal rules that apply to self defense in your home.

Hudson presented a film depicting how times have changed and that we were feeling that now in Cross Plains. He mainly spoke on protective devices for securing your home. He stressed that suspicious characters, vehicles, etc. need to be reported to the local police or they can not do their job.

Late Donor Still Giving To Cemetery

One of the first benefactors of Cross Plains Cemetery Association was S.F. (Fos) Bond, deceased. Years ago, at a time when he was in the grocery and freight business at a location back of Citizens State Bank where the present bookkeeping department of the bank is located, Fos Bond made a donation to Cross Plains Cemetery Association in the amount of \$500.

The donation was to be placed in a passbook account with the following statement attached, "Donation by S.F. Bond, accepted on the condition that the principal remain intact indefinitely as is humanly possible, and the interest earned by the account be deposited to the checking account of Cross Plains Cemetery Association for expenses of upkeep of the cemetery."

This request has been kept. Later the account was changed to Certificate of Deposit so that it would earn more interest. The Certificate of Deposit was Capitalized for 30 months at a rate of \$14.05 earned \$140.63 interest. It was renewed this year for 30 months with an interest rate of 6.75%.

Mr. Bond had a farsighted vision of what his donation would mean to the cemetery. This account, and others like it, and monthly donations help make the cemetery something to be proud of.

County Sales Tax Election

Proposal Tabled Until Sept.

Approval of an election for the adoption of a 1/2 cent county sales tax was again tabled until the September meeting by the Callahan County commissioners at the court meeting Monday, July 13.

The proposal, tabled from the June commissioners court meeting, will again be brought up in September.

If commissioners approve, an election will be held to decide on a 1/2 cent county sales tax added to the state and city sales tax on gross sales in the county. Under law enacted after last year's second special legislative session, municipalities can add a half-cent to the sales tax rate for property tax relief.

The money raised from the sales tax would have to go toward reducing property taxes imposed by Callahan County. A half-cent sales tax would raise an additional \$88,274 for county coffers.

Other items brought to the attention of county commissioners includes:

—Voted to pay one-half of the rental assistance for the Texas Department of Health W.I.C. program to have a office in Clyde only if the other cities in the county agree to pay the other half. The county's portion would be \$150. The local W.I.C. office is located in the Clyde Business Plaza on the south access road of Interstate 20. The state will no longer pay the rent to keep the local health office open.

—Voted Aetna Life Insurance Co. as the hospital insurance carrier for Callahan County employees.

—Voted to pay \$213 as the county's contribution to purchase new radio equipment for the Clyde Citizens Emergency Medical Service ambulance. The cities of Clyde, Baird and Callahan County are to pay a 1/2 portion of the price of the equipment.

—Tabled until the commissioners next meeting, a building permit ordinance from chief appraiser Rodney Lewallen.

—Voted to amend the contract with the Cross Plains and Baird schools concerning the collection rates of school taxes. The new collection rates charged to the two schools is .75 per current parcel and \$1.00 per collected delinquent account parcel.

—Agreed to send one employee from the tax assessor/collector's office to be certified as an assessor/collector,

other than tax assessor/collector Wauneta Estes.

—Tabled until the July 27 court meeting, part-time secretarial help for the county justices of the peace.

—Tabled appointment of the presiding judge and alternate presiding judge for each voting precinct in the county. All positions for each precinct has yet to be filled.

—Took no action on a proposal from local SCS official Steve Uselton concerning new soil conservation dams in the county.

—Voted to lease for \$1,272 per month, a motor grader from Godsey Equipment Co. in Abilene for Precinct 1 commissioner Eugene Kitchens.

BAIRD — A 42nd District grand jury on July 9 refused to indict a Baird man in the April 17 death of his granddaughter.

The grand jury found that it was not a hit and run but an accidental death caused by a vehicle being driven by a member of the family.

The grand jury also recommended that appropriate action be taken to suspend Williams' driver license.

Any time there are unusual inventory or cash shortages, all of our employees must undergo polygraph examinations. Our company policy handbook says that failure of the polygraph test is grounds for termination. Would an employee fired under these circumstances be eligible for unemployment benefits?

Dear S.S.: Yes! Failure to pass a polygraph examination is not, in and of itself, evidence of misconduct. If you, the employer, are to protect your account from chargeback on an unemployment claim, you must have other evidence of the alleged misconduct

Tax Report

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$53.6 million in sales tax rebates to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1987 payments were down 6.5 percent compared to payments made in the same period last year.

Putnam now reports the smallest decline in taxes with -3.45 percent change to date. 1987 payments to date were \$6,135.09 compared to \$6,354.54 in 1986.

Baird shows a -9.68 percent change with 1987 payments of \$16,103.43 as compared to 17,830.07 in 1986.

Clyde reports -11.10 percent change with payments to date being \$41,345.29 compared to \$46,510.24 in 1986.

Cross Plains shows a -32.50 percent change to date with 1987 payments being \$21,700.72 compared to \$32,149.55 in 1986.

WTU NEWS

Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. are paying less than the state average price for electricity during July, according to the monthly survey of the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

WTU's standard residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt-hour is \$67.92, compared to an average of \$73.11 for all investor-owned utilities in the state and an average of \$68.88 for all 17 companies in the survey. The list includes a number of rural electric cooperatives, two municipally owned systems and the Lower Colorado River Authority.

The survey shows that since July 1986, WTU's rate for 1,000 KWh has decreased by 15.1 per cent as result of lower costs for power plant fuel. El Paso Electric Co. still has the highest rates in the state, charging its customers \$87.42 for 1,000 KWh. TU Electric Co., the reorganized utility which combined Texas Electric Service Co., Texas Power and Light and Dallas Power and Light, is charging \$70.82 per 1,000 KWh.

Several of the companies, including WTU and El Paso, are in the process of seeking rate increases. WTU has filed for a 23.9 per cent increase, and a hearing before the PUC in Austin has been scheduled for August 24.

This is the first increase in base rates sought by WTU in three years, while several decreases in fuel cost charges have occurred.

The change would place WTU's portion of the new Oklaunion Power Plant in the Company's rate base and add about \$50 million in annual revenue. The Company cannot recover expenses of building and operating the plant until the rate base is changed to reflect the \$275 million investment. The plant, which burns coal, has been in commercial operation since last December.

Polygraph Exams Do Not Prove Misconduct

Pre-polygraph admissions of wrongdoing may be used to establish misconduct if they are in writing and signed by the employee.

Dear Commissioner Nabers: I recently had to quit my job because my husband was transferred to another part of the state. I have had trouble finding work, so I filed a claim for

unemployment benefits. The Texas Employment Commission told me I would have to be disqualified for six weeks. That doesn't seem fair. Could you look into this for me?

—O.L.
Fort Worth

Dear O.L.: The information you received from your local TEC was correct. The law requires a minimum six week disqualification from the receipt of unemployment benefits if a person quits a job to move with his/her spouse. Normally, anytime a person leaves work for a personal reason such as this, he or she would be disqualified totally.

This six week disqualification is basically a compromise between the interests of employees and the interests of employers. Employers pay for all of the unemployment insurance system.

It is not your employer's fault that you quit to move, so his taxes should not increase when you file a claim. By the same token, the legislature did not want to penalize people for keeping a marriage together. For this reason they settled on a partial disqualification rather than a total one. If, after six weeks, you still have not found a job, you can begin drawing your benefits.

Grand Jury Indicts Two, No Bills One

Two Abilene women were indicted and a 81 year old Cisco woman was no billed during recent 42nd District Court grand jury duty last Thursday, July 9 in Baird.

The grand jury indicted the two Abilene women for possession of a controlled substance according to Callahan County attorney Bob McCool. If found guilty of the 3rd degree felony, the two could face from two to ten years in jail and up to a \$5,000 fine.

Callahan County trooper Phillip Dean responded to a one vehicle accident on Interstate 20 east of Clyde Saturday, May 23 in which the two women were in.

Both were injured when their rented auto with Louisiana plates jumped a concrete culvert in between the two lanes of traffic before coming to a stop. The auto was eastbound on I-20.

The driver of the auto was transported by Clyde ambulance to an Abilene hospital with minor injuries, while the front seat passenger in the car sustained major injuries to the face and mouth after hitting the dashboard and windshield during impact.

Troopers Dean, David Mays, Clyde Police chief Ron Young and officer Greg Lewis inspected the auto at the accident scene and found \$6,575 in cash located inside a photographer's bag, drugs, drug paraphernalia, and a .357 caliber handgun.

County attorney McCool said that a forfeiture of the cash in the automobile has been filed. He said that a recent federal law passed states that proceeds obtained from illegal means are subject to seizure by local law enforcement agencies. The local Department of Public Safety will probably get most of the cash.

The grand jury later found insufficient evidence to indict a 81 year old

Cisco woman involved in a two-vehicle accident on Interstate 20 Sunday, June 14.

A Abilene Christian University graduate was killed and a Lubbock woman was seriously injured when their motorcycle collided with the Cisco woman's auto on Interstate 20, two miles east of Putnam.

Theodore Alex Sadoff, 24, died after being thrown from the motorcycle he was driving on the eastbound lane of I-20.

Christina Childers, 21, remains in critical condition at Parkland Hospital in Dallas after her left leg was amputated below the knee. She was a passenger on the motorcycle.

The two were on their way to a church picnic at Lake Cisco when the

accident occurred.

The car, driven by the 81 year old Cisco woman, was traveling westbound in the eastbound lane of the highway.

McCool said that the Cisco woman did have a blood-alcohol content of .03. To be legally intoxicated in Texas a person must have a blood-alcohol content of .10 percent or above. No alcohol containers were found in the automobile.

Efforts are now being made to secure a suspension of the Cisco woman's drivers license through the Department of Public Safety.

McCool said that the local Department of Public Safety troopers did a thorough job in presenting the cases to the grand jury.

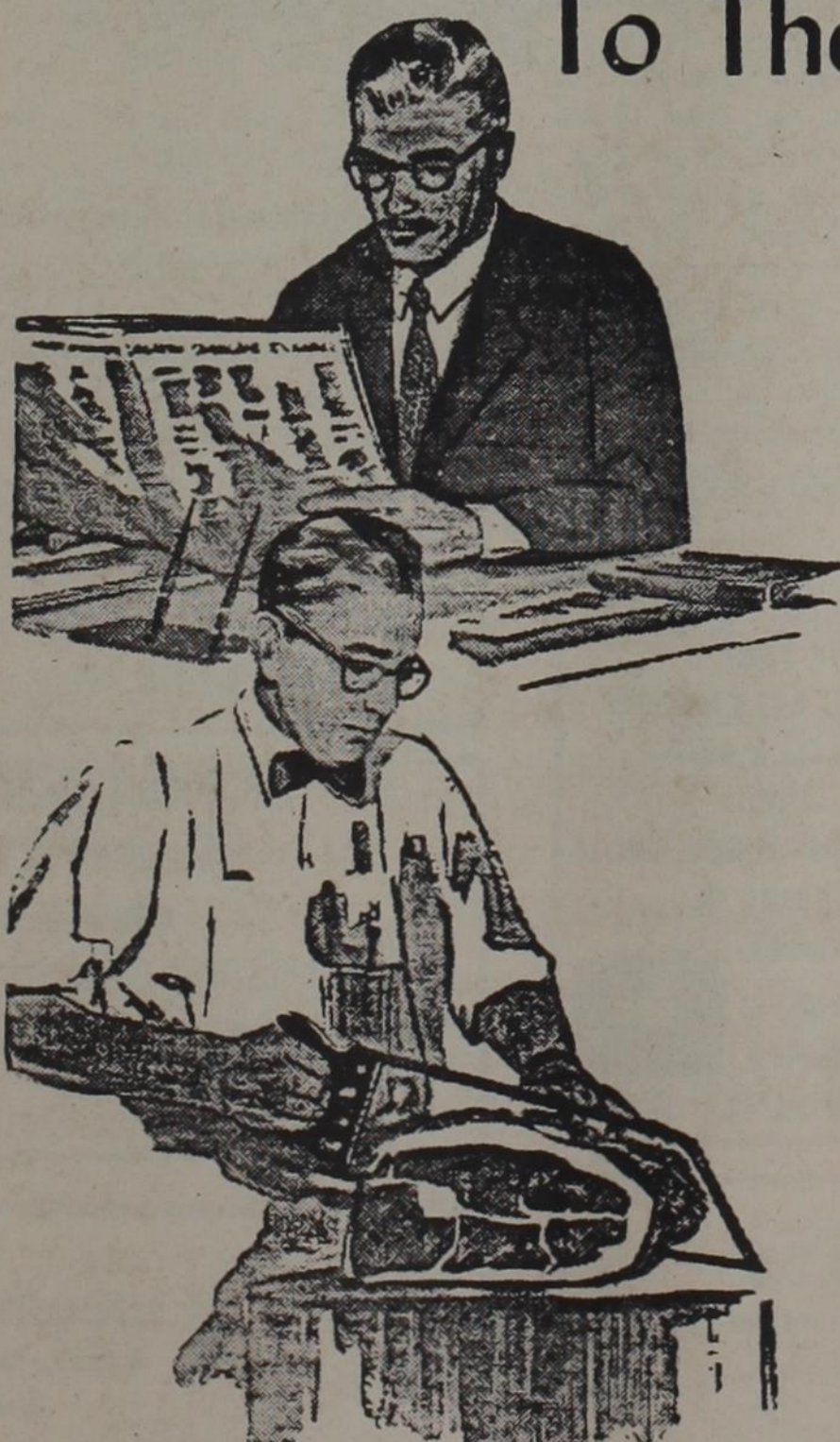

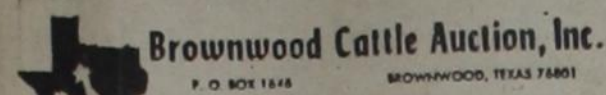

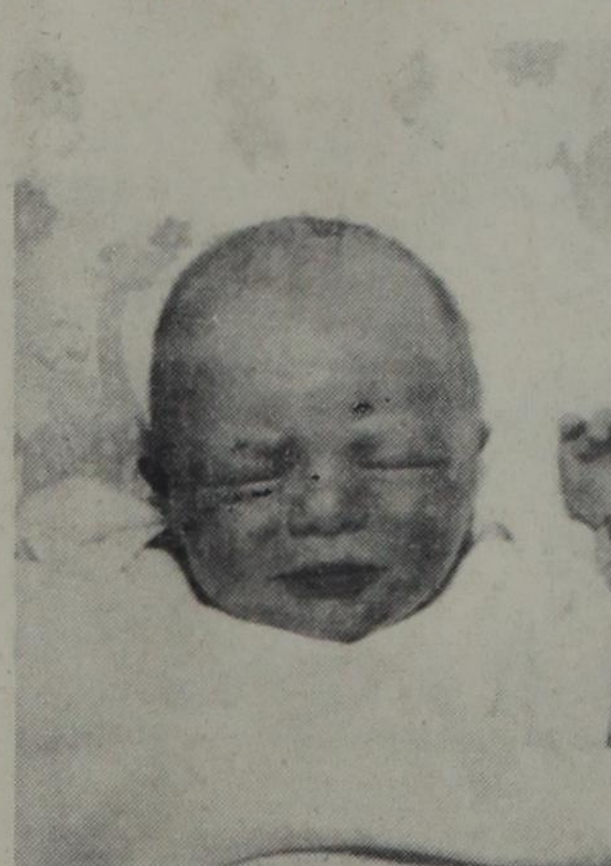

STAY CLEAR OF POWER LINES

HAVE RESPECT FOR POWER LINES — BOTH THOSE OVERHEAD AND THOSE UNDERGROUND — ANYTIME YOU'RE DOING A JOB THAT REQUIRES YOU TO WORK NEAR THEM.

- Check your clearance carefully when you're carrying a tall pole or pipe on a tractor, or driving a truck with a raised bed, or operating machinery such as cranes, booms, hay loaders and well drilling rigs.
- Make sure you know the location of underground power lines before you install irrigation systems or unclog drain or sewer lines. Even routine projects like digging post holes or planting trees can be dangerous if you get too close to power lines.
- Fallen power lines also are extremely dangerous. If you see a line downed by a storm, high winds, car accident or other mishap, call WTU. Meanwhile, stay away from the wire and anything it touches — and keep others away, too.
- Don't trim or cut down trees near power lines. This is work best left to experts.
